N.E.C. Report

First, I want to thank the Detachment of Arizona for allowing me to represent you at the 2023 Washington Conference. I was honored to be able to place our wreath, on your behalf, beneath the Arizona pillar at the World War II memorial. And I was humbled to attend meetings of The American Legion and to walk the halls of congress, meeting with our elected lawmakers to garner support for legislation benefitting our veterans. For those who don't know, that is all part of the responsibility of being chosen to place the wreath. A full day of wreath laying and honoring our fallen heroes, the meetings, the visit to Capitol Hill, all of that is expected. And I was proud to do it.

The first day was wreath day. This year, we had our largest turnout to date. We filled 3 busses with members of the Legion Family with wreaths to place. We first went to Arlington National Cemetery. Although I have been there many times since I was a small child, it never ceases to tug at my heartstrings. Point of personal privilege – my uncle is buried at Arlington. Along with Department Membership Director Steve Sperl, I took a few minutes to visit his grave. It's the first time I have been able to pay my respects since he passed. We certainly got in our steps that morning, it was quite a trek. But we made it back to hallowed grounds of the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier in plenty of time for the SAL wreath placement. National Commander Carlton and his wife Veronica, along with two young SAL members, placed a wreath at the Tomb. We then met up with other members of the Arizona delegation who had attended the ceremony. Before we went back to board the busses, we were afforded some insight into the "Old Guard", the detail you see guarding the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier. It was a very interesting Q&A about the inner workings of serving in that capacity. We then departed to the Viet Nam wall. After a brief lunch, wreaths were placed at the wall. We then moved on to the World War II Memorial, where I placed the Arizona wreath. Then, along with the Arizona delegation, we visited the rest of the World War II Memorial and walked to the Lincoln Memorial.

Day 2 was meetings. I was fortunate to be able to attend meetings with Department Commander Simon and Department Membership Director Sperl. The first meeting we attended was the National Finance Commission meeting. It was enlightening and really fascinating to hear not only the current financial status of the National Organization of The American Legion, but to hear what steps are being taken to improve their status and the long-term process changes designed to keep the organization on track and move it into the future. We also attended the National Security Commission meeting, chaired by Arizona's own Matt Shuman. There were addresses by the Legion's National Commander and the Auxiliary National President. Then we were able to hear a presentation by the keynote speaker, R. Clarke Cooper. Mr. Cooper is the former U.S. Assistant Secretary of State for Political – Military Affairs. As he put it, he shared some personal perspectives, and America's posture in the world and the navigation of our global interests. His presentation included everything from our withdrawal from Afghanistan to our role in the Russian/Ukraine war. There was a comparison to events in World War II to what is happening now in the world. A running theme throughout, was an ancient Roman term, "Acta, non verba". Action, not words. It was a truly enlightening presentation. And a big thank you to Mr. Shuman for obtaining the full transcript for me to use in this presentation. I didn't want to misrepresent what was said.

Finally, we were at day 3. The day began with the Commander's Call. This is a gathering involving everyone attending the conference. There were reports and presentations given that both summarized things that had already happened, and prepared us for the trip to the Hill. When we got to the Hill, we went as a group to various congressional offices. For me, it was especially fun because we had a large number of first time attendees. Their enthusiasm was infectious and I felt we all had a great attitude about our mission. Sometimes we were packed inside a small office, sometimes we were out in the hall. No matter what, the message was delivered. And the feedback was very positive. The only disappointment was with the number of Congress people we were not able to meet with. But I want all of you to know, we did our best to represent you, The American Legion Family, and the great state of Arizona with everything we did.

Next years class, some changes will be made to the program to reserve a 2nd cabin for our female staff and female cadets, which is an additional cost to the program of approx. \$15,000.00. Our current lodging has all staff and cadets, including classroom in one large lodge, making a 9 day stay cramped. This additional lodge will help with keeping everyone safe as we are liable for the safety and welfare of those who participate in our great program.

Camp Insurance is approx. \$500.00 which covers our liability for any unforeseen incidents.



ALLECA Class 2022 Summary

The American Legion Law Enforcement Career Academy (ALLECA) is sponsored by the American Legion and the Arizona Department of Public Safety (AZDPS). ALLECA was established in 1981 and has now reached its 41st year. The program provides our youth a firsthand look at the role of a police officer in promoting and safeguarding America's freedom and rights. This week-long academy is described as a "mini police academy" for 11–19-year-old kids interested in a law enforcement and/or military career.

ALLECA Class 2022 was hosted at Emmanuel Pines Camp located at 3000 Spence Spring Road, Prescott, Arizona. The academy had 52 ALLECA cadets, 14 sworn peace officers from five different agencies, and two retired sworn staff members (Director Matt "Gator" Griffis and Administrator Lori Wait). Discipline is strict with vigorous physical training, running, and calisthenics included. Accountability is strictly enforced for the duration of the camp. In Class 2022, a cadet advisor was demoted back to the rank of cadet for holding a cadet back after the class was released for a break. Staff immediately reported the incident, and the Class Commanders provided a counseling session to the cadet and explained the consequences of his actions. The cadet successfully completed the academy without any further incidents.

