

Past President and Life Member Ron Grimes shares exciting news:



4½ years in the making, *Birds of the Texas Coast: Photographs* has just been published by Texas Tech University Press (TTUP). The photography was done by me, Ron Grimes (ONC life member), and the text was done by B. C. Robison. Gary Clark wrote the foreword, and Linda Feltner provided the coastal map illustration.

According to TTUP, *Birds of the Texas Coast: Photographs* is the first large-format photography work covering the entire Lone

Star coast and its representative bird life. Through photography of more than 200 coastal species, this book encompasses a deep and wide natural history of the region.

There are plenty of field guides in the world to aid in identification, range, seasons, and other details about a bird. This coffee table book is meant for more casual reading, enjoyment, and sparking an interest in coastal birding and photography.

B.C. Robison suggested we do this book - he would write most of the text and the captions, I would do the photography. As a result, I spent two years cruising up and down the Texas Coast from Sabine Pass to Brownsville to get the photos. We started off expecting to have about 125 species in the book. We wound up with 215.

The book is organized according to the natural habitats that make up the coastal zone, the 367-mile reach from Louisiana to Mexico. Each chapter deals with one habitat and presents color photographs of prominent species that occur there. All the major families of Texas coastal birds are depicted in the book. In addition, the book also includes information on birding locations, maps, clubs, and events.

#### Little Thicket Nature Sanctuary hosts Texas A&M Forest Service

On 8/12/2025, Little Thicket Nature Sanctuary received two special visitors. Mickey Merritt of Texas A&M Forest Service's *Big Tree Registry Program* and Sam Hill, a Water Resources Woodland Ecologist with Texas A&M Forest Service, came to LTNS to measure some of our large trees.

Of special interest was a Swamp Chestnut Oak tree (*Quercus michauxii Nutt.*) located along the aptly-named Big Tree Trail in the northwest portion of the sanctuary. The tree was last measured in 2011 and it ranked third in size in the state of Texas according to the *Texas Big Tree Registry*.

ONC president Mike Zuchowski, his wife Sue and Luna the cattle dog escorted our distinguished visitors to the site of the Swamp Chestnut Oak. The group also visited several other of the sanctuary's largest trees.

Mr. Merritt and Ms. Hill report that ONC's sanctuary champion Swamp Chestnut Oak has maintained its ranking as the **third largest in Texas**.

2011 measurements:
155 inches in circumference
103 feet in height
112 feet of average crown spread
Tree Index: 286 points

2025 measurements:
165 inches in circumference
107 feet in height
104 feet of average crown spread
Tree Index: 298 points

A massive limb has fallen, which contributed to the decrease in average crown spread.

Mickey Merritt commented that the tree is "...definitely still in good health and hopefully has many years left to grow."
