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Foreword

Hon. Rev. Dr. Jayme Mathias

For decades, the meeting minutes of the Board of Trustees of the Austin City Public Schools were scrawled and scribbled, then locked away, as if possessing the contents of a secret diary. Guarded at the district archives, where access is allowed only to gloved hands - and also available on microfilm at the Austin History Center--it might be argued that these Board meeting minutes indeed contain some "secrets," facts many might prefer to overlook in a city that professes to be so progressive. These minutes shed light on the continual upgrades to the West Austin School – the future Pease Elementary – while the facility conditions of the "Colored Schools" were seldom reported or resourced. "White" first-year teachers began their teaching careers at \$40 per month, while "Colored" teachers came into the system at \$35 per month. Items coming before the Board regarding "Colored" teachers or schools were often postponed and/or denied. A "White" school was "not to cost less than \$12,000," while the "Colored" school on Robertson Hill could cost no more than \$2,500. Products of the age in which they lived, trustees initially deemed women incapable of serving as principals-even though the great majority of early graduates were young ladies - and they initially insisted that women address them through men. They also categorized certain students as "Idiotic" or "Dumb."

This first volume is an attempt to bring to light the proceedings of the Board of Trustees of Austin's Public Schools 140 years ago, so that the rich, complex history of Austin and its public schools might be more widely known. Current and past trustees will certainly respect the service of early trustees, who, despite their foibles, gathered as volunteers more than 210 times during the first twelve years of the school district's history!

These minutes shed light on the roles and responsibilities of locally-elected school board members, on city and school board politics in a town not yet 50 years old, and on education at the end of the nineteenth century. Always operating by *Robert's Rules of Order*, with attention to quorum, motions and voting, the Board often operated through *ad hoc* committees, overseeing facilities and supplies, hiring teachers, disciplining students, and discussing such

issues as instruction and teacher certification. They repeatedly denied musical instruction, no doubt for fiscal reasons, and, because some trustees believed that "children under seven years were too young to be received in the City Schools," they repeatedly debated scholastic age, only reluctantly dropping it below the age below eight, or below the age of seven in special circumstances. Trustees endured the intrigues of Mayor Joseph Nalle, whose scurrilous reports to representatives in D.C. and whose orders to his City Treasurer to withhold school taxes from the Austin City Schools no doubt led trustees to insist that his successors serve on their Board.

Written during the construction and inauguration of the state's new Capitol in May 1888, allowing the school district to establish its High School in the old "Temporary Capitol," these meeting minutes also provide a glimpse into a people whose world included telegrams, stables, railroads, and even an old arsenal and barracks that would become a public school.

While we are certainly excited to share this peek into history, we are hopeful that these transcriptions might one day be even more readily available and more widely shared through digital means, so that more readers will appreciate the historical complexities that revolved around the educational issues in Texas' capital.

We invite you to enjoy these minutes! You'll recognize the names of those for whom schools were later named: Trustees Alexander Penn Wooldridge, Zachary Taylor Fulmore, J. Walter Graham and William J. Mathews; Superintendent John B. Winn; respected administrators Hightower Theodore Kealing, Edward Lavoisier Blackshear, Octavia Clifton, Mary B. "Mollie" Dawson, Florence Ralston Brooke, and Timothy Alvin "T.A." Brown; and beloved teachers Anna Webb Blanton, Margaret T. Reilly, Laura Allison and Lucy Read. More importantly, you'll learn the names of many "unsung heroes," whose presence in these minutes testifies to their magnanimous service to Austin's public schools—even if their memory is largely lost to history, like so many reports of the first superintendent.

We share here a few tips to decipher this work. Page numbers from the original book of minutes are contained in square brackets, and the penciled notes in margins—a primitive system of cataloging the contents of the minutes—are italicized in brackets. Signatures are expressed in braces (or "curly brackets"). Blanks in the minutes are indicated by underscores (or "low lines") with no text above. Finally, the few instances of truly illegible, undecipherable scrawl are labeled [illegible].

Though errors in the spelling of names are corrected in this work, we largely leave intact the English language as it was spoken and written 140 years ago: Latin phrases are retained, people speak "in behalf of" others, and "inst." expressed that something would occur later that month.

