

- Research potential scholarships and start building a résumé.

IS COLLEGE WORTH IT?

Is College Worth It?

The Short Answer

College can be a great investment, but it's not always the best choice for every student. The key is understanding the cost, earning potential, and job opportunities before committing to a degree.

Breaking It Down: The Cost of College

Average Total Cost of College

- Community College (In-State): \$3,860
- Public 4-Year College (In-State): \$27,146
- Public 4-Year College (Out-of-State): \$45,708
- Private 4-Year College: \$58,628



Hidden Costs



Total Cost for a 4-Year Degree (Before Aid & Loans)

- Public In-State: \$108,584
- Public Out-of-State: \$182,832
- Private: \$234,512

When College Makes Sense (And When It Doesn't)

College is a **Good** Investment If:



- The degree leads to high-paying, high-growth careers (STEM, Healthcare, Business).
- The student receives financial aid, scholarships, or grants to minimize debt.
- The student is committed to finishing a degree (not dropping out halfway).

College Might Not Be the Best Choice If:



- The degree has low job demand or low salary potential (some liberal arts majors).
- The student is unsure about their career path and taking on debt.
- A trade school, apprenticeship, or industry certification leads to a betterpaying job with less debt.

Takeaway

College can be worth it, but only if the degree justifies the cost.



What About Trade Schools?

What About Trade Schools?

The Short Answer

Trade schools offer **faster**, **cheaper**, **and job-focused** education. Many careers in **skilled trades**, **technology**, **and healthcare** pay well without a degree.

What Trade Schools Offer vs. Traditional College

Time to Complete	6 months-2 years	4+ years
Job Readiness	Hands-on, job-ready training	Broad education, may require more schooling

Instead, he pursued a trade school program to earn his HVAC license, setting himself up for a high-demand career in heating, ventilation, and air conditioning. Now, as a licensed HVAC technician, Gabriel is financially independent, earning \$50,000+ annually, and has a clear path for career growth. His journey proves that success comes in many forms—and for Gabriel, choosing a skilled trade was the key to building a stable and rewarding future.


What About the Military?

The Short Answer

The military offers **structured career paths**, **education benefits**, **and leadership training**. It can be a strong option for students seeking discipline, financial stability, and career development while serving their country.

Key Benefits of Military Service:

- ▼Tuition Assistance & GI Bill Covers college costs, trade school programs, and certifications.
- Career Training Hands-on experience in high-demand fields.
- ✓ **Steady Pay & Benefits** Includes housing, healthcare, and retirement plans.
- ✓ **Leadership & Discipline** Builds teamwork, responsibility, and decision-making skills.
- ✓ Travel & Global Experience Opportunities to work in different locations worldwide.



Approximately 79% of enlisted military personnel **receive tuition assistance**, allowing them to earn degrees with **little to no student debt!**

Takeaway

The military is more than just combat—it provides career training, financial security, and long-term growth opportunities.

- Largest branch with diverse career options.

- Focuses on maritime operations, technology, and global defense.
- Specialties: Aviation, Nuclear Energy, Medical, IT, Mechanics.
- Deploys worldwide with strong travel opportunities.



U.S. Air Force

- Dominates in air, space, and cyber operations.
- Specialties: Piloting, Cybersecurity, Engineering, Space Systems, Communications.
- Offers strong college tuition programs and technical training.

How Can I Guide My Child Into Meaningful Careers?

The Short Answer

Parents don't need to have all the answers. The goal is to **help** your child discover their interests, strengths, and career options—while making informed financial decisions.

3 Best Ways to Help Your Child Explore Interests & Strengths

Career & Personality Assessments

Have them take interest and strength-based quizzes:

- O*NET Interest Profiler (career matching)
- 16 Personalities Career Quiz (work style insights)
- ASVAB Career Exploration Program (great for military-bound students)
 - o Discuss the results and connect them to real career paths.

Why It Works: These tools give students direction by aligning careers with their natural strengths.

Encourage Exploration Without Pressure

Have them take interest and strength-based quizzes:

- Let them try different electives, clubs, or extracurriculars (robotics, music, debate, etc.).
- Support side projects or hobbies (coding, art, entrepreneurship).
- Avoid forcing a set career path—help them explore freely.

Why It Works: Hands-on experiences build confidence and allow them to develop their strengths naturally.

Leverage School Opportunities & Campus Visits

Have them take interest and strength-based guizzes:


- Encourage them to take advantage of career & technical education (CTE) courses, dual credit, or AP classes to explore different subjects.
- Attend college, trade school, and military recruiter visits hosted by their school.
- Explore career fairs, on-campus workshops, and job exploration events offered by the school district.

Why It Works: Schools provide free access to career exploration resources, helping students experience different paths without commitment or cost..

