


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word used meant to the writers, which may be more or different than your own understanding. It can be very helpful with unfamiliar customs such as the kosher laws or how biblical altars were used and constructed, or the meaning of biblical names.

Study Bible. This is a very common tool man people have, but also one of the hardest to be able to effectively evaluate. Simply put, a study Bible is a Bible that contains not only the books of the Bible, but other articles, notes and tools to aid the reader. They generally include maps, short concordances, comments, charts that tie verses together or provide a path for studying a particular topic, archaeological notes and more. Many of them are named for the person who assembled the materials, or whose opinions are in the notes (Ryrie or Thompson for example). Others are named for the translation used or the audience intended (NIV Study Bible or Women's Study Bible). While very useful, these can also be easily misused, because many times individuals using them don't realize that the person assembling the materials has their own theological perspective that determines what is and is not included, and as a result the reader might think that a note in the margin is the only possible viewpoint, when in fact it may be only the viewpoint of that particular writer. The best of these study Bibles are those which simply guide you to find your own answers and provide general information (such as the archaeological notes) that one would not be aware of by simply reading the Bible. Always use a study Bible with care, never let it become the final word on matters of faith......We will continue this topic next month.



Pastor's Notes:

And He gave some as apostles, and some as prophets, and some as evangelists, and some as pastors and teachers, for the equipping of the saints for the work of service, to the building up of the body of Christ; --Ephesians 4:11-12



Years ago, I was visiting with my pastor in Cincinnati while I was working on the PhD program. He told of some surprises in his ministry at our church were because of the work of the previous pastor. He said that the people were very shocked and pleased when he called upon them in the hospital, because the former pastor never did that. Apparently the former pastor had told the people he was really an evangelist, and so he would preach for them, but would be away a lot for evangelistic meetings. As a result, he never called on parishioners in the hospital. My pastor and I both thought he had not been much of a pastor, that he probably should have stayed just an evangelist. On another occasion, a semiretired pastor who worked with me in the first church I pastored, returned one day from an afternoon out making pastoral calls and informed me that he had not had a very successful day, because almost everywhere he had gone, nobody was home. When I asked if he had called ahead, he indicated that he hadn't, that he had always just dropped by on folks as time permitted. I remember discussing with him how the world had changed, that no longer could you assume even retired or widowed folks would be sitting at home and that calling ahead to be sure was almost required. At one church, someone told me they appreciated that I was the pastor for the whole congregation and not just a favored few...when I had always assumed the pastor should care about everyone in his church! Apparently some previous pastor only spent time with a select few. Other comments include such things as whether a pastor joins in working the activities with the people, or merely observes or supervises at a distance. I have also know of pastors who had their fingers "in every pot," so to speak, to the point that people didn't feel free to do anything with out the pastor's approval...to the point that one even wrote out specific wording for any layman who would make an announcement on Sunday! (At one church I pastored, a previous pastor was that way, and it took a while to get people to realize they didn't need my approval for every ministry idea and procedure they adopted.) In another time I heard someone disappointed with their pastor's preaching, not recognizing that his gifts were in pastoral care and helping the church build a new vision. And now, in many churches, a current trend seems to be that the pastor's only responsibility is to prepare a good sermon for Sunday...so many people in modern churches do not have pastors they would see at the hospital or their homes in a time of crisis.

Nola once told me that I should never pastor a church that just wanted to stay the same, to maintain nothing more than status quo, because my style is not as a caretaker but a person who helps churches see opportunities and ideas for what could be, rather than simply what already is their ministry. These are some of the ways I realized pastors are as different as are their churches (which is helpful for me, because it reminds me that it is okay I am not as good at some things as



other pastors, and better at some things than others.) I think it is sad, then, when a congregation is unable to appreciate the leadership of a current pastor because his or her style is so different from that of a beloved previous pastor, because I believe that God is intentional in his variations so as to accomplish different tasks at different times with a pastor and with a congregation to bring about the design he has planned for them both. (Which is not to say that sometimes there isn't a mismatch, or that pastors aren't sometimes neglectful, or congregations carry unrealistic expectations.) So what is going on with all this, do you think?

I believe that the key is in the verses above, and they are significant for how I see my work as a pastor, particularly verse 12. According to this passage, my calling as a pastor is not to do everything, or have all the answers, or anything like that; it is to equip, to enable, to assist, support and guide you, the congregation so that you are effectively doing the work of ministry. Sometimes I get to do that by working side by side with you, while other times I serve only as a resource or encourager for the activities you do. Sometimes I may lay out an opportunity for us that I can see, sometimes I learn of the opportunities you see and encourage you as you pursue them. Sometimes I end up doing things similar to things I did in a previous church, often, though, I am involved in new avenues of ministry unique to our current situation. In all of these things, God works through each of us, using the various gifts he has given to each of us, to make a difference in our own lives, in the life of our church, and in our world to draw us all closer to Christ. And in my view, I seek to do so while recognizing others before me have led us to where we are now, and that others after me will lead to the next stage whenever that time might come. But for this time, we all have the privilege of being part of God's ministry that is known as: First Baptist Church of Fremont, NE. Keep up the good work!

