Pastor's Notes

"Remember not the former things, nor consider the things of old. Behold, I am doing a new thing; now it springs forth, do you not perceive it? Isaiah 43:18-19 esv



It is interesting that there are times we are told in the Bible to remember past things, and then times we are told NOT to remember past things. For example, Israel was commanded to celebrate Passover and remember that God delivered them from Egypt, or at the Last Supper Jesus instituted our communion ceremony as a way to remember Him. God makes clear that there are bedrock values and life lessons that need to be remembered our entire lives. But then Paul makes a point to say that he forgets the things of his past and presses on toward the upward call of Christ. Today's passage from Isaiah is one of the very famous passages about forgetting and remembering, past and future, new and old, highlighting God's desire for us not to be bound to the past. I ran across a good illustration of this the other day reading a 2015 Guideposts devotion by Melody Bonnette Swang. Permit me to share some of it with you:

"My friend Anne and I were having lunch....Anne confided that she struggled over letting go of past failures and actions...

'I know how you feel,' I admitted, 'Sometimes I think about things I've said and done and wonder...if the remorse will every go away."

'Last week my pastor shared a story that I think might help us both,' Anne said.
"The Culver Military Academy in Indiana has a marvelous tradition," he said.
"During their graduation ceremony the cadets shake hands with the headmaster and then walk through an arch with a gate." ... As the graduates walk through the gate a marshal tells them, "Don't forget to close the gate!" Seems that throughout their schooling, there were encouraged to close the gate on mistakes and start fresh.""

I think that is a great illustration, don't you? There are times when we let things from the past plague us and keep us from embracing the future or hold us back from taking risks to become more than we are. For some people, nicknames and identities foisted on them in childhood become defining realities that trouble them their whole lives, always thinking of themselves as the "short kid" or the "class dunce" or the one everybody made fun of. Other times, we make a poor choice or two and so regret it that we are unable or unwilling to let it go, carrying it as a burden we have to bear instead of something God can forgive and use to help us grow.

On the other hand, we can hang on to our great experiences and long to relive them over and again, rather than appreciate and find joy in the current experiences in our

lives. This can be anything from the high school football hero who retells the story of the big game every time he can, to individuals who fondly remember all the romantic dates in the early days with their spouse and wonder why things can't just always be that way. Whether good memories or hard memories, holding on to the past in such a way that it prevents us from fully living in and appreciating the present or building for a future can become a very detrimental habit. That is what God is telling the Israelites through Isaiah: "Don't cling to how things used to be....instead, look forward to what I am doing today, and tomorrow!"

This is true for us as individual believers, as well as for our gathered communities called churches. I have been part of churches that were so focused on the "good old days" that they had a hard time making the shift to some marvelous things God was doing in their midst right then. It can be a challenging task to let go of our past to look for God's hand working differently in the present, but as Isaiah makes plain, it can be a very exciting and rewarding one.

It is helpful for me to think of these things in terms of books and chapters. What happened in one chapter of life will have moved our story forward and laid the groundwork for the coming chapters, but you have to go to the next chapter to see it. One chapter ends and another begins. How would you identify the various chapters of your life? For the life of our church? Perhaps for the life of our country? How well do you let go of the last chapter to begin the adventure of the coming chapter? Sometimes that is not so easy to do, is it? What is important in one chapter of life may not be what becomes important in the next. How God operates at one moment of history may not be how God chooses to move during this time. God is writing some amazing stories in our lives and in the life of our church, and he writes it in chapters!

I wonder today, are there things you need to "close the gate" on in your life (or in the life of our church)? What are you carrying from the past that needs to be left in the past? It doesn't mean that you live as if those things never happened. But it does mean that you recognize they happened THEN, but you are living NOW, and God's mercies are NEW EVERY MORNING. The Lord's Prayer is for our DAILY bread... not to carry around yesterday's loaves. O, that we all would be able to so embrace God's work that we can fully appreciate it in the present, fondly remembering our past with Him, and thus longing for and anticipating the things he will do in the coming days. Personally, I find it to be somewhat of an adventure to go through life watching for and wondering what God is up to, what God is going to do next!

Close the gate behind you, okay?



VISION TEAM MONTHLY REPORT:

The meeting was attended by Mike Raasch, John Mitchell, Betty Laughlin, Randy Cash, Marcia Hill, Eileen Cash, Shelly Bowen, Sasha White and Dorothy Charleston.



Mike opened with prayer and a reading from Psalm 99.

Randy reported July ended with \$14,764.47 in the First State Bank checking account. The quarterly American Baptist Fund had a balance of \$367,766.25. Designated Gifts has \$207,403.23. \$28,000 has been pledged thus far for roof repair work. \$5,500 was paid for kids going to camp.

Eileen reported things are going smoothly after J.C. Fremont Days. Allyson Foreman spoke at the ABW meeting.

Betty reported she continues to send cards and meals to families.

Shelly asked for volunteers and help for the Fall Festival on August 30. September 6 will be the first Wednesday night back with kids. Saturday August 19 the AB Girls will have an activity. About 8 girls attened. John will have soap carving for the boys. He's thinking about charging \$5 each so they would have some ownership.

John reported roof repair will start soon. David has a bid of \$16,000 for the windows. That includes trim. They are planning to sell the green van. They have a buyer. Then they would trade the big bus. The bid for the equipment for the sound system is \$16,698 not including installation. The cost to replace the air conditioner is \$54,358, and the water cooler is \$2400.

Sasha distributed copies of grants available for needs of community outreach. They include transportation and educational opportunities. We need to find the top 3. Wednesday night meals and outreach transportation are two.

There being no further business, Mike closed the meeting with prayer.
