Lunar Recession

Does It Support a Young Universe?

We have had many people contact us concerning the recession rate of the moon. Hopefully this short article will help to clarify the details of lunar recession and why it supports a young universe.

[The July 11 AiG web] articlementioned the moon moving away from the earth at approximately 1.5 inches a year. It said that would be 250 meters in 6,000 years which I can get on my computer's calculator program. It also mentioned the moon as being 400,000km away and that 1.5 billion years ago the earth and moon would be touching at that pace. However I get 9.6 billion years at the 1.5 inches a year pace and am not so sure that the moon moving away from the Earth would be constant. I would think that the speed at which the moon moves away from the Earth would be lower at lower distances due to planetary gravity? Is the author using logic somewhere to change the math that I am unaware of? At a closer distance from earth at a certain point the two would accelerate towards each other and collide I'm sure.. There has to be a minimum distance the moon would have to start away from Earth for this to not happen right? So how far is that distance and is that the factor I'm missing?

We have had many people contact us concerning the recession rate of the moon. Hopefully this short article will help to clarify the details of lunar recession and why it supports a young age for our solar system.

The recession of the moon is not constant over time. It would have been faster in the past. So, it is incorrect to assume that the rate has always been 4 cm/year.

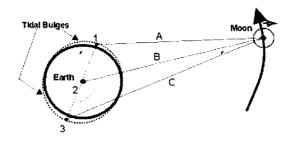


Figure 2. Present recession rate of the moon

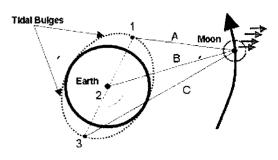


Figure 1. Past (theoretical) recession rate of the moon

Gravity is the force that keeps our moon in orbit around the earth. In Figures 1 and 2 this is represented by line "B." If not for the gravity of the earth and moon, the moon would simply

float away from the earth into space.

A major point to remember about lunar recession is that it is not

constant over long periods of time. The further the moon moves away from the earth the more constant its recession seems to become.

In short, lunar recession is caused by tidal forces. Tidal forces are not the same thing as the gravity that keeps the moon orbiting around the earth. (However, they are *caused* by the moon's gravity as will be shown.) The moon does more than just the rising and receding of tides along shorelines. When combined with the rotation of the earth and its gravity, these tidal forces are what cause the moon to recede away from the earth.

As we know, the moon causes tides; these are due to the fact that the moon's gravitational force is stronger the closer you are to it. So, the moon's gravity pulls more strongly on the side of Earth closest to the moon, and pulls less on the opposite side. This effectively "stretches" the Earth and produces two tidal bulges. The figure illustrates how the moon is actually pulling the oceans away from the earth toward itself (point 1) and causes the earth to bulge. At the same time there is a bulge produced on the opposite side of the earth (point 3) where the earth is being pulled away from the oceans.

Since the earth rotates faster than the moon orbits, the tidal bulge stays slightly ahead of the moon. With the earth bulging, the moon is "pulled" by the point of gravity (point 1), produced by the bulge, since it is closer to it (line A) than the point of gravity (point 3) at the opposite side of the earth (line C). Since the moon is constantly being pulled it is constantly accelerating. Even though the earth's gravity (point 2) is acting as a centripetal force (line B) to keep the moon in an orbital path (dark arrow), the acceleration of the moon caused by

the tidal bulge at point 1 is increasing its angular momentum, therefore moving it outward (gray arrow).

T.P. USA Figure 1 shows what the past (theoretical) recession rate would have looked like. Being much closer in a more-distant past, the moon would have caused larger tidal bulges, creating a greater "pulling" force (point 1, line A), increasing the angular momentum; thus the moon receded at a much greater speed (as shown by the red arrows).

With the earth where it is today (Figure 2) tidal bulges are much smaller (than the theoretical past), making the "pulling" force of point 1 smaller; thus the angular momentum is much less, resulting in the present and seemingly more-constant recession rate of 4 cm per year. The moon could never have been closer than 18,400 km (11,500 miles), known as the *Roche Limit*, because Earth's tidal forces (i.e., the result of different gravitational forces on different parts of the moon) would have shattered it. This

is explained in more detail In Dr. Jason Lislebook Taking Back Astronomy.

Progressive publishers launch children's Bible stories with social justice, diversity themes

Faith books emphasize diversity, inclusion and justice for children ages 4 to 17

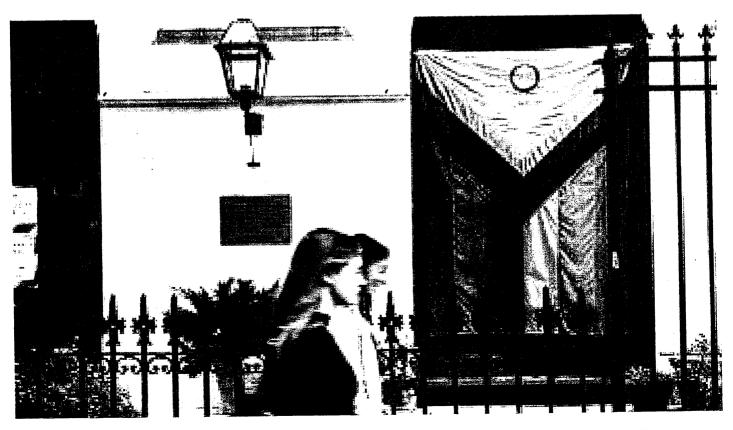

A crop of new children's storybook Bibles aims to reach progressive Christians who are turned off by traditional presentations of Scripture, offering messages focused on <u>diversity</u>, <u>inclusion</u> and social justice.