We also draw your attention to the appendices and index of this work, intended to assist research and help readers better understand the history of board actions, the schools operated by the district, the people involved in Austin's early schools, and the facilities and supplies necessary for public school instruction at the end of the nineteenth century.

This work would not have been possible without the assistance of Austin ISD Assistant Director of Library Media Services Elizabeth Polk and the Executive Assistants of our Austin ISD Board, Terrie Reyes-Kitch and Laura Orosco, who granted us access to the tomes of minutes in our Austin ISD archives.

This transcription was a team effort. I express my heartfelt gratitude to my executive assistant, Carlos Alonso Rodríguez, who coordinated the work of this project, captured photos of all meeting minutes, and endured the eyestrain of attempting to decipher pages of scrawled text. I am also grateful to Teague Roberts, our intern from St. Edward's University, who assisted with these transcriptions.

Lastly, I wish to share my gratitude for the voters of District 2 in the Austin Independent School District, who allowed me to serve the 86,000 children and 11,000 employees of our public schools during these past eight years, and for the many trustees and three Superintendents with whom I served. I count myself honored to have shared my life in service of so many good folks, and I fervently hope that these transcriptions might assist others to better serve our students and their families – both now and in the future.

Plan of Organization and Structure of the Austin City Public Schools

The Public Schools of Austin, Texas shall be formed and classified upon the following plan, to wit: They shall be divided into I. Primary Schools, II. Grammar Schools, and III. High Schools.

I. Primary Schools

The course of study and the instruction imparted in the schools shall be apportioned into four parts or grades, called respectively the First, Second, Third and Fourth Grades of the Austin Public Schools, and [in] each grade, the course of instruction which therein covers a period of a scholastic year, or term of 10 months, shall be subdivided into two parts, called respectively, the 1st and 2nd Divisions of its Grade, and each such Division shall extend over the period of a scholastic session of five months. The branches of learning taught in the Primary Schools of Austin, Texas shall be elemental in their character, progressing by successive steps of advancement up to and including an accurate knowledge of the fundamental parts of reading, writing, spelling, primary geography, and primary arithmetic. Special stress shall be laid upon oral and blackboard instruction and thoroughness of understanding, and not undue advancement of the pupils shall be the principal object to be attained in the primary grades of these Schools. Each Primary grade shall consist of not less than twenty-five nor more than fifty pupils to be in attendance therein, and to each such grade so constituted one teacher shall be assigned [2] to whom shall be paid a monthly salary of forty dollars.

II. Grammar Schools

The course of study taught in these Schools shall be apportioned into three Grades, called respectively the 5th, 6th and 7th Grades of the Austin City Public Schools. Each Grade which covers the period of a scholastic year shall be subdivided into two parts or classes called respectively the 1st and 2nd Divisions of its grade, and the course of study in each such Division shall comprehend a scholastic session of five months.

The course of study in the Grammar Grades of the Austin City Public Schools shall, in the main, be a completion of the branches begun in the Primary Grades: reading, writing, geography (physical and political), arithmetic (mental and practical), shall be taught with the utmost thoroughness, and with frequent reviews, and to these branches, elemental English grammar shall be added and taught carefully throughout the three years assigned to these Grades. English orthography, with the aid to it desired from a consideration of the derivation of words and their significance shall receive proper attention; and, in the last year of the Grammar Grades, an outline history of the U.S. and of the state of Texas, shall be given to the pupils in the form of some suitable compendious histories thereof. The Grammar Grades shall consist of not less than thirty nor more than sixty pupils, and the teachers of these Grades shall receive a monthly compensation of fifty dollars.

The express object of this department of the Austin Public Schools shall be to thoroughly establish pupils in an accurate knowledge of the fundamental branches [3] of a practical English education, so that when a pupil shall have completed the course of study contemplated for the grades, he will be adequately prepared to begin a life of usefulness, success and honor, should inclination or ability to further prosecute his studies be wanting.

In the Primary and Grammar Grades of the Austin City Public Schools, the male and female sexes shall be educated together.

