

Preparing for disasters is something your family should do together!

The first step is **knowing what types of disasters are most common** where you live. Hoosiers should be prepared for extreme weather events, such as tornadoes and floods.

Create a **disaster readiness kit** and keep items in a plastic tub with an airtight lid. Make sure everyone in the family knows where your kit is stored.

Essential Items		
<ul> <li>Bar Soap</li> <li>Battery powered radio with batteries</li> <li>Blankets</li> <li>Credit cards and a small cash supply</li> <li>Eyeglasses</li> <li>First-aid kit</li> <li>Flashlights with batteries</li> <li>Children's toys, books, crayons, etc.</li> <li>Insect repellant</li> <li>Items to care for young children</li> <li>List of important phone numbers</li> <li>Map of the area</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Masking tape</li> <li>Matches</li> <li>Non-electric can opener</li> <li>Personal identification information</li> <li>Plastic utensils, plates, cups</li> <li>Prescription medications</li> <li>Spare car keys</li> <li>Spare clothing for each family member</li> <li>Sunscreen</li> <li>Toothpaste and toothbrushes</li> <li>Utility knife</li> <li>Water (3 gallons per family member)</li> </ul>	
Three-day Supply of Food (Per Person)	Special Considerations for Pets	
<ul> <li>Peanut butter and jelly (or alternative if peanut allergies)</li> <li>Canned fruits, vegetables, meats, etc.</li> <li>Crackers and granola bars</li> <li>Powdered or single serve drinks</li> </ul>	<ul> <li>Food (two-week supply)</li> <li>A traveling cage</li> <li>Drinking water</li> <li>List of shelters accepting animals in the event of a disaster</li> </ul>	

Make sure children can **identify danger signals** such as smoke alarms, carbon monoxide detectors, and tornado sirens. Explain and demonstrate how to call for help during an emergency.

In the event of an **evacuation**, tell your children where to meet outside of your home. Also, complete a child identification card, which can be invaluable in the event disaster strikes and your family becomes separated. These are great items to place in school backpacks or diaper bags.
