Americanism – A word on Americanism



There are a few things that we all know very well in November, such as Veterans Day and Thanksgiving. As members of The American Legion Family, there are a few more we should be aware of, namely American Education Week and National Family Week.

American Education Week, Nov. 17-23, the week before Thanksgiving week. This week is a time when all who work in public schools — teachers, administrative staff, cafeteria workers, bus drivers, substitute teachers and many others — are recognized for providing quality education and support to today's youth. Each day for American Education Week has a theme and the National Education Association website has ideas on ways American Legion Family members can celebrate each day.

American Legion Committee on Youth Education Chairman Michael Westergren said, "American Education Week is an opportunity to celebrate public education and honor individuals who are making a difference in ensuring that every student receives a quality education. This week is a time to celebrate the American education system, and we should use it to look at different ways Legionnaires can be promoting our values within the classroom."

Those ideas include:

- Provide an outdoor class on flag education.
- Allow students to interview you as a veteran.
- Promote the American Legion School Award program to recognize students who demonstrate strong qualities of character and good citizenship.

National Family Week, Nov. 24-30. For more than 45 years, the week of Thanksgiving has been proclaimed National Family Week. A guiding principle of The American Legion's Children & Youth programs is maintaining the integrity of the family. During National Family Week, the American Legion Family is encouraged to promote and celebrate healthy families and communities.

Legion posts can host a family-friendly festival that includes fun children-specific activities such as face painting, bounce houses and games; conduct a community family project; invite families to a meal at the post to initiate strong communication; or host a military appreciation event. A Milestone Moment for Our Arizona COTA Family

As Detachment Commander, It is with profound gratitude and hope that I share a milestone moment for our Arizona COTA initiative. Our very first COTA Kid, 15-year-old Desi, received a life-saving kidney transplant today. After a 5%-hour surgical procedure, Desi is now on the path to recovery—a journey made possible by the unwavering support of our Legion family and the compassion that fuels our mission. This marks the first time our Arizona team has been able to directly help a child in need since we began raising funds last year, and it's a testament to what unity, purpose, and persistence can achieve.

Many of you may remember the dinner last year where PDC Michael F Bryant and I were able to introduce Desi's family to Rick Lofgren from COTA. In under a year, Rick and his team were able to enroll Desi into the program and help locate a matching kidney donor. Today's successful surgery is not just a medical victory—it's a moment of legacy for every single member who has supported our cause whether it be monetary or by sharing our fundraising efforts with people they know. Now, more than ever, we must keep the momentum going. Our current Side x Side raffle is a critical part of that effort. I urge each of you to share the QR code far and wide—friends, family, coworkers, social media—every scan brings us closer to raising more LIFE SAVING funds for children right here in Arizona. Let's make sure Desi is just the first of many.
