Every great Bible teacher has spent time in these kind of practices, they are the very things that God uses to transform the humdrum of a Bible passage into a gateway into the very presence of God!

Blessed is the man who....his delight is in the law of the LORD, and on his law he meditates day and night. —Psalm 1:1-2 "Oh how I love your law! It is my meditation all the day."--Psalm 119:97

In this day and age, when we hear the word "meditation" we tend to think of slow breathing and some of the Eastern religions with their closed eyes chanting repetitive phrases in strange postures. But in doing so, we neglect the rich Biblical tradition of meditation as referred to in the Psalms. There are important distinctions, though. The Eastern religious chants are designed to help individuals "empty their minds" as they repeat, sometimes, the names of Hindu gods. The Biblical notion is just the opposite: instead of emptying your mind to build that spiritual connection, you are to fill your mind with the things of God. The verses above mentions particularly meditation on God's Word. In Philippians 4:8. Paul lists things that are excellent, just, pure, lovely and more as worthy of our meditation. Any good student of the Bible spends time doing more than just reading the scripture, but investing ourselves in our Bibles in other ways. Dawson Trotman, founder of the Navigators, famously challenged Christians to regularly not only read our Bibles, but to hear it proclaimed, to study it, and to memorize it while diligently meditating on it in each context. But when this topic is raised, very often we aren't quite sure how meditation on scripture works.



During one of our recent Thursday studies, a reference was made to "Scripture Engagement"...a term being used for some suggestions as to how to experience the Bible on a deeper level through various techniques, all of which can be forms of Biblical meditation. Online, one source website is www.biblegateway.com which includes a section of that name in

cooperation with Taylor University. Below I want to share with you some of their ideas (as well as others I add in) that could be useful, and encourage you to try some of them yourself:

Pray the scripture—particularly using the Psalms or various promises of God to bring before him, either individually or with others.

Picture Scripture—by imagining the setting, drawing a sketch, imagining yourself in the story. It can also be useful to find artworks that illustrate the passage, such as those of Michaelangelo, Botticelli, Degas or many of the great Masters and more.

Journal the Scripture—take time to write down the things that strike you in the wording, questions you have, ideas that inspire or challenge you...whatever the passage brings to your mind.

Share the Passage—rewrite it into your own words, retell it to a friend, fill in the details and explore the possibilities.

Vision Team Minutes, October 4, 2025

In attendance were Joel Foreman, Mark Anderson, Vicki Anderson, Marcia Hill, Betty Laughlin, Mike Raasch, Alan Holzerland and Pastor Richard.

Vision Team was called to an early meeting by Pastor Richard to consider whether to approve the request to host the 2026 Nebraska Region Annual Meeting, and since several members would not be available on our normal meeting Saturday, we chose to conduct what business we could.

Pastor shared with the Team that the 2025 hosting guide provided by Greg Mamula to aid our discussion, showing what things would be our responsibility and what ABC/NE handles. After significant consideration, the Team voted to approve hosting, but to do so with another church or two assisting as Scottsbluff would be doing this year, and that before final approval wanted to present the request to the congregation informally at tomorrow's services to include their responses, especially any concerns that might arise. (This was done the next day, and Pastor Richard made contact with the Pastor at Valley, who indicate he thought his church would be glad to help host. Announcement to this effect was made at the Region Meeting in Scottsbluff the next weekend.)



Joel updated the group with details about the upcoming Oct. 16 Halloween activity downtown where we will hand out hotdogs again. The plan will be to purchase 1,000 hotdogs for distribution this year, and though the sponsoring group asked if we would

be willing to change location, that request was declined for this year on such short notice. It was noted that Hy-Vee had hotdogs on sale right now. We will grill at the church again, starting a little earlier, and then transport the hotdogs to our space downtown, where we will also have candy and the little "Ready References" available for people.

September had several successful activities. The Fall All-Church/FBKids BBQ held in September had over 70 people in attendance, with a number of people from each service, the Wednesday night families, and some new visitors. It went well in spite of the fact that the weather was threatening and we had to move in and out of the Family Center when it started raining.

The Friday evening concert on Oct 4 with "Ernie Couch and Revival" was really enjoyed by the 20+ able to attend. It was held in the Family Center, and even though it was a busy night locally with a lot of community activities, we thought it was well worth doing and have invited them to return again. Pastor reviewed with the Team what the offering had been that night, and what the group usually requests, and the Vision Team approved supplementing the offering with a check from the church for \$175.00. Marcia made the motion, and Joel 2nd. Motion passed.

Marcia shared that there is a Christmas celebration being planned with the FBKids for December 10th, with the possibility of making Christmas stockings for The Bridge. Details to come. Marcia also shared that the Nebraska Women's Fall Conference at MMCCC is scheduled for October
