Meet the (new) President

CIAO recently welcomed its new president, Mr George Grasso, and this article will hopefully give our members a little more insight into the person, his vehicles and his aims for CIAO. Actually, George is a very family oriented man as should become obvious to our readers. However, let me say that from the outset the Italian hospitality was clear and present, with a great selection of very tasty Italian style meats that George



himself made. George's wife, Mirella, his sons Luca and Jian (who many of us met at the November meeting) and his lovely daughter Sienna. The undeniable thing with the Grasso household is how fantastically clean (and white) it was. It's a credit to the family. One thing for sure, if they need any future furniture they just head straight to the white furniture section ...that makes it easy.

George has had a long and varied history with vehicles and especially quirky vehicles...and not just Italian cars. As a smash repairer early in

his career, he came across a lot of cars that we only usually dream about. The Grasso family forebears were an Italian migrant family in the 1950's

who settled in Victoria and it seemed that Holdens played a big part in their early automotive history, with one highlight being his grandfather buying the first brand new HB Torana for George's mum when she turned 18 (see photo of George on the bonnet of said Torana with his grandparents in the background). This car eventually found its way to a very young George and he told us that he rebuilt it twice. His Dad had an

Talking to George, you get the impression that he really loved his early cars. ALL OF THEM! His first car was the forementioned HB Torana. The cars that seem to have captivated his youthful days




were a 1962 Karman Ghia, with an upgraded motor

from 1200cc to 1600cc and a blue 1979 2 litre Alfetta sedan. George talks about this car in a wistful and dream-like manner. In fact, George says that his next car was a supposedly good handling car ...a Mazda MX-5 which had a reputation for this. Yet George says that the Karman Ghia and especially the Alfetta easily out-handled the Mazda, especially

on long drives on Victoria's Great Ocean Road where he used to go surfing. And he should know because I am sure George

gave each car a good work-out. Just look at the MX5 and you can tell that George must have been 'a wild boy' and a half! This was the celebration of the 1999 North Melbourne Kangaroo's Grand Final win. He used contact paper to design the artwork and then peeled it off again about a month later. His other cars were a VW Type3 Fastback and a HG Holden Kingswood (no one is perfect!). He slipped in that he also had a brand new 2003 Holden Monaro CV8R.

When I asked him what he did with each of his cars, he said that at one stage he kept them all in his front yard, but then, when he got married, he sold most of them. If we zoom to his current car collections, you can say he has the most amazingly eclectic collection. Well, just follow the list of vehicles and tell me if you think that claim is exaggerated!

We were welcomed by the first vehicle, which was a 1962 DKW 75cc 2-stroke Auto Union Scooter French designed made Manuhrin – German engineered. The history of this scooter was to go into direct competition with Vespa. Manuhrin listened to their customers (mainly women) who would complain that they

would break their heels kick-starting their Vespas and they didn't like changing geara. Therefore Manuhrin created his scooter with a pull-start and automatic transmission.



However, Vespa continued to dominate the market. Believe me when I tell you that if it is not in concourse condition, then it is mighty close. I am not a scooter type of person but you would have to be mean-spirited to not admire this vehicle! It is a beautiful combination of light green and tan leather seats. Truly beautiful!

We then went to what George calls his workshop, which was, as expected, very neat and then on to his real "toyshop". Now this is why the word 'eclectic' was invented! The first thing that catches your eye is a two stroke 1964 Lambretta 450, a three-wheeled sort of ute. It is only 175cc and it is supposed to be able to carry more than 20 bags of concrete. It is an immaculately turned-out vehicle in a great light grey colour. Be assured that a dirty bag of concrete will never end up in the

back tray. See it here and note the engine under the front seats. Just fantastic!

In case you thought that George just lives in the past ...well, no siree, as he next showed us his 1753cc V2 2018 Harley Davidson Breakout with a Stage 2.. It looks fantastic and a real savage beast . You would suspect that the scooters are nervous every time George starts this beast up as the scooters are no doubt worried that they

could be sucked up in the intake as it looks truly that powerful.