One applicant did not attend the academy due having flu-like symptoms the day prior to reporting to the academy. The cadets and staffs' safety, health and well-being are the utmost importance during that academy. If cadets or staff are not healthy, they are dismissed from academy to heal and recover at home.

ALLECA Class 2022, had 52 individuals check in. During the week, these individuals faced challenges, they were tired, they were tested, they were disciplines, they worked as a team, and they were mentored by the finest officers in the state. Fast-forward to Saturday, June 18, 2022, ALLECA Class 2022 graduated as a team of mature, strong, dependable cadets. Thank you for your support in providing our youth a glimpse of a career in law enforcement and/or the military. Without your continued support, this academy would not exist.





ALLECA Program Class Descriptions

Americanism-Citizenship, a class about history evolving around military, wars and leaders discussing Citizenship, freedom, respect, and the American Flag. A class about proper flag etiquette, displaying and folding is a hands-on class allowing the student to participate in practice. This is one part of the American Legion Four Pillars. The American Legion believes that our young people have a strong sense of patriotism and a high regard for law and order. The objective of the American Legion Law Enforcement Career Academy (ALLECA) is to provide a firsthand look at the role of a police officer in promoting and safeguarding America's freedom and rights.

Career Building, a class about how to apply for college (the pros & cons to include cost), what to expect and where it can lead to, choosing how you want to live your life in today's society. Military and Law Enforcement expectations and requirements. What choices you make now, will prohibit you from a career in law enforcement (drugs, criminal activity, arrests).

Distracted Driving, a class about the hazards of distracted driving that young drivers are faced with while operating a motor vehicle, State law and recommendations to attend local driver training for teens are discussed. This is not an actual driving class, discussion only.

What Not To Do When Driving, a class about the consequences and aftermath of distracted driving, road rage, racing and other hazardous traffic violations. As new drivers, teenagers are often distracted by cellphones, social media videos, and passengers. This class provides a realistic picture of the consequences of distracted driving. Class discussion only.

DUI-Underage, a class about the hazards of drinking and driving, along with underage alcoholic beverage consumption risks, state laws and penalties, video, and photos of graphic scenes to reinforce the lecture. A hands-on impaired driver simulation with distorted vision and balance are applied for demonstration purposes.

Gangs, a class about gang criminal activity, affiliations, and investigations, with video and photos. A handson scenario role play with class participation.

Narcotics (UC), a class about illegal narcotics investigation and arrest techniques with video and photos, hands-on interaction of role-playing and problem solving, state and federal laws and penalties. Demonstration with a narcotic drug police dog when available.

Firearms Safety, a pre-class lecture about the safe handling of a firearm, consequences and police training involving handgun and patrol rifle. All firearms used in this class are "SAFE TRAINING" simulation weapons called Air-Soft Simulation Training Firearms, which are air powered that project a soft sponge like pellet for realistic effects of target placement. Safety eyeglasses and protective face masks are utilized for this hands-on training. This class is closely monitored by assigned staff. This class will coincide with other role play and simulation training involving the use of firearms that are frequent in Law Enforcement.

Active Shooter, a hands-on class discussion about police responses and responsibilities involving an active shooter situation, followed with role-play as violator, victim and officer are implied in this type of scenario-based training. Obligation to protect and render first aid is a priority in this training.





High Risk Stops, involving police response to potentially life threating situations involving dangerous suspects on foot or in a vehicle, hands-on role play scenario-based training exercise involving police tactics, arrest, and firearms handling.

Team Building, a huge part of our program that teaches the class to work together both physically and mentally while encouraging motivation and willingness to succeed, physical activities such as team challenges, squad and class unity while maintain discipline amongst the class ranks and self-respect and confidence.

SWAT-EOD, a class discussion about the response and job of being a SWAT or Bomb officer, demonstrations, and hands on display of specialized equipment used by tactical units in Law Enforcement and Military.

Being Bullied, a class discussion about the state laws against Bulling, consequences and results, prevention and education, hands-on role-play, and interaction with students. Bullying is unwanted, aggressive behavior among school aged children that involves a real or perceived power imbalance. The behavior is repeated, or has the potential to be repeated, over time. Both kids who are bullied and who bully others may have serious, lasting problems.

Crime Scene Management, a class discussion about police investigations involving the securing of a crime scene, practices and procedures used, collection of evidence and witnesses, crime lab procedures and types of tools and technology used to solve crimes, prosecution, and conviction.

Defensive Tactics (DT), a physical class about use of force, control and arrest tactics, self-defense and survival, teaching approach, stance, verbal and physical escalation and de-escalation techniques with basic punching, kicking, arm-locks and handcuffing.
