I use recycled and repurposed materials not just as a method, but as a statement: we must rethink what we value, how we live, and what we leave behind.

Rob Chevallier was born in 1957 in Oss, The Netherlands, and currently resides and works in Steenderen, Netherlands.

He pursued his studies in graphic design at the Art Academy in Arnhem. Since 2006, he has been active as a photographer across the Netherlands, Belgium, and Germany. In 2017, he expanded his artistic practice to include the creation of photo objects and installations.


His artistic endeavors, which encompass mixed media photography, objects, and installations, primarily focus on themes of climate change, nature conservation, and sustainability. The aim of his work is to raise awareness about these critical issues.

Recent exhibitions include the EuropArtFair in Amsterdam 2024, where he received the 2nd prize jury award, as well as participation in the Artist Meeting at the Knokke Art Fair and the Climate Expo at the National Museum Muiderslot in Muiden. Between 2018 and 2023, he showcased his work in various venues, including the Dutch Climate Expo in Zwolle, CODA Museum in Apeldoorn, IJsselbiënnale, Zandvoort Museum, Watermuseum in Arnhem, and Museum Energeticon in Aachen. In November 2024, he successfully exhibited at Brussels Expo in Brussels, Belgium, as part of Art3F in collaboration with Gabriel Fine Arts.

His works have been acquired by private collectors across Europe.

My installations and photo objects incorporate recognizable, everyday items—symbols of comfort or nostalgia—that are reimagined through the lens of contemporary photography. In doing so, I confront viewers with the contrast between past illusions and present realities. These works shine a light on the consequences of industrialization, ecological destruction, and the urgent need for environmental justice.

## **Howard Harris**

In my work, I explore the intersection of sustainability, innovation, and global consciousness through a fusion of creativity and purpose. Each piece is an intentional synthesis of forward-thinking ideas and emotional resonance, crafted to engage both the senses and the mind. By leveraging the language of Techspressionism, I transform digital tools into expressive instruments, capable of conveying urgent messages about our shared future.

My art serves as both mirror and catalyst—a platform for dialogue that questions the status quo and invites collective reflection. I seek to challenge conventional boundaries and imagine a world where ecological balance and human progress are not at odds, but in harmony. With every visual narrative, I strive to inspire meaningful action and foster a culture of awareness, empathy, and transformation.

# My works are a call to envision and co-create a more sustainable, innovative, and interconnected world.

Did that image just change as you walked beside it? Look again. Yes, it did. This perceptual intrigue lies at the heart of Howard Harris's dimensional photographic constructions. Blending aesthetics with advanced technology, Harris reimagines photographic art to reflect the subtle, ever-shifting nature of human perception. His layered works engage light, motion, and space to simulate the complex ways we truly see—not just with our eyes, but with our mind and emotions.

A native of Denver, Colorado, Howard Harris is a pioneering Techspressionist artist whose practice explores the interplay between perception, design, and innovation. He holds a BFA from the Kansas City Art Institute and a Master's in Industrial Design from Pratt Institute, where he studied under influential design theorist Rowena Reed Kostellow. His 35+ year career in design—marked by award-winning achievements—has laid the foundation for his radical re-envisioning of photographic media.

In 2017, Harris was awarded a United States Patent for his Apparatus and Method of Manufacturer for a Layered Artwork, a testament to the originality and inventiveness of his approach. Since then, his work has been widely published and honored, appearing in ARTtour International Artists of the Decade, Art Collectors Choice Japan, International Contemporary Masters, and Top 10 Contemporary Artists, among others. His accolades include the International Prizes Raffaello, Giulio Cesare, Leonardo da Vinci, and Caravaggio, as well as the Artists for a Green Planet Artist of the Decade.

Harris has served as a Trustee of the Kansas City Art Institute and is a recipient of the Who's Who Worldwide Lifetime Achievement Award and the USA Small Businessperson of the Year. Today, his innovative photographic art is exhibited internationally and represented by galleries across the United States, United Kingdom, and Europe.

In the spirit of constant reinvention, Howard Harris invites you not just to look—but to experience art as a living, shifting encounter.

# Carine Hayoz

In the glow of the city, shadows stretch and dissolve. Figures emerge like fleeting thoughts, reflected in the shimmering surfaces of light and water. My work captures these ephemeral moments—where the urban landscape becomes a mirror of movement, memory, and meaning.

I'm drawn to the pulse of modern life—its beauty, its tension, its transience. Each piece in this collection is a reflection of that rhythm, blending aesthetics with a deeper commentary on our place in a rapidly evolving world. Through the language of light, texture, and abstraction, I explore how we connect—to each other, to our environment, and to the future we are shaping.