III. High Schools

The course of Instruction and study taught in the Austin City High Schools shall be apportioned into three Departments, called respectively the Junior, Intermediate and Senior Classes of the Austin City High Schools, and each class (which covers the period of a scholastic year) shall be subdivided into two parts, called respectively the first and second Divisions of its class, and each such Division, in regard to time, shall constitute a scholastic session of five months.

In these schools, there shall be a Mathematical and a Classical Course.

Mathematical Course

In the Mathematical Course of these Schools, the Science of Arithmetic, Bookkeeping, Algebra, Geometry, plane and solid, Trigonometry, analytical and descriptive, English Grammar in its higher departments, elocution, and drawing shall be taught with care and thoroughness. English Composition and Rhetoric shall be begun and completed, and, in the sciences, Physics and Chemistry shall receive their due share of attention, leaving Physiology, Geology, Botany and Zoology as optional courses. History – Ancient, Medieval and Modern – shall receive special [4] consideration.

In addition to the above studies in the Austin High Schools, a supplemental course of study, to be called as above indicated the Classical Course of the Austin City High Schools, shall be provided for such as desire to obtain either a more finished education than such as is afforded by the Mathematical Course of the Austin City High Schools or contemplate entering some university or college.

The course of study of the Classical Department shall consist, in addition to the Mathematical Course of instruction, in Latin—comprehending, prose composition, Caesar and Virgil, in Greek, including prose composition, Xenophon's *Anabasis* and Homer's *lliad*, and, besides the foregoing, a limited course of Intellectual Philosophy and Political Science.

The sexes in the Austin City High Schools shall be educated apart, save that recitations made in the Classical Course may constitute an exception hereto. The teachers in the Austin City High Schools shall receive a monthly compensation of seventy-five dollars.

Miscellaneous

There shall be elected by the Board of Trustees of the Austin City Public Schools a Superintendent who shall be *ex officio* Principal of the High School and Instructor in the Classical Department thereof, a man to be chosen for his scholarly attainments and for recognized skill and efficiency as an organizer and disciplinarian; he shall exercise a close personal supervision over all of the public schools of the city of Austin, Texas, and in compensation of his services shall receive an annual [5] salary of \$1200 dollars.

Whenever demand for instruction in German shall require it, a teacher shall be chosen to receive as pay for his services a monthly salary of fifty dollars.

All teachers of the Austin City Public Schools shall be chosen by the Trustees, and, after the first year, shall hold their positions during good behavior, subject to removal, however, upon good cause, shown to the satisfaction of the Board of Trustees of the Austin Public Schools.

The Scholastic ages of pupils in attendance upon the Austin Public Schools shall be from the years seven to seventeen inclusive, making in all a period of ten years.

The White and Colored pupils will be educated apart from one another. [Pages 6-8 are blank] [9]

Minutes of the Proceedings of the Board of Trustees of the City Public Schools

Austin, Texas

November 8, 1880

Meeting of the Board of Trustees held this November 8, 1880, at the office of A.P. Wooldridge, Esquire, in Austin, Texas, at 3:00 p.m.

Present: A.P. Wooldridge, John. B. Rector, B.C. Ludlow, W. von Rosenberg, R.F. Campbell, and H.C. Still.

Upon motion of General B.C. Ludlow, A.P. Wooldridge, Esquire was nominated and elected permanent Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the Austin City Public Schools. And upon motion of Mr. R.F. Campbell, Mr. A.P. Wooldridge was appointed a committee of one to gather statistics appertaining to organization and establishment of a liberal and progressive order of Public Schools, and report same at a called meeting of the Board.

Upon motion of Mr. Still, meeting adjourned, subject to call of Chair.

Meeting of Board of Trustees held at the call of Chairman this December 31, 1880. Present: A.P. Wooldridge, Chairman, General B.C. Ludlow, Judge John B. Rector and William Rosenberg, R.F. Campbell and H.C. Still, Esquires.

Minutes of preceding meeting read and adopted.

On motion of Judge John B. Rector, Mr. William Rosenberg was elected Secretary of the Board and, upon motion of Mr. H.C. Still, General B.C. Ludlow was elected Treasurer.

