

PARK MANAGEMENT UPDATE November 2025

Seasonal maintenance and care of your home can add to your safety and comfort as well as help control repair costs. Here are some key maintenance procedures for Fall and Winter: Check and clean your furnace and change furnace filters. Inspect roof and clean off debris, inspect gutters and downspouts and clean out debris. Check smoke and C02 alarms. Clean patios and carports, these areas not to be used for storage. Use the green waste bin in the corporation yard for landscaping clipping and debris from roofs. Check skirting around your home and close any spaces that could be accessed by small animals. Contact the office to review any tree branches within 10 feet of any chimney or stovepipe outlet.

PARKING - Parking **is not permitted** on Paseo Grande, San Lucas, Los Robles, La Cuesta, La Canada, Redondo, Laguna Seca, and San Juan as these streets are narrow and considered fire lanes which must be kept open at all times for emergency vehicles. Parking **is permitted** on Del Monte, Del Rio and Del Campo as these streets are wider and able to accommodate emergency vehicles when cars are parked on the streets. As we move into the holiday season, family and friends can be more frequent visitors, guests are welcome to park at the clubhouse parking lot. 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

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
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Book Signing and Reception with Kirsten Mickelwait

The Clara of Astagalus Claranus

rare little flower grows in rural fields of Napa and Sonoma Counties. One might say that another flower grew and died in St. Helena, for she was a very interesting accomplished woman. Not many plants are named for women, but Astagalus Claranus, also known as Napa Milkvetch or Clara Hunt's Milkvetch, is named for St. Helena former resident Clara Adele Pike Blodgett Hunt.

Clara was the daughter of Edward and Lucy Pike and was born in Claremont, New Hampshire. She came to California when 12 years old. Before her marriage she was a successful school teacher in the East Bay. She was a great lover of flowers and had a liberal education in botany. She married her first husband, George Blodgett, in 1878 when she was 17. He died in 1883.

In 1891 she married her second husband, Daniel Otis Hunt, when she was 32 and he was 60. They made St. Helena their home. Her particular delight for many years was the study of wildflowers with which our hills and valleys abound. Her flower shows at her home or at Women's Improvement Club meetings were popular. Clara was past president of the Club and was interested in civic affairs. Her second husband died in 1915 at age 84 when she was 56.

Clara was a famous botanist in her day. A plant she discovered is named for her—
Astragalus Clarianus. The rare species of milkvetch is known by the common names Clara
Hunt's milkvetch and Napa milkvetch. It is endemic to northern California where it

is known from only four or five occurrences along the border between Sonoma and Napa Counties. It is a federally listed endangered species. Clara collected the first specimen in 1909 in Conn Valley. The discovery was confirmed in 1925.

Clara Hunt's milkvetch is a low-growing annual herb with white and purple flowers that typically appear in March and April. The plants have been found in grasslands and in openings of blue oak/manzanita woodland. The plants have been found on thin, rocky clay soils that are derived from volcanic or serpentine substrates. Six historical occurrences of Clara Hunt's milkvetch are recorded in the California Natural Diversity Database: five in Napa County and one in Sonoma County.



Although one occurrence of Clara Hunt's milk-vetch is protected with a conservation easement and another is located on State Park land, the other three occurrences that are presumed to still exist are all located on privately-owned land. These occurrences on privately-owned land continue to be at risk from direct loss or modification of habitat, primarily from agricultural or urban development. In addition, Clara Hunt's milkvetch could be impacted from recreational activities, uprooting by feral pigs, competition with introduced plant species, alterations in natural fire regime and climate change. Very small populations, such as those of Clara Hunt's milkvetch, can be especially vulnerable to extinction from natural and human-caused events.



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Merryvale Vineyards

all is in the air and rain has driven away another fire season. We're in the final stages of Harvest here in The Valley--what better time than now to go wine tasting. As we pulled into Merryvale Vineyards, they were busy sorting through grapes of the day's pickings. Several members of the crew sift through the grapes removing spoiled or overly dry grapes and clusters thus providing a cleaner, more pure flavor.

Merryvale started out as Sunnyhill Winery in 1933. Conveniently located next to the rail tracks, that allowed their wine to get to San Francisco and beyond. In the 1940's, it became a co-op for local winemakers and changed to Sunny St Helena Winery. In 1983 it started its history as Merryvale when a small group bottled their first vintage as Merryvale. In 1986 they purchased the building, beginning extensive renovations and renaming it to Merryvale Vineyards. Then in 1991 Jack Schlatter became a partner in the winery, and in 1996 Jack and family became the sole owners. Their first vineyard purchase was the land for Profile Vineyard which has become the basis for their signature wine. Renne, their son, became CEO in 2008 and continues the family's legacy.