Parents should ask

- ✓ What jobs are in demand in our area? (Check local workforce trends.)
- ✓ What industries are growing nationwide? (Check <u>CareerOneStop</u> for job outlook data.)

What **NOT** to do

- X Push a career just because it pays well if your child has no interest in it.
- X Assume that college = success—some careers don't require a degree and still pay well.

Takeaway

Help your child explore careers by connecting their interests to real opportunities, balancing passion with practicality, and encouraging exploration without pressure.

What If My Child Doesn't Know What They Want to Do?


The Short Answer

It's completely normal for a student not to have everything figured out by graduation. Parents can guide them through exploration without pressuring them.

Option 1: Explore Multiple Career Paths Before Committing

Some students need extra time to discover what interests them.

- ✓Internships & Part-Time Jobs Experience different industries without commitment.
- ✓ Community College First A low-cost way to earn general education credits while deciding on a career.
- ✓ Apprenticeships & Work-Based Learning Earn while learning skills on the job.
- ▼Trade Schools or Certificate Programs Short-term, high-pay job training without long-term debt.



About **30-40%** of high school graduates delay college or career training because they're unsure what to pursue, making career exploration and gap year planning valuable options!

Option 2: Consider a Gap Year (The Right Way)

Good Reasons



Career & Education Clarity

Taking time to explore interests through internships, job shadowing, or volunteering can help students make a more informed career or college choice.





No Clear Plan

Without a structured plan (work, volunteering, or skill-building), a gap year can turn into wasted time.



Financial Readiness

Working for a year allows students to save money, reducing future college debt or helping fund trade school expenses.



Avoiding Responsibility

If a gap year is just an excuse to do nothing, it can lead to a lack of direction and lost momentum.



Personal Growth & Maturity

A gap year can build independence, problem-solving skills, and responsibility, making students more prepared for adulthood.



Risk of Losing Motivation

Many students struggle to return to school or career training after a year away, making re-entry challenging



Gaining Real-World Experience

Learning life skills like budgeting, time management, and workplace professionalism can provide a strong foundation for future success.



Financial Instability

Without a job or structured plan, a gap year can add financial strain rather than provide a stepping stone toward independence

The Parent's Role How to Guide Without Micromanaging

How to Guide Without Micromanaging



The Balance Between Support & Independence

As parents, the goal is to provide guidance without making decisions for them. Instead of controlling, help them develop confidence and decision-making skills.



Signs of Over-Micromanaging

- Doing all the research and applications for your child
- Pushing a specific career path without considering their interests
- Making major financial decisions (college loans, job offers) without their input

✓ Better Approach: Coaching Instead of Controlling

Controlling	Coaching	
"You have to go to college."	"Let's compare options and see what's best for you."	
"You need to study engineering."	"I noticed you're great at problem-solving, do you want to explore engineering?	
"I'll handle your job applications."	"Let's review your applications together so you feel confident."	
"You're not joining the military. It's too dangerous."	"Let's talk to a recruiter and explore the benefits and commitments.	
"You're going into business because it pays well."	"You seem interested in entrepreneurship let's research business careers and other options."	
"College is too expensive, so you're going straight to work."	"If cost is a concern, let's look at scholarships, trade schools, and community college options."	
"If you don't go to college, you'll struggle in life."	"Let's look at career paths with and without a degree so you can make an informed choice."	

Takeaway

Your child needs your guidance, but also needs to take ownership of their future.

Key Questions to Ask School Counselors, Employers, and Recruiters

- Talking to School Counselors (College & Career Planning)
- √ What scholarships does my child qualify for?
- √ What dual credit or AP courses are available to reduce college costs?
- √ What are the best local internship or job-shadowing opportunities?
- √ Does my child qualify for industry certifications before graduation?
- √ What's the timeline for college applications, FAFSA, and SAT/ACT tests?
- Talking to Employers & Career Mentors (If considering workforce entry)
- √ What skills or certifications do you look for in entry-level employees?
- √ Are there paid apprenticeships or training programs available?
- √ What's the best way for a high school graduate to stand out in job applications?
- √ How can my child gain work experience while still in school?
- ✓ Talking to Military Recruiters (If considering enlistment)
- √ What ASVAB score is needed for different military roles?
- √ What educational and job training benefits does the military offer?
- √ Can my child combine military service with college funding?
- √ What does a typical career path look like in this branch of the military?

Takeaway

Parents should **empower their child to ask these questions directly** while also helping them **understand the answers and make informed decisions.**

Steps to Take Before Graduation

- ☑ Discuss career interests & strengths Use career quizzes, job shadowing, or mentorship.
- ☑ Research job market trends Explore high-demand, high-wage careers.
- ✓ Develop soft skills Encourage communication, time management, and professionalism.
- Set up a professional email & LinkedIn profile First impressions matter!


