Stanza 1

*I learned to watch while others rushed ahead,
To weigh the hour before the path was tread.
The times were loud with voices chasing claim,
But truth spoke low, untouched by noise or fame.*

Scripture Reflection:

Measured Discernment begins with restraint. Scripture repeatedly warns that haste clouds judgment, while listening sharpens perception. God's truth is not amplified by volume or urgency; it is recognized by those who are attentive and still.

- *"Let every person be quick to hear, slow to speak, slow to anger."* — James 1:19
 - *"Be still, and know that I am God."* — Psalm 46:10
 - *"The one who listens gains wisdom."* — Proverbs 18:15
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Stanza 2

*I searched the Word to read the season clear,
To match God's promise with the moment near.
For strength untimed can still distort the good,
And haste can break what wisdom once withstood.*

Scripture Reflection:

Discernment is formed by Scripture, not circumstance. The Word of God provides the lens through which seasons are interpreted. Even righteous strength, if released without timing, can undermine God's purposes.

- *"Your word is a lamp to my feet and a light to my path."* — Psalm 119:105
 - *"To everything there is a season, and a time for every purpose under heaven."* — Ecclesiastes 3:1

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Stanza 3

Scripture Reflection:

Measured Discernment honors the past without clinging to it and embraces the future without grasping for it. God often signals transition gently. Wisdom discerns release without resentment and waits without presumption.

Scripture Reflection:

Biblical discernment holds patience and obedience together. Waiting is not passivity, and action is not recklessness. The Spirit teaches when to hold and when to move, so zeal serves God rather than outruns Him.

Scripture Reflection:

Scripture Reflection:

Discernment culminates in obedience, not control. God alone directs history; the discerning leader recognizes when to stand where God is already at work. Faithfulness lies in alignment, not authorship.
