

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## PARK MANAGEMENT UPDATES February 2025

#### PARK PROJECTS

The landscapers have been cleaning up between and during the February rain storms. Work continues on tree maintenance and limbing up. The corporation yard clean up and reorganization is ongoing. Due to predicted warm weather, the turf may be cut next week, February 24<sup>th</sup>.

Management is waiting for a scope of work and estimate for the lanai door to Redondo to be converted to an accessible door.

This is a reminder that a TV has been added to the gym for resident use with the capability to cast or mirror their personal workouts from their phone to the TV. The instructions to connect to the tv and the wifi login information are posted in the gym. If you have any issues connecting to the tv from your phone, please call the office during office hours for assistance.

#### FIRE SEASON PREPAREDNESS

At the end of January, Assistant Fire Chief Alec Vidler met with Frank, our Operations Manager, to walk through the common areas - Clubhouse, Landscaper's Workshop, Workshop Yard, Woodshop, Gym, and Corp Yard. Alec reported that all areas were clean, safe, with good signage and equipped with multiple Fire Extinguishers. All park vehicles are also equipped with Fire Extinguishers. Vineyard Valley has multiple water reserves on property in the pool and lagoon that could be utilized by the Fire Department. All the common buildings are equipped with roof sprinklers during fire season.

Review of the Park trees – staff has limbed up a great number of trees and should continue this practice of limbing up trees. To slow the progression of embers, residents are requested to keep bushes and hedges trimmed well below the bottom limbs of trees.

The few remaining Juniper Bushes will be removed from the park as they are highly flammable. All Hollywood Juniper trees in Vineyard Valley will be removed before fire season. These trees are classified as highly combustible because they contain volatile oils.

The Homes in Vineyard Valley - are for the most part clean and free of debris. However some carports are being used as a storage area for cardboard boxes, which creates a fire hazard, especially in high winds with embers. Each home has a garden, bushes should be kept below roof height and the ground clear of weeds.

Roofs and gutters should be regularly cleaned to keep dry debris off the home.

Management appreciates Assistant Fire Chief Alec Vidler taking time to visit the Park and make recommendations.

## Flyboys: Octogenarians Fly from Napa to South America

In a great feat of adventure, 81 year old Dean Stahr and 79 year old Bill Savidge flew to the tip of South America in a small Cessna Skyland two seat airplane in 2007. Sounds risky? But these two aviation fanatics planned every hour of their adventure and had an experienced ground crew to monitor their every move.

This was not a one-off event. Dean Stahr flew to Scotland alone in 1999. In 2004 he flew to Hawaii, but the biggest trip of all was in 2005 when Dean flew around the world in the same Cessna Skylane. He was gone 51 days and flew 188 hours, using the same ground crew. This time he invited Bill to join him.

The 26 year old plane was modified by removing the rear seats for extra fuel tanks, doubling the time between refueling. This made the plane overweight, requiring approval from FAA. Dwight Small, a retired pilot, would monitor the weather for them. With modern GPS technology the aircraft autopilot did much of the flying for them.

Dean and Bill departed on Jan 29, 2007 from Napa Airport for Tucson, AZ to meet with Dwight Small.

During a eight-week flying adventure the pair made a total of 19 stops as flew down one coast of South America and back up the other side. They stopped in Mexico, Costa Rica, Panama, Ecuador, Peru, Santiago and Puerto Montt, Chile, Rio Gallegos and Viedma, Argentina, Salvador, Recife and Belem, Brazil, Trinidad, the Virgin Islands, the Bahamas, Albuquerque and Nut Tree Airport in Vacaville.

On the last Sunday in March, 2007 Bill and Dean landed at Napa Airport. There to meet them were 60 of their closest friends, a three-piece band and the Mayor of St. Helena Del Britton.

Their ground crew virtual co-pilot Dwight Small sent out frequent emails keep their supporters updated. The pair carried a satellite phone to maintain contact with Small in Arizona. They had to report their location every hour, or a search party would look for them. They flew during the day and landed each night for eight weeks in a different location. Both men were experienced pilots. Dean (who owned the plane) did the takeoffs and landings, while Bill did the flying. To stave off cabin fever, each had their own hotel room. Neither of them spoke Spanish, but they encountered English speakers at every control tower, except in Viedma, Argentina. They used flash cards with common phrases to communicate with airport crews.

Bill was robbed on the beach in Salvador, Brazil. He was walking alone on a deserted beach. Two young men approached carrying a large rock. Without speaking the men searched Bill's pockets. They took his watch, hotel key, about five dollars in local currency, a safe deposit key and a photocopy of his passport. As they left they handed back the safe deposit key. Stunned and not able to speak Portuguese, Bill said "gracias". Otherwise they had a great time!

Bill joined Army Air Corps determined to become a pilot, but was told he was too young and needed 2 years of college. They sent him to Stanford University. Just after he flew solo for the first time, the US dropped the atomic bombs on Japan in August 1945 and the war in the Pacific was over. Later Bill joined the Air Force around the time of the Korean War. After 24 years in the Air Force, Bill retired in 1972 as full colonel and moved to St. Helena with his wife and daughter. He served on city council, boards and committees, Kiwanis Club, Rianda House Board and the food pantry.

Until recently he lived at 7 San Lucas Court.