Mr. A.P. Wooldridge made a verbal report at some length of matters of interest ascertained by him, by correspondence and otherwise, of a nature calculated to do good, if utilized, in our system of Public Schools. The most material part of his report being, as he stated, suitable for the consideration of the Board through its subcommittees, will not be given here. On motion of Judge John B. Rector, the Chair was directed to appoint a committee of three on organization of the Austin City Public Schools. The Chair appointed the following members: Judge John B. Rector, General B.C. Ludlow,

Mr. William Rosenberg. On motion, the Chairman was added to the committee.

The Board then adjourned, subject to call of the Chairman.

Meeting held pursuant to call of Chairman. Present: Mr. A.P. Wooldridge, Judge John B. Rector, General B.C. Ludlow, William Rosenberg, R.F. Campbell and H.C. Still, Esquires.

Minutes of the last meeting read and adopted.

Report of committee on organization presented by Mr. A.P. Wooldridge. Same was ordered read and, on motion, was adopted. It was moved and carried that the Board recommend to the City Council of the City of Austin, Texas, and request them to order an election of the taxpayers of Austin, Texas, for the purpose of voting for or against the levy of an annual tax of 1/10 of 1% to assist in maintaining the Public Schools of the City of Austin, Texas, and, upon motion of General B.C. Ludlow, the Chair was requested to appoint a committee of three to memorialize the City Council in behalf of ordering said election. The Chair appointed the following committee: Judge John B. Rector, Mr. William Rosenberg, R.F. Campbell.

On motion, Board adjourned, subject to call of the Chairman. {A.P. Wooldridge, President} {Jno. B. Rector, Secretary}

Austin, Texas May 23, 1881

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Austin City Public Schools held this day, the following business was enacted, said meeting was held at the office of Mr. Wooldridge.

The minutes of the preceding meeting were read and adopted.

On motion of General Ludlow, it was ordered by the Board that the City Council be requested to order an election by the citizens of Austin to take place in June 1881, to determine whether they will authorize the levy of a tax of 1 mill on the taxable property in said city.

[*Committee on Textbooks*] On motion of General Ludlow, the following committee was appointed, by the Chairman, on textbooks: General Ludlow, Judge Fulmore, John B. Rector, and the Chairman, A.P. Wooldridge, was, by request, added to said committee. The

committee was to have the privilege of calling in eminent teachers to consult with.

On motion of Mr. Still, the following committee was appointed to ascertain what buildings can be secured at suitable points for school purposes and, where houses cannot be secured, then to ascertain suitable sites for school houses, to wit: General Ludlow, Mr. Still, Mr. R.F. Campbell, and, on request, the Chairman, Mr. Wooldridge, was added to said committee.

On motion of John B. Rector, it was ordered by the Board that the Secretary do advertise for 30 days that those desiring to become teachers [13] in the Austin City Public Schools do make application on or before the first day of July, 1881, indicating the position they desire, said teachers so making applications to be subjected to a competitive examination on and after first of July 1881, said advertisement to include applicants for Superintendent.

[*Committee on Competitive Examinations*] On motion, the following committee was appointed on competitive examinations: General Ludlow, John B. Rector, and, by request, the Chairman was added to the committee.

There were present and participating in this meeting the following members of the committee: Chairman A.P. Wooldridge, General Ludlow, Mr. Still, Judge Fulmore, and John B. Rector.

On motion, the Board adjourned, subject to call of the Chairman.

On motion of General Ludlow, it was ordered that the memorial now pending before the City Council be so far modified and changed as to ask the Council to order a vote to be taken by the citizens of Austin on July 26, 1881, to determine whether or not they will order a levy of one-fifth of one percent on the taxable property of said city.

On motion, Board adjourned, subject to call of the Chairman.

It was moved and adopted that no teacher be elected whose average fell below 75% for Primary and 80% for Grammar grades.

Under said resolution, the following teachers were selected: Miss Octavia Clifton, Miss Lula Linn, Miss Felicia Miller, Miss Aurelia Brown, Miss Mary V. Jones, Miss Julia McCormick, Miss Mary L. Sloss, Mrs. Theresa Ziller.

