Omicron Phi Zeta Chapter and Women of the Dove Foundation Trailblazer for the Advancement of Change, Equity and Social Justice (Trailblazer) Book Scholarship

On January 16, 1920, Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated was founded on the campus of Howard University by five visionary women who dared to depart from the traditional coalitions for black women and sought to establish a new organization based on the precepts of Scholarship, Service, Sisterhood, and Finer Womanhood.

In furtherance of the vision of the founders, the Omicron Phi Zeta Chapter was chartered on March 26, 1994. Since its chartering, almost 32 years ago, the Omicron Phi Zeta chapter members have supported a variety of causes and organizations, in addition to the sorority's national initiatives. Omicron Phi Zeta Chapter is an award-winning chapter for its commitment to Z-HOPE™ projects, involvement with its youth auxiliary and undergraduate chapter, Xi Sigma at The George Washington University.

The Women of the Dove Foundation (WDF) is the 501(c)(3) organization that partners with Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated, Omicron Phi Zeta Chapter. WDF is dedicated to improving the quality of life for individuals and families in local, national, and global communities. Every year, the foundation sponsors events to raise funds for WDF scholarships and other charitable causes.

We are pleased to announce the 2026 Trailblazer for the Advancement of Change, Equity and Social Justice (Trailblazer) Book Scholarship. This scholarship will be awarded to a female student interested in the field of criminal justice, government, pre-law, public policy, or political science. In addition, she must be graduating from a District of Columbia or Metropolitan area High School and enrolling in an institution of higher learning in the Fall of 2026. The institution may include a college, university, or trade school. Scholarship awardees will be notified by May 1, 2026, of their selection to receive a scholarship. The award recipient or representative of the awardee must be available June 7, 2026, to attend the reception to accept the award.

THE SCHOLARSHIP

This book scholarship will be awarded in the amount of \$1000 to one (1) student graduating from high school. The student must also be enrolled in the Fall 2026 academic semester. Proof of attendance must be on the university/college letterhead and must be on the university/college letterhead, with your student identification number and the address to the financial aid department, must be received by email or postmarked by mail by August 22, 2026, to receive the disbursement.



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ELIGIBILITY

Each applicant must:

- Be a female resident of the District of Columbia or surrounding Metropolitan area;
- Graduating from an accredited high school in the Washington, D.C. Metropolitan area at the end of the 2025-2026 academic school year;
- Plans to pursue a major in criminal justice, government, pre-law, public policy, or political science in college or university;
- Grade Point Average (GPA) of 2.75 or above at the time of application submission; and,
- Consideration will be given to those with financial need, academic achievement, and service to community.

REQUIREMENTS

Applicants must submit the following items:

- 1. Completed typed, written (legible print) or computer-generated application form.
- 2. A 250-word essay addressing this topic:

Members of Zeta Phi Beta Sorority, Incorporated are known as trailblazers. For example, one of the organization's founders, Pearl Anna Neal, was the first African American woman to obtain a Master's in music in the State of New York. Violette Anderson, Past International President, was the first African American woman to be sworn into practice law before the United States Supreme Court.

- a. If you could use your college degree to address a social or systemic issue, which issue would you address?
- b. Why did you select this social or systemic issue?
- c. How would you address or eradicate social or systemic issue?
- 3. A current, official (sealed) copy of your high school transcript. An electronic unofficial transcript is also acceptable.
- 4. A 150-200-word bio.
- 5. Two (2) letters of recommendation. Recommendations can be obtained from a current or former teacher, guidance counselor, principal, pastor, employer, coach, or extracurricular activities director. *Please note that ALL recommendations must be received by the due date for your application package to be reviewed.*
- 6. Application Package Completion Checklist.

DEADLINE

- The Application package is due on **April 5**, **2026**, **at 11:59 pm**.
- **Incomplete scholarship applications will not be considered**. Please submit all materials together including the Application Package Completion Checklist. <u>Please</u>