## Failla Winery

This month, we decided to visit a winery that features my favorite grape variety, Pinot Noir. Failla Winery is located North of St Helena, off the Silverado Trail. Their mailbox marks the driveway that is located across the street from Rombauer Winery. Failla is an unusual winery for the Napa Valley, in that it produces cool climate wines, specializing in Pinot Noir and Chardonnay. As a cool-climate producer, their vineyards are all located near the coast, with their Estate Vineyard in the Sonoma Coast appellation. Ehren Jordan is the owner/winemaker and has made wine for Turley and Neyers. An interesting twist is that neither of those wines can be considered "cool climate". Wines are sourced from some of the best Pinot Noir and Chardonnay vineyards, such as Hudson, Peay and Hirsch. There is also a winery in Oregon in the Willamette Vally, sourcing grapes from vineyards in that area. Ehren is a big fan of Cement Egg Fermenters, with most wines having at least partial cement fermentation. This technique helps develop a lush, refined style.

Our tasting started with a sparkling wine, a 2016 Brut "2G", which is new to their production. The "2G" refers to the 2 grams of sugar added to the dosage. Delicious and balanced with a smooth mouth feel. Two whites followed, a Chenin Blanc and a Chardonnay. The Chenin was from Santa Ynez in Santa Barbara County. Rich and bright fruit with a touch of minerality. Reuling Vineyard Chardonnay, from the Sonoma Coast, is rich with delicious bright fruit. The subtle complexity of the wine makes an appealing quaff. They offered a Rosé from their Oregon winery as an extra treat to the tasting. Dry, with restrained fruit flavors, not overly fruity as many Pinot Rosé's are.





Next up were three Pinot Noirs, all from Sonoma Coast Appellation. Stella is a blend of four vineyards. A step up from their 'Sonoma Coast' bottling, this is very accessible with great fruit forward notes and balance. Peay Vineyards is always a notable wine in my book. Complex and full of cherry and red berry flavors, this can be a mouthful. The 2022 vintage is showing more subtle tannins and is very approachable now. Last was a Platt Vineyard Pinot. This had a fair amount of tannin to go with the lush fruit flavors. Probably a year away from being ideal, it is still a beautiful wine to drink. As a special treat, they





brought out a 2020 Savoy Vineyard from Anderson Vally. The extra years of

aging have let this develop into a beautiful wine with some tannin that is offset with rich tart fruit.

The tasting room is in an older house with lots of wood-paneled walls in a slightly funky style. On warm days (which we did not have) they offer seating outside on the patio. The cost for the basic tasting is \$65 per person. They have a cellar experience as well, which showcases their hillside cave at \$90. I highly recommend this winery when you want to try some lighter-styled wines (Pinot & Chardonnay) and stay close to home.

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# Know Thy Neighbor

Where have an energetic, well-known neighbor in the spotlight this month who has been a resident of Vineyard Valley for nineteen years! She was born in Seattle shortly after her mother was evacuated from a military base at Dutch Harbor where her father was stationed. He served in both World Wars, first as a foot soldier, next war as a dentist. Her mother was a part time realtor and pharmacist, likely the first female pharmacist in CA.

When our neighbor was two, the family moved to Carmel to a home that her mother had built before she was married. They stayed there for four years during which time her younger sister was born. It was also a time of meeting what would turn out to be a lifelong friend. "We became best buddies!" Diane Barr.

The family moved again when our neighbor was six to Fairbanks, Alaska "by ship, car, and airplane" to join her father, who was working there as a dentist. He died unexpectedly when our neighbor was thirteen.

The family then returned to the house in Carmel where she attended high school "I tried out for several sports but never made a team except for bowling!" After completing high school, she attended a community college in Monterey followed by attending San Francisco State College, "where I graduated with an MRS degree," i.e., marrying before completing college. After twenty years, the couple were divorced. She had two daughters who were still living at home at the time of the divorce.

She then applied to Fresno State College where she completed her BA in English, attending night classes as she was working full time as a legal secretary, plus raising their two daughters. Despite her already busy schedule she found time for several volunteer activities – Girl Scouts, Room Mother at her daughter's school, Rainbow Girl's leader, etc.

She was introduced by a neighbor to her current husband, and discovered he worked in Admissions at Fresno State and had two children at home. Also, that he was a Minister prior to taking the job at the College. They dated for quite a while, six years, "because we didn't want to do 'The Brady Bunch'" i.e., blending the two families while the children were still young. Eventually they eloped, taking the children with them! They have now been married for 37 years.

After they married her husband decided he wanted to return to the ministry after years working in Admissions. "I had some great times following him around to different churches during those years of his ministry! I retired first, then he retired and in February 2006 we moved to Vineyard Valley. I found my childhood 'best buddy' there. We again lived on the same street and were close before she died a few years ago."

One of her daughters "lives five minutes away "in the Meadowood area with her husband (Anne Gridley's son) and travels extensively visiting wineries as the US rep for Riedel Crystal. Her second daughter lives with her family in Washington state, a consultant in the health care arena. Our neighbor and her husband have six grandchildren between them,

two in Washington State and four in Florida. They occasionally have family gatherings "and everyone gets along just fine," she says with some pride in her voice.

Asked what she enjoys doing now, it seems that volunteer activities are at the top of the list! She is the facilitator of the weekly Ladies Tea at Rianda House and is also part of an early morning exercise group there. In addition, she is active in the Congregational Care Committee at the local Presbyterian Church. In the past she was very active in multiple committees and the Board here in Vineyard Valley.


Joining together to share thoughts and suggestions can be a fun and enlightening experience. Tea and a healthy snack will be provided.

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


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