Publishers say the projects are meant to reflect the faith values of a changing audience — and to fill what they describe as a gap in faith resources for progressive believers.

"The Just Love Story Bible," a "justice-oriented" storybook for readers ages four to 10, was released last month. The book, authored by Rev. Jacqui Lewis and the Rev. Shannon Daley-Harris, features 52 Bible stories and illustrations portraying characters in Black, Brown and tan skin tones.

"The biblical characters mostly look Black and Brown and caramel ... now White children, I imagine, looking in this Bible and seeing brown people and thinking to themselves, 'Oh, brown people belong to God, too,'" she added.

The authors said they also hope to prompt children to ask questions and challenge <u>traditional beliefs</u> about God, Jesus and the biblical narrative.

"Did that happen?" Lewis said, describing how the storybook presents Jesus' resurrection. "For me, it matters more that children know that love never dies, so that's where I landed."

"It's OK to actually tell kids from the get-go: Some of these stories are about true people and things that really happened, and some of them are made-up stories, but they're in there because they can still teach us true things about God," Daley-Harris said, referencing the story of Jonah.

The authors acknowledged that readers who interpret the Bible literally may not be the right audience for their book.

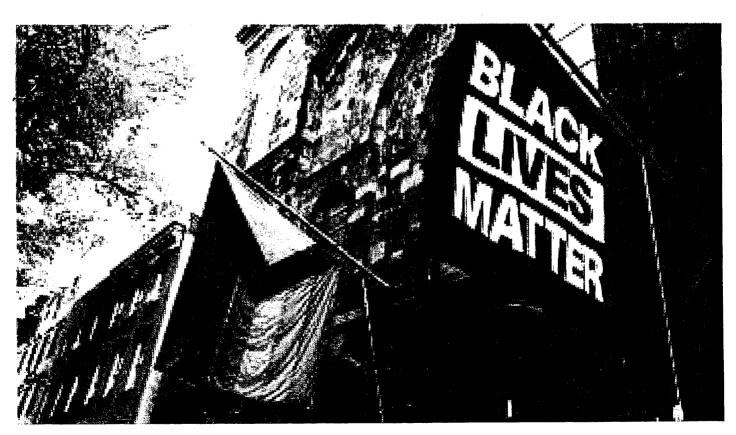
tradition that no longer fit them, who did grow out of a theology and are looking for one that they can grow into and grow with alongside their children."

Lewis said the book also highlights women in Jesus' ministry and portrays him as a "feminist."

"When Shannon and I say we don't want children to learn something they have to unlearn, we don't want them to learn patriarchy from this story Bible," she told RNS.

The book's publisher, Beaming Books, says it hopes to reach <u>progressive</u> <u>Christians</u> seeking an "open-minded Bible."

"We noticed a gap in the marketplace for people who are looking for a more open-minded Bible for progressive Christians, one that is focused on love and justice," said Naomi Krueger, senior acquisitions' editor for Beaming Books, in an interview with <u>Publishers Weekly</u>.

"Its countercultural message is really appropriate for this time," Krueger added, saying the book is intended to be "an antidote to Christian white supremacy."

"The Just Love Story Bible" is one of several new titles pushing for broader representation in children's Christian publishing.

Hodder Faith, a U.K.-based Christian imprint, released "Come and See: An Invitation to a Radical Encounter with Jesus," last month. The devotional book, aimed at readers 11 and up, was written by Shannon T.L. Kearns, described as the first openly transgender man ordained to the Old Catholic priesthood, according to the author's biography.

"If you want to take children into the Bible and still be respected as an LGBTQ person, there are not a lot of resources for you," Hodder Faith publishing director Andy Lyon told Publishers Weekly. "It's called 'Come and See,' because it's about being seen and knowing you belong. You see Jesus and then Jesus sees you."

Another devotional, "Growing in God's Love: A Family Devotional," is out from Westminster John Knox Press. The book offers daily readings that bring "substantive, progressive lessons in faith for all generations," and is aimed at adults and children ages five to 17.

Author Jessica Miller Kelley, an editor at Westminster John Knox, said she intentionally avoided using gendered language such as "mother" or "father" in the devotionals, except when directly quoting Scripture, to make the stories more inclusive of gender diversity and different kinds of families, she told Publishers Weekly.

The book's early readers praised its emphasis on justice, inclusivity and diversity.

Krueger said in the report that progressive Christians are looking for more resources that affirm their values – and expects the number of such projects to gro \boldsymbol{w} ,
