


Birthday Lunch: Murray's Beach, July 23.

A Member's Profile: Craig Phillips and Family

....interviewed by our intrepid reporter at large, John Leeks.

Early on Saturday, July 8 we headed out to Hebden (approximately 35kms past Singleton) to visit the farm of Craig Phillips, one of our newer members. Keith Mitchell, Shane Godwin and I headed off to meet Craig, his wife Helen and daughter Jonee at their Alpaca Farm ...oh, and to see their collection of Alfas. Son Wade was at work, who is now also a member of CIAO.

I must say that I, at least, was as interested in the alpacas as the Alfas (yes, I know, wash my mouth

out!). I didn't know what to expect, but I had met Craig briefly at a CIAO Monthly Meeting and he seemed a very quiet sort of guy.



We got to his farm around 10am and boy! the area around his farm is very dry. Craig explained that they have had little rainfall in the last 6 months. Anyhow, apart from his wife and daughter we were greeted by their big German Shepherd rescue Archie, and a herd of around 100 alpacas and 25 chickens. I just find them all weirdly lovable creatures. Sort of like midget camels, to which they are related. They have big eyes and are gentle

too. There are two types on the farm Suri and Huacaya. All I know is the chubby ones are more like a tall sheep and the other type are skinnier. I bet the makers of those Alfas never thought they would end-up near an alpaca in Australia!

Craig told us that the fleece from his alpacas is of superfine quality and often used for the material in high-end Italian suits and fabrics. He told us it easily matches the best wool from sheep. The other bonus is that they are soft hooved and so



they don't damage the soil like sheep and cattle. Makes you wonder why alpacas haven't replaced them completely. And in case you wanted to know, they don't spit at you. Only llamas do that!



Craig's Cars

There is no shortage of cars in the Phillips' household. We first came across the spares



car, the red 159. Next we were introduced to Helen's red 159 while Craig's black 159 was on loan to a friend. Wade was at work in his Mazda Ute, under cover was his beautiful 1998 GTV. There was also Jonee's Hyundai and the float for transporting the alpacas!

And that's only the cars he has at home!

Craig's first car was a 1968 Mazda 1500SS. At least it was designed by



the Italian designer Bertone. He reckons that it was a good car, and the Italian styling still looks good today (even though Jonee laughed at what us oldies think looks good). It was known around

Scarborough (WA) as the blue smoke car because someone forgot to replace the valve guides. Craig's mother blew the car up by running it without oil.

You may be wondering when the Italian cars come into the equation. Well, his dad (pictured right) bought an Alfa GTJunior in 1980 and Craig learnt to drive in this car. (The Alfetta pictured Craig owned for 22 years) His love of Alfas came when he accompanied his father to a Hill Climb Competition at Roleystone. He was mightily impressed with how the Alfa went against what seemed like much more powerful V8 cars, so he bought a "smick" di peso leggero 1970 Alfa Giulia Super. Smick didn't refer to the engine however, so Craig replaced the original engine with a 1750 engine from a Berlina. He





reckons it went really well, but of course there were some downsides. (The previous owner had lost the grub screws out the door and window handles so they would regularly fall off. If the rear passenger needed to get out or wind the window down, Craig would grab one from the console and pass it over When he started going out with his then girlfriend

(now wife) a teacher,

he told us about how the hole in the rubber boot around the floor mounted peddles would allow a stream of water in. Unfortunately, Craig hadn't let Helen know and when a large puddle was hit a speed, the water had not only wet her dress, the back window was covered! A teacher going to school with mud all over her dress is not a good look, yet she still married him!



When we were talking to Craig it was becoming obvious that his father Glen, a life member of AROCA WA, inspired his love of Italian cars (he had many). The photo on the right is one of his dad's cars in special livery. This car had 250 horsepower and ran on Avgas and tarmac rallied ...often.

Most Terrible car owned by Craig

It is customary when writing these articles to ask which was the worst car the interviewee has owned. Usually, the member we are highlighting has to think about it...BUT NOT in this case. Craig responded within a millisecond that the worst car was definitely



a bright green Holden Torana SUNBIRD UC with the big bore 1900cc engine. It was so gutlessly unreliable. Eventually he had to put a Weber on and even then, it is still the most gutless car he remembers driving.

I didn't want to ask any more questions about this SUNBIRD as I was worried Craig might blow his phu phu valve thinking about that car. Even Helen, looked pained talking about it! We all laughed at their recollections. We especially laughed when he told us that he had a friend with Ford Falcon 351 cubic inch engine that gave much better fuel consumption.

Tell us about the incredible powered car

Well, he told us the red 1970 Giulia Super with the 1750 motor was a great and powerful car. He says that the engine was strong and the amount of rust that fell off it meant that it was much lighter! So it went like the clappers...

Craig's favourite car

As well as all the cars on the farm, Craig still has a number of cars scattered around the countryside, including his favourite, the 1969 white Giulia Super, which is in Sydney at the moment.



Craig does much of the work himself which means that he is a busy person after his work at the Mangoola Coal Mine and work to do on the farm. Recently he replaced the power steering hoses on his 159. I asked him if he has any projects on the go. Well, with Craig it's a question of all the geographic locations where his projects are!!! He has cars in Perth and in Sydney. This is mostly due to his work on mining sites taking him all around Australia. But the project that brings a rosy glow to his cheeks is the chance to take control of his father's Lancia Zagato. We did say that his father has big interest in Italian cars.

His favourite Italian car

I am so happy to report that Craig's favourite Italian car is a Lamborghini Miura ...Oh yes siree, I agree with him. However, Keith didn't agree, as it doesn't have 4 doors!!!! Craig said

it was just an iconic car that still looks as modern today as it did in 1966...Craig never said a truer word... even though his daughter, Jonee, laughed at the old looking car...bloody hell!

What does Craig like about being a CIAO member?



November 1983 built GTV with approx. 267,000km from new and under 20,000 since rebuilt some 7 years ago. This wonderful example of a GTV is quite special as it was purchased late 2014 from (Il Presidente) Greg's brother at a car show at Tomago. It has all receipts and original manuals and handbooks and all services from new and lived most of its life in a garage in Armidale. It is one of the first models with the hot dip gal process and consequently has NEVER had rust. Fully restored by Murray and his daughter, the only upgrades I have made is to the motor which appears as original but has been brought up to Autodelta specification for a Group 1 Touring Car. This includes Autodelta camshafts 10.92mm lift and increased duration, 9.7:1 compression and carburettors reworked and sized utilizing the 40mm originals as per Autodelta spec (not 45mm which are Group 2). I think this is how they all should be and uses less fuel on highway, believe it or not. This brings the car up to a much more lively 160hp @6250 rpm and still keeping it virtually identical in nature to original idle and smoothness. Also, with great appreciation to Warren, we rebuilt the tailshaft with new rubbers the lot ...smooth. Comes with spares, including a spare engine, original wheels and it has new gearbox mounts and new master and slave cylinders.
