Pastor's Notes---(continued from last month)



If one gives an answer before he hears, it is his folly and shame. The one who states his case first seems right, until the other comes and examines him. -Proverbs 18:13 & 17



This month, I would like to continue and conclude last month's topic, discussing

logic and the importance of seeking civil and reasonable discourse in our society, where we as Christians have the ability to hear all sides of an issue, and to represent our own beliefs appropriately. Last month I mentioned the need to learn how to resist bullying and to be able to recognize fallacious arguments. At the same time, I think it wise to realize there probably never has been a time when society as a whole was always peaceful and respectful; after all, there were times in history when literal brawls broke out in the House of Representatives, and many an argument has been "settled" by means of a duel or showdown. Still, let us do what we can to contribute toward a positive atmosphere of discussion in our own portions of the society...both in person and online. When Jesus engaged society in his day, even he often used the rules of logic taught by the rabbis. We can, too.

Continuing our discussion then, let us begin with a couple of simple fallacies that are rampant. One is called Ad Populum, or the Appeal to Popular Opinion. This is the old, 'everybody says so" argument. Just because most people believe something to be true, doesn't make it so. We simply need to remember that in Columbus's day, most people believed the earth to be flat. Sometimes truth rests with the minority opinion, and sound reasoning, not the numbers of people, are what we need to be our convincing factors. The second is the Hasty Generalization Fallacy. I remember a black pastor friend of mine who was frustrated with the fact that people assumed that because he was black, he always voted for Democrats, as if all black people think exactly the same. I see this not only in politics, but in how people perceive us as Christians. We all know there are some real looney-tunes out there who are highly visible and claim to represent Christ. All too often people see those folks and assume all Christians are dolts. We don't like it when people make such assumptions about us when we know they are not true; we need to be just as careful about making

Hasty Generalizations about those with whom we disagree. Have you ever been asked to participate in a poll or survey, and found yourself frustrated because the answers you were offered didn't fit? Such surveys are usually set up with only two possible answers to questions such as do you prefer this or that, or do you agree or disagree with this statement. And you may not like either answer. There are often logical fallacies that occur in these scenarios. One is called False Dichotomy or Either/Or Fallacy (and False Assumptions Fallacy may also be part of this), in which a question is posited as if there were only two answers. An example we could relate to might be, "Do you believe God loves everybody or do you believe some people are going to go

to hell?" Obviously, the Christian faith historically treats both as true, and most

of us would not accept that it can be only one way or the other...we would want a different answer. The fault here also lies in the fact that there is the False Assumption that just because God loves someone, he would not let them choose to reject him or would not punish them for their sins. We know that to be false even from our own experience of punishing our children for bad behaviors, or the times we have chosen to be disobedient to God.

A very similar fallacy is sometimes called the Loaded Question Fallacy. It differs slightly from the False Dichotomy in that the desired outcome is built into the question (again, False Assumptions Fallacy can be a part of this). The classic illustration here is the question "Have you stopped beating your wife?" The built-in outcome is that, no matter how you answer, you will have admitted to beating your wife! And for someone to ask such a question, they may be basing it on the False Assumption that all men beat their wives. Again, this kind of question occurs a lot these days in surveys, polls, political discourse and in the realm of social issues such as racism, defunding the police, etc.

There are only three more I want to bring in, so you are almost to the end...I promise. They are relatively simple. One is called Post Hoc Fallacy (or False Causation). This kind of false argument is based on the premise that because event A occurs AFTER event B, then event A caused event B. In our location, it could be illustrated by someone claiming that the 2019 floods we experienced caused the COVID pandemic. This thinking leads to a lot of silly superstitions, but also avoids deeper thinking about things. For instance, if one claimed that the recent racial unrest/Black Lives Matter concerns were CAUSED by the George Floyd incident, one would be wrong, because while that may have been a gathering point for the protests, the cause has a much longer and deeper history than what occurred up in Minneapolis.

The last two are simple. First is the Argument from Silence. It is invalid to draw conclusions based on lack of evidence. An example could be when science claimed that the atom was the smallest particle because they had never proven anything smaller. Then they discovered protons, electrons and neutrons, and split the atom. Then they were the smallest, until they discovered neutrinos and guarks. We must always allow that there are things we do not yet know. And finally, a common fallacy is called Begging the Question (Circular Reasoning). Simply stated, it is where the conclusion is based on or assumes the premise. An example would be "Smoking cigarettes can kill you because cigarettes are deadly." That statement contains no logical argument, merely an assertion. The argument would be that they are deadly because smoking them destroys lung cells or cause cancer.

Why is this important at all? As you think about what you believe (remember thinking about what you think about?), being able to discern between hyped up arguments and sound reasoning is important. This skill is so needed in our world today, from COVID vaccines to institutional racism to tolerance for everything...not to mention the various assaults on the Christian faith and morals, we need to know why we believe and teach what we do, and that our beliefs stand on solid ground.

But the wisdom from above is first pure, then peaceable, gentle, open to reason, full of mercy and good fruits, impartial and sincere. --James 3:17

Think about it! (P.S. There will be a final exam...it just won't be administered by ME!)

VISION TEAM MONTHLY REPORT JULY 17, 2021

Members present: Pastor Richard, Joel Foreman, June Cardwell, Marcia Hill, Mary Weldon, Eileen Cash, Randy Cash, Don Charleston, and Dorothy Charleston



The meeting was called order by Pastor. He opened with a reference to Revelation 22 referring to unending fruitfulness of life. In the new Heaven the Tree of Life bears fruit continually. Many people shared how God was working in their lives.

Don reported \$23,550 balance in the Paving Fund. He said a bid was approved by the Property committee from Pave the Way company for \$33,000 for concrete. This includes the area from the church building to the fence and East to the sidewalk. Don made a motion to approve \$33,000. Marcia seconded. The vote was unanimous in approval. They would start mid-August. Don made a second motion to approve a bid of \$7500 from Layman Paving of Omaha for asphalt on the parking lot. June seconded that motion and the vote was unanimously in favor. Strict reminders are that **NO SALT** shall be spread on these surfaces!

After reviewing another price for a different copier, they decided to stay with Fremont Office for \$68.88 per month. Don made the motion. Second was by Eileen. Motion carried.

There was a leak in Beltone's office. Rod cleaned around the roof drain and is checking on replacement insulation and ceiling tiles.

Pest Pros has been hired for quarterly service.

Nola continues working on security cameras and setting up streaming for our regular church services.


Randy reported balance of \$13,540 in the checking account. \$1,000 is being paid on the complex loan each month. \$5500 is the loan balance.

Randy also reported that the Regular Endowment balance is \$369,586.48. The Youth Endowment is \$61,784.27. Memorial Gifts has \$36,774.10. Expenses