The icing on George's automotive cake is a

Fiat 500X. It is much more powerful and better handling than the usual Fiat 500. Remember I told you that George is a real family man ...take a look at the number plate ...MNOOCH which was his late father-in-law's nickname. He wants to respect the history of the club but to also take advantage of sponsorships, optimum use of social media and a generally more commercial approach eg potential tiered sponsorships such as from Ducati Central Coast and other local businesses.. 
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I am glad to have gotten an

Club Drive No 2: Fast and Loud: September 20

The 2024 Fast and Loud Festival, hosted by the Lake Macquarie City Council, features a street parade, Offshore Superboat and Powerboat races, aerial displays by Redbull pilot Matt Hall and Classic Car displays.

There were five live sites around the Lake over the weekend, offering the best vantage points to watch the Powerboat and Superboat races and aerial display as well as featuring live music, roving entertainment, and food and market stalls.





The show included vintage, classic, custom, muscle, hot rods and motor bikes. I had never realised the extent of the festival. Held over two days, CIAO was represented on the Sunday by myself and Warren Buckingham, and, with a red Ferrari Testarossa, the only Italian cars sighted.





Apart from the Italian cars, two very different cars took my attention. 


The other was a 1955 Buick Riviera Hardtop, a true representative of mid-20th Century American luxury and style.





Australian equivalent of Historic Registration and has done very few miles since 2007. The car was located in Albany by Charlie Gugliotta around 1994 where it was part of the Ken





Checklist for organising a CIAO Event

With more and more people organising CIAO events, the following list of 'dos and don'ts' is based on a document previously devised by Laurel Buckingham to assist in this.

There are three types of events: permanent calendar items, eg Auto Italia, Euro Motofest, Lago di Mac

Mid-week Coffee Runs

Weekend drives

Mid-week Coffee runs:

- select a venue for the event, usually Wednesday and check with the Event Coordinator for a suitable date.
- check with the proposed venue that they are open on Wednesdays, and if so, make a tentative booking for around 12 people
- confirm numbers closer to the actual day
- the editor of the Newsletter appreciates a written report, preferably more than 3 sentences and remember. It earns 5 points towards the end of year trophy, presented at the Birthday Lunch.

Weekend runs:

- select a destination and discuss with the Event Coordinator a suitable date
- if there is a drive (convoy), where is the meeting place and time, and is there ample parking and toilets
- what is the departure time and estimated arrival time at the final destination for those who are going straight there
- event destination:
 - if a picnic area, is there a BBQ, and if so, is it electric or gas and does it need money to operate.
 - are there chairs and tables, or do we need to bring our own and are there toilets
- if a **restaurant or café**, it is best to make for an initial booking for 12, and confirm a more exact number closer to the day
- what is the state of the roads ie sealed, dirt and road conditions to take note of.
- the editor of the Newsletter appreciates a written report, preferably more than 3 sentences and remember. It earns 5 points towards the end of year trophy, presented at the Birthday Lunch.

Suggestions for writing a report for the Newsletter

If you are writing a report of a CIAO event, some of the following suggestions I found in Amatori Alfa (the AROCA magazine, who borrowed it from their Victorian counterparts) may help. They have been modified somewhat to suit our events and you don't need to answer all questions. They are suggestions only and don't worry too much about spelling, punctuation or continuity. You have to make the Editor earn his huge salary.....

- Event name and description (eg Club run, Mid-week coffee run)
- Place, destination (if applicable), date, time and duration of the event
- Weather details
- Food: menu, cuisine eg Italian, seafood, coffee and cake
- Most interesting car/cars in your opinion (why, model, colour, type, year, features)
- Did anything interesting, funny, noteworthy happen during the event?
- What did you like about the day/event?
- Tell us about your car and the day (the drive there, did you get lost, run late, get booked, company etc)
- Photos: of people (if seated at tables, better with plates of food, rather than the mess of finished meals and drinks)
 - : plates of food only if interesting
 - : menu, the view, the building and external signs
 - : of the cars (very important!)

Remember: organising an event give you 5 points towards the Perpetual Trophy, a report (of more than 3 lines) also gives you 5 points.

Something a bit different!

Deb and I talked about attending this event a few weeks prior, but with all the rain leading up to the Torana Fest, we thought it may be postponed/cancelled. However according to information on 2NURFM it was going on regardless of weather.