For me, sustainability is not only a subject but a principle woven into the conceptual framework of the work. It speaks to the balance between creation and preservation—between the human impulse to build and the responsibility to care for what endures.

These works are visual meditations, meant to be lived with. They invite ongoing discovery and dialogue, offering collectors more than a visual experience—they offer a stake in a vision of conscious progress and timeless connection.

Carine Hayoz is a Swiss architect and painter based in Bern, whose artistic practice explores the intersection of landscape, architecture, and the human presence through acrylics on canvas. Drawing on her architectural background, she constructs compositions that balance surface, color, and light—abstracted yet evocative, structured yet open to interpretation.

Her works employ a refined formal vocabulary: atmospheric tones, layered textures, and precise lines coalesce into abstracted spaces that hint at real or imagined environments. Increasingly, human figures emerge within these compositions—inhabiting and interacting with the architectural and natural forms, suggesting narratives that are both intimate and universal.

Hayoz works primarily on square canvases, a deliberate choice that enhances the tension between order and spontaneity. The result is a body of work that invites viewers to linger, reflect, and engage with its quiet complexity.

Over the past decade, Hayoz has exhibited widely in solo and group exhibitions across Europe and the United States, with shows in Zürich, Basel, London, New York, Milan, Perugia, and Venice during Venice Biennale.

In every image, I offer an unfinished story—an invitation for the viewer to imagine, complete, or transform it. Each gesture, each posture, and each interaction with the surrounding space reveals a new and personal narrative.

## Maritta Winter

My artistic vision is grounded in a deep commitment to sustainability and meaningful innovation. For me, sustainability means creating in a way that supports long-term well-being—for both people and the environment. It's about nurturing connection and awareness, while honouring and preserving the natural world. Through my sculptures and paintings, I aim to evoke a sense of resonance in the viewer—a space where strength and stability meet movement and lightness.

The materials I work with are a vital part of this vision—bronze, for instance, with its timeless strength and resilience, symbolizes the enduring presence I aspire for my work to carry. Innovation, in my practice, is always in service to sustainability. I'm not interested in creating something "new" for its own sake. It must contribute to human well-being and expanded perception.

Affinity bronze height 58 cm edition of 6 In recent works, such as the collage *Confidence*, I explore unconventional materials and unexpected combinations—not for novelty's sake, but to encourage new ways of seeing and to gently expand the viewer's perception beyond the familiar.

Maritta Winter is a German-Swiss sculptor whose work bridges the realms of architecture, movement, and intuitive form. Born in southern Germany near Freiburg, she has lived and studied across Germany, France, and Switzerland. Since 2011, she has been based near Lake Zurich. Her diverse artistic education includes studies in sculpture, fine art, and design across these three countries, shaping a multifaceted and ever-evolving practice.

Winter's artistic repertoire spans sculpture, photography, screen printing, mesh reliefs, and, most recently, vibrantly colored three-dimensional wall objects, which she began exploring in 2022. Central to her work is a deep, instinctive sensitivity to form, space, and motion. Her sculptures often feature the dynamic interplay of two volumes—elements that seem to expand, twist, or swing outward into space. This recurring motif is rooted in her tactile, intuitive understanding of shape, edge, and transition, as well as a visual search for the exact moment a form reaches its most expressive contour.

Her sculptures, many of which are installed in public spaces and architectural contexts, embody both elegance and presence. Works like Rendez-vous (2006) soar birdlike over the landscape outside the Grand Ballon hotel in the Vosges mountains, while Zen (2009) introduces a contemplative rhythm into the stairwell of the Finnova AG building in Lenzburg. Skydream (2011) contrasts with the minimalist architecture of Zurich's Prime Tower, its curves softening the building's formal austerity.

Winter's deep connection to movement—rooted in her own background in dance—infuses her sculptural forms with rhythm and fluidity. "If I hadn't become a sculptor, I would have been a dancer," she says. This kinesthetic awareness is evident in works that seem to pivot, leap, or glide, animated by an inner momentum. For Winter, movement is not only physical but also metaphorical—a symbol of transformation, of life itself. Her work, much like dance, is an expression of balance, energy, and presence.

Maritta Winter continues to develop a body of work that is both grounded and transcendent, architectural and organic, bold and intimate. Her sculptures inhabit and respond to their environments—natural or constructed—while inviting viewers into a shared space of motion, emotion, and contemplation.
