# Job's Poem on Intercessory Prayer, Unpacked

#### Stanza 1

"I sat in ashes, stripped of gain, My heart weighed down with grief and pain. Friends accused, their words cut deep, Yet still the Lord my soul would keep."

# Stanza 3

"O child of God, learn what I found— That healing waits where grace abounds. When you stand and pray for those, Even ones who wound or oppose,"

Meaning: Job now turns to us as a teacher. He urges believers to learn from his
experience: true healing is tied to grace. When we choose to intercede, even for
those who have opposed or hurt us, we align with God's grace and open the door for
His healing—both for others and ourselves.

# Stanza 4

"You join the work of heaven's plan, To lift another, hand in hand. The selfless prayer, the whispered plea, Unchains your heart and sets you free."

Meaning: Intercessory prayer participates in God's larger redemptive work
 ("heaven's plan"). Praying for others is joining hands with them spiritually and lifting
 them before God. And while it blesses others, it also frees the intercessor from
 bitterness, pride, or isolation.

### Stanza 5

"So intercede—let mercy rise, Let love break walls and pierce the skies. For when you pray on others' part, God's restoration floods your heart."

Meaning: The closing call is an exhortation to intercede boldly. Mercy and love are
powerful forces that break down barriers and reach heaven itself. Intercessory
prayer not only helps others but also brings God's restorative power into the
intercessor's own life—just as Job was restored when he prayed for his friends (Job
42:10).

# **Summary of the Whole Poem:**

The poem shows Job moving from suffering to obedience, from wounds to mercy, and from bitterness to blessing. The wisdom is clear: when we pray for others—even those who hurt us—we join God's plan, release His mercy, and experience restoration ourselves.