Our tasting was indoors, as it was a rainy cool day. We started with their 2023 Sauvignon Blanc

Reserve. Aged 10 months in neutral oak, this showed a lot of grapefruit character. Very crisp acidity around a core fruit component. 2024 Pinot Noir Rosé from Stanley Ranch. This is available in a 1.5-liter bottle. Not a lot of bright pinot flavors, more tart and with subdued fruit. The 2023 Sun Chase Chardonnay comes from their most recent vineyard. It is located in the Petaluma Gap AVA in the Sonoma Coast. Aged 16 months in 30% new oak with some malolactic fermentation. Showed nice apple/pear fruit with a creamy vanilla note.



Our host, Monique, added the 2023 Sun Chase Pinot Noir to our lineup. From the same vineyard in the Petaluma Gap, this was a fairly rich Pinot with bright, dark, cherry fruit and rounded tannins. 2022 Chairman's Reserve Selection followed. A blend of 94% Cabernet Sauvignon and 6% Cabernet Franc. Blended and fermented to produce a stylish Cabernet Sauvignon with surprisingly soft tannins. Quite quaffable with bright dark fruit and a little tobacco on the finish. 2022 Reserve Cabernet Sauvignon was the last wine on our tasting list. This was 97% Cabernet with Petite Verdot rounding out the blend. All fruit was from their Profile Vineyard above Conn Creek Road. Rich and full bodied with bright cherryberry fruit. We asked for and were obliged with a taste of the 2023 Merlot for our finale. It's made with Napa Valley fruit from the Faust Vineyard in Combsville. Bright and layered with blueberry fruit and touches of cedar with a nice lingering finish.

There are several different tastings available here. Ours was the Winery Exclusive featuring many winery only wines. Cost was \$50 per person. We added a cheese and charcuterie plate for \$35. Also available is The Terroir Experience at \$80 and their Grand Cru Flight featuring the Profile Wines, for \$150. Merryvale is easily visited as they allow visitors to order a glass or a bottle as well. In the summer their patio features music on some evenings and, coming in January, a Trivia Night on the first and third Fridays through April. Cheers!

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Know Thy Neighbor

ur neighbor in the spotlight this month is a wine connoisseur after decades working in the restaurant and wine industries here in the Valley. He is happy to share his knowledge with our community, which he does monthly in the VIVA newsletter.

He was born in Livermore where his father was a physicist at the Livermore Lab doing fusion research seeking energy from fusion reactions. The lab had been doing this research since the 70s and "Dad loved this work!" The family moved to the Alamo area when our neighbor was five where he stayed until he left for college.

He is the oldest of three siblings, having two younger sisters. He remembers camping a lot as a family, going to Yosemite every year and climbing most of the peaks there. The family stayed in CA and later added Lake Tahoe to their camping destinations.

He describes his high school years as good as he made many friends and participated in student government.

Although he says he wasn't that interested in academics, he entered UC Berkley after high school where he completed a degree in Political Science. However he took a different path after graduation, choosing to enter the restaurant business rather than pursuing an area related to Political Science. "My family entertained a lot, and I learned to cook early."

His first venture was to start a small catering business in Laguna Beach with a good friend, which lasted for two years. He then worked in a series of restaurants, living in San Francisco, then Mill Valley for a couple of years.

He married his wife in 1985 and they had two children, Nathan, born in 1988, and Deana, born in 1991. Both of his adult children live in Oregon and they visit them frequently.

Our neighbor managed the California Cafe in Yountville for five years followed by a couple of years managing at Auberge du Soleil, the only restaurant in our area offering a grand view of the Valley blow from its hillside perch. He then moved on as General Manager at Piatti's, hoping to limit work during the daytime so he could spend more time with his family at night.

His next move involved employment as a salesperson at Redwood Vintners, a small wine distributor in Novato, followed by moving on to Southern Wines & Spirits, a national distributor. His day-to-day job at Southern meant driving to restaurants and hotels in downtown San Francisco. Our neighbor stayed with Southern for twenty-five years until his retirement six years ago in 2019.

He and his wife purchased their home in Vineyard Valley in 2015 and "we were weekenders from Vallejo for the next five years." Once he retired in 2019, he was able to spend most of the time in Napa. He intended to work part-time in a winery tasting room starting in 2020, but Covid put an end to that. In 2022 he was able to find a winery

to work for in Oakville for a couple days a week. He worked there regularly for two and a half years. Now, he just works there at random times when needed.

He is enjoying retirement and the freedom it provides to pursue what is meaningful to him at this stage of life. He enjoys living in Vineyard Valley and values his neighbors. He drives for Mollie's Angels one day a week, providing transportation to those who need it for appointments. He loves to garden and takes pride in the beautification of their property. He likes to read, enjoying mysteries and "all kinds of stuff, including what's going on in the world." He and his wife savor traveling, both nationally and internationally.

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
