#### **Pastor's Notes**

Enter his gates with thanksgiving, and his courts with praise! Give thanks to him; bless his name!
--Psalm 100:4 ESV

November is the month we celebrate Thanksgiving. It has become a rather strange holiday, it seems to me. I wonder how many Thanksgiving Day meals and celebrations actually involve people taking time to consider how blessed they are, and then giving a pray of thanks to God. I suspect not many.

Were you aware that on October 29, 1781, just 10 days after Cornwallis surrendered at Yorktown, the Continental Congress passed a Proclamation for a day of public prayer and thanksgiving? A few years later, on the day after the first amendment to the constitution was proposed, Congress urged President Washington to proclaim a day of public thanksgiving and prayer, which he did. In that proclamation on October 3, 1789, Washington said:

"Whereas it is the duty of all Nations to acknowledge the providence of Almighty God, and to obey his will, to be grateful for his benefits, and humbly to implore his protection and favor...I do recommend and assign Thursday, the 26<sup>th</sup> day of November next to be devoted by the People of these States to the service of that great and glorious Being, who is the beneficent Author of all the good that was, that is, or that will be...for his kind care and protection of the People of this Country previous to their becoming a Nation--for the signal and manifold mercies, and the favorable interpositions of his Providence which we experienced in the course and conclusion of the late war—for the great degree of tranquility, union, and plenty ...which we have since enjoyed...unite in most humbly offering our prayers and supplications to the great Lord and Ruler of Nations and beseech Him to pardon our national and other transgressions...to render our national government a blessing to all the people."

Thanksgiving today often seems far from that, but although Washington's understandings of Christianity had significant differences from many of us today, he firmly believed it was God's hand that birthed our nation, and that we owed God a great debt of thanksgiving. In a Fareweel Address just a month earlier, he stated:

"Of all the dispositions and habits which lead to political prosperity, Religion and morality are indispensable supports. In vain would that man claim the tribute of Patriotism, who should labour to subvert these great Pillars of human happiness...Whatever may be conceded to the influence of refined education on minds of peculiar structure, reason and experience both forbid us to expect that National morality can prevail in exclusion of religious principle."

Looking around our world today, with so many having abandoned the churches and synagogues, we are witnessing the truth of his prediction. While I think many overstate the case in claiming the U.S. was founded as a Christian nation (after all, individuals become Christians, not governments!), since the Founding Fathers were careful to avoid that confusion of identity they had seen abused in so many other countries, yet they held our debt to God and need for God's guidance and help in high esteem.

Jefferson, whose view of the New Testament would appall many a Baptist today, yet asked for his audience's prayers in his second inaugural address:

I shall need, too, the favor of that Being in whose hands we are, who led our fathers, as Israel of old, from their native land and planted them in a country flowing with all the necessaries and comforts of life...I ask you to join in supplications with me that He will so enlighten the minds of your servants, guide their councils, and prosper their measures that whatsoever they do shall result in your good..."

Likewise, Madison, in his first inaugural address, also confessed trust—

"...in the guardianship and guidance of that Almighty Being whose power regulates the destiny of nations, whose blessings have been so conspicuously dispensed to this rising Republic, and to whom we are bound to address our devout gratitude for the past, as well as our fervent supplications and best hopes for the future."

Many today seem to have entirely forgotten these principles, making Thanksgiving about parades and shopping and family and gluttony, with nary a thought of God. Deuteronomy 8:17-18 warns us:

"Beware lest you say in your heart, 'My power and the might of my hand have gotten me this wealth.' You shall remember the LORD your God, for it is he who gives you power to get wealth, that he may confirm his covenant that he swore to your fathers, as it is this day."

And yet, is that not the very way many believe in America today? A friend of mine pointed out it is epitomized in a Thanksgiving prayer of the cartoon character Bart Simpson, who says, "God, we paid for all this ourselves, so thanks for nothing." Clearly many in our culture have forgotten our place!

People expect and stand up for their constitutional rights, forgetting that embedded in the Declaration of Independence, where those rights are first asserted, are the words:

"We hold these truths to be self-evident, that all men are created equal, that they are endowed by their Creator with certain unalienable Rights..."

This is one of three references to God in the Declaration, and yet today people demand their rights, without recognition that we are created beings whose rights derive from our Creator, a Creator many today simply do not believe exists. So who is it that they give thanks to each November? As believers, may our practice of thanksgivings and prayer on a daily basis set the example that is so dearly missing in our country today.





**VISION TEAM MEETING** October 16, 2021 Members present: Mike Raasch, Marcia Hill, Pastor Richard, Randy, Mary Weldon, June, Joel, Eileen, Don and **Dorothy Charleston** 



Mike called the meeting to order with prayer.

Randy reported a balance of \$6,653 in the checking account on the 5th of September. The balance now is \$14,100. \$2,000 has been donated for the playground and \$10,000 for the paving.

Don made a motion to return the \$10,000 taken from the Memorial Fund and not used for the parking lot. June seconded the motion. The vote was approved unanimously.

Randy also reported a balance of \$21.098.45 in Memorials, and \$384,800.18 in the Endowment Fund. The complex loan is down to \$1700 and should be paid off next month.

Don reported the following projects have been completed; Weather stripping, Updating list of service people, Signage on the new van, Painting 3rd floor ceilings, Computer and video replaced, Windows in need of replacement and some parking lot repairs will be done next year. Signage being worked on. Roof of the parsonage was repaired. Phones are being switched from Spectrum to Allo.

June reported the background checks for children and youth helpers have been completed. The Fall opening with Wildlife Encounters was a success. Drawings for gift cards and pumpkins were held. A turnout of 15 Youth and 7 younger children was a good start. Another outreach on the 17th was held downtown. Thanks to many donations and volunteers it was another success. They ran out of hotdogs. Many testament books were handed out. Pastor reported the calendar items.

The Prayer room move to the Sunday School Office is in progress.



MMCCC has bricks available for purchase and Church Blocks for \$200 as well.

The Harvest Dinner will be held on the 14th. That is when there will be a combined Worship at 10:00 and the violinist Roddy Chong will be playing for us. Dave Manzer and his family will be preparing the meal. They are asking for donations of 10 to 12 pound turkeys.

Marcia has notes for us to write and send to Washington and Linden schools and First Responders, as well as members of our congregation. They can be picked up in the office.


### KID'S CLUB | FBYOUTH
