



You will also note that we have made two permanent changes to our CIAO logo,

- 1. We have removed the dots between each letter so to bring CIAO to the modern era of appearance and simplifying our brand recognition creating a much cleaner view. When looking at a multitude of brands and logos across the globe, it was evident that many companies with acronym names do not have full stops/dots inbetween the lettering. For example: QANTAS, FIAT, BCF, IKEA, NASA, etc. It was time for us to do the same, let alone also acknowledging that CIAO is an actual word, not just an acronym of our motor club.
- 2. Implemented Flag Poles on the flags. Needless the say the Italian flag in particular has created much controversy as the colours are the wrong way around at first glance. The flagpoles now immediately signify the direction in which the flag(s) sway and why the Italian flag colours face the opposite direction. This has enhanced the optics of our logo dramatically. More work on introducing some vibrant colours on the logo will be forthcoming. Stay Tuned

Next on the agenda of priority is ramping up our Lago Di Mac preparations where it is all hands-on deck. We have submitted our Lake Macquarie City Council (LMCC) grant Event Submission Round 1 on April 24 and we are awaiting a response. Just to note the submission is 14 pages long and onerous in detail. 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

Special Event: Auto Italia: April 11-13



Another year, another drive to Queanbeyan for the Auto Italia. We wondered what adventures awaited us on this trip.

Laurel and I left on time at 9:30am Friday 11th April, all went well until we had gone over the Hawkesbury River Bridge and heading up the hill from the bridge. Laurel pointed out the water temperature was rising rapidly. I looked down at the dash and saw the alternator light was on as well. This could only mean one thing the fan belt had broken. Before I could



pull over into a breakdown parking spot on the side of the M1 the head over temperature light came on meaning I had a massive loss of water. Things were starting to look bad.

We found a safe spot and pulled over and lifted the bonnet. Sure enough, the fan belt had broken. Luckily, I had a spare belt in the boot and fitted it without too many hassles. By now the engine had cooled

down a little and I carefully removed the radiator cap and found there was no water. I carry 5 litres of water with me which proved fortunate as the 5 litres of water just brought the water level up to the correct level in the radiator. I started the engine with fingers crossed that I hadn't blown the head gasket. All appeared ok, so we continued our journey. The whole process took 40 minutes.





We had arranged to have a coffee break with Phil & Becc Hitchcock, who originally were about 30 minutes ahead of us. We rang them to say we would be running late and not to wait for us. As it turned out, as we pulled into Trappers Bakery at Goulburn, there were the Hitchcocks.. So we did end up having a break with them after all.

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
Saturday, April 12: Drive and Pizza night with the ACT Fiat Club: Keith Mitchell





It was built as a community project in 1953 by Orange City and Canobolas Shire Councils, Jack Brabham won the New South Wales Grand Prix in a Type 23 Cooper Bristol in 1953. The last race was run in 1961.



The Gnoo Blas Classic starts on the Friday with a street parade,

visit to a local winery and finally, a free BBQ meet and greet. On the Saturday, there is a display day with over



900 vehicles including motor bikes and commercials. In the evening, there is a dinner with special guests from 6pm, however it was booked out early. This year's dinner included Colin Bond.

Club Drive No 4: Coasting the Coast: May 4

Checklist for organising a CIAO Event

With more and more people organising CIAO events, the following list of 'dos and don'ts' is based on a document previously devised by Laurel Buckingham to assist in this.

There are three types of events: permanent calendar items, eg Auto Italia, Euro Motofest, Lago di Mac

Mid-week Coffee Runs

Weekend drives

Mid-week Coffee runs:

- select a venue for the event, usually Wednesday and check with the Event Coordinator for a suitable date.
- check with the proposed venue that they are open on Wednesdays, and if so, make a tentative booking for around 12 people
- confirm numbers closer to the actual day
- the editor of the Newsletter appreciates a written report, preferably more than 3 sentences and remember. It earns 5 points towards the end of year trophy, presented at the Birthday Lunch.

Weekend runs:

- select a destination and discuss with the Event Coordinator a suitable date
- if there is a drive (convoy), where is the meeting place and time, and is there ample parking and toilets
- what is the departure time and estimated arrival time at the final destination for those who are going straight there
- event destination:
 - if a picnic area, is there a BBQ, and if so, is it electric or gas and does it need money to operate.
 - are there chairs and tables, or do we need to bring our own and are there toilets
- if a **restaurant or café**, it is best to make for an initial booking for 12, and confirm a more exact number closer to the day
- what is the state of the roads ie sealed, dirt and road conditions to take note of.
- the editor of the Newsletter appreciates a written report, preferably more than 3 sentences and remember. It earns 5 points towards the end of year trophy, presented at the Birthday Lunch.

Suggestions for writing a report for the Newsletter

If you are writing a report of a CIAO event, some of the following suggestions I found in Amatori Alfa (the AROCA magazine, who borrowed it from their Victorian counterparts) may help. They have been modified somewhat to suit our events and you don't need to answer all questions. They are suggestions only and don't worry too much about spelling, punctuation or continuity. You have to make the Editor earn his huge salary.....

- Event name and description (eg Club run, Mid-week coffee run)
- Place, destination (if applicable), date, time and duration of the event
- Weather details
- Food: menu, cuisine eg Italian, seafood, coffee and cake
- Most interesting car/cars in your opinion (why, model, colour, type, year, features)
- Did anything interesting, funny, noteworthy happen during the event?
- What did you like about the day/event?
- Tell us about your car and the day (the drive there, did you get lost, run late, get booked, company etc)
- Photos: of people (if seated at tables, better with plates of food, rather than the mess of finished meals and drinks)
 - : plates of food only if interesting
 - : menu, the view, the building and external signs
 - : of the cars (very important!)


Remember: organising an event give you 5 points towards the Perpetual Trophy, a report (of more than 3 lines) also gives you 5 points.