This month, perhaps it would be useful to describe some of the tools one uses in Bible study, and how to assess them. Many of these are

available online, but the reality is that being online requires even more careful evaluation of the tool being used, rather than less. This article will simply describe some of them, their use, and a bit about how to evaluate them. (These kind of tools are available for your use in our church library next to the prayer room outside the sanctuary.)

Concordance. A concordance is a simple tool, and one that is very useful. Online or in Bible ebook form, it is simply a search engine with which you can find the location of specific words in the biblical text, which is very helpful when you can't find a verse or story you are trying to locate. Many Bibles have partial concordances in the back of them, and concordances such as Strong's and Cruden's provide the occurrences of every word in the Bible. When using a concordance, it is important to note that a concordance will be tied to a specific translation, so if you learned the verse in the King James, you have to remember the wording might be a little different in another translation. Some concordances, such as Strong's, contain a number key that will also allow you to know which Greek, Hebrew or Aramaic word was translated, so that you can compare it to other verses using the same word.

Commentary. A commentary is a book or collection of books that provide help in understanding the Bible texts. They are arranged in the same way as the Bible...book, chapter, verse....and contain at each point some insights by the person(s) who wrote the commentary. There are a wide variety of commentaries, very old and very new, more "liberal" and more "conservative," some intentionally from a different perspective (such as the African Bible Commentary on my shelf), and some very careful and scholarly in their study while others are less careful. Some commentaries also contain helps in understanding the structure and implications of the original language behind the text, others are designed to help the reader prepare sermons, even containing sermon outlines. It is always important to remember that something written in a commentary is NOT the same as something written in the Bible, and so may or may not be correct or the only way to understand the text. Learning which publishers are sponsored by which groups or what theological perspective can be helpful in assessing the value of a commentary (Abingdon is Presbyterian and a little more free but scholarly in their publications, whereas Tyndale would be very conservative and more simplified in its approach). Old commentaries (such as Matthew Henry's) can have useful insights, but there will be a lot of information lacking because language studies have progressed far since his time.

Bible Dictionary. There are many different Bible dictionaries in publication, some are single volume and some multi-volume. Some are dictionaries of the English Bible (most of which also try to help the reader understand the original language terms behind the English). Some also contain pictures of various locations or items described in the Bible. These dictionaries help make sure you understand what the

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

As children of God, we are called to grow in faith, embody Christlike qualities, and live out our purpose in the world. Here are several ways to deepen that relationship and live more fully as God intended:

- 1. <u>Cultivate a Life of Prayer and Worship</u>: Prayer is our direct line to God. Jesus taught us to pray simply and sincerely (Luke 11:2–4). Make prayer a daily habit—praise, confess, thank, and ask. Worship isn't just Sunday; it's a lifestyle of honoring God in all we do.
- 2. <u>Immerse Yourself in Scripture</u>: God speaks to us through His Word. Reading and reflecting on the Bible helps us understand His will and grow spiritually. Start with the Gospels or a devotional plan. Memorize verses to keep them in your heart.
- 3. <u>Live Out Love and Kindness:</u> Jesus said the greatest commandment is to love God and love others (Matthew 22:37–39). Show kindness, forgive freely, and serve those in need. Acts of service reflect God's love and help us grow in humility and compassion.
- 4. <u>Seek Community and Accountability</u>: Christian growth thrives in community. Attend church regularly, join a small group, or find a mentor. Being around others who share your faith encourages you and keeps you grounded.
- 5. Reflect: Spiritual growth involves self-examination. Seek God's forgiveness (1 John 1:9).
- 6. <u>Embrace Service and Generosity</u>: Jesus came to serve, not to be served (Mark 10:45). Look for ways to help others—whether through volunteering, sharing, or simply being present. Generosity reflects God's heart and builds a life of purpose.
- 7. Encourage Honest Conversations About Faith: Don't shy away from hard questions or doubts. Talk openly about your faith journey, struggles, and discoveries. This builds trust and deepens your walk with God.
- 8. <u>Share the Good News:</u> Jesus calls us to be witnesses (Acts 1:8). Share your story, invite others to church, or serve in ways that show God's love. Being a light in the world is part of our calling.

Remember, growth takes time. God is patient and loving,

always ready to help you take the next step. As you seek Him, He will reveal more of Himself to you.