On motion, the Board adjourned, subject to call of the Chairman. {A.P. Wooldridge, President} {Jno. B. Rector, Secretary}

Austin, Texas August 24, 1881

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees of the Austin City Public Free Schools, held at the office of A.P. Wooldridge, there were present: A.P. Wooldridge, Chairman, R.F. Campbell, H.C. Still and John B. Rector.

On motion of Mr. Still, it was ordered that the Superintendent, Professor Winn, be requested to rent School houses for four months, with the privilege of taking same houses four months longer.

On motion of General Ludlow, [18] it was ordered that all scholars of the Grammar grades living west of Congress Avenue shall go to the Graded School house.

[*Sixth Ward: Wooldridge*] On motion of R.F. Campbell, it was ordered that a Primary school be established in the Sixth Ward.

[11th & Rio Grande] On motion of Mr. Still, it was ordered that the children of the Primary grades go to the Graded School house from the Third, Fourth and Fifth Wards.

[*Primary*] On motion of J.B. Rector, it was ordered that a Primary school be established at some suitable point for the First and Second Wards.

[*Paschal*] On motion of R.F. Campbell, it was ordered that the Primary and Grammar schools for the Ninth and Eleventh Wards be established at the Paschal house.

[*Grammar School*] On motion of B.C. Ludlow, it was ordered that the Primary and Grammar grades of the Eighth Ward be located at or about the German School house.

It was moved that Mr. Walter Tips should be recommended to the voters of the city for a school trustee in the place of Mr. Rosenberg's, [who has] resigned. It was moved that Judge Rector, Colonel Campbell and General Ludlow be appointed a committee to get [election] tickets.

[*Seventh Ward*] It was moved that the Superintendent be requested to locate the Grammar and Primary school in the Seventh Ward.

Moved that the assignment of teachers be committed to Colonel Campbell, Superintendent and President.

On motion, the Board adjourned, subject to call the Chairman.

It was moved and carried that the action of the Superintendent in opening the City Schools on the 12th instead of the 15th of September, as announced, be approved.

[*Rates of Tuition*] On motion, it was resolved that the following be the rates of tuition for the several grades: Primary \$1.50, Grammar \$2.00, High School \$3.50.

It was moved that an instructor of German be employed in the City Schools. Carried. On motion of Mr. Still, it was ordered that the Chairman and Superintendent be requested to secure a German teacher for the City Schools.

On motion of Judge Rector, it was ordered that the purchases of supplies for schools, made by the Superintendent, be approved.

On motion of Judge Rector, it was resolved that a committee of two be appointed to purchase such necessary furniture as still may be needed by the City Schools. Colonel Campbell and General Ludlow were appointed.

[*High School*] It was moved and carried that the Superintendent be requested to make arrangement to supply the High School with a temporary teacher. It was moved and carried that Miss Lucy Howard be assigned to duty in the City Schools.

It was moved and carried that a committee of Judge Rector, Dr. Swearingen and Superintendent be authorized to correspond with teachers for our High School.

At a meeting of the Trustees of the Public Free Schools of Austin City, held in the office of the President, A.P. Wooldridge, the following proceedings were had.

On motion of Dr. Swearingen, it was ordered that the Secretary procure suitable books for the Treasurer and Secretary of the Board.

[*Committee on Rules & Regulations*] On motion of Judge Rector, it was ordered by the Board that Dr. R.M. Swearingen, A.P. Wooldridge, the Chairman, Judge Rector and Professor Winn be appointed as a committee to frame rules for the government of the Board, and also for the government of the Public Free Schools of Austin.

[*Committee on Supplies*] On motion of J.B. Rector, it was ordered that General Ludlow, Colonel Campbell, Mr. Still and Professor J.B. Winn be appointed a committee to procure stoves and wood for the Public Free School.

[*Seventh Ward: Murrah*] On motion of Mr. Still, it was ordered that the Superintendent be requested to rent from Mr. Murrah an additional building in Seventh Ward.

On motion of the Board adjourned subjects to call of the Chairman. {A.P. Wooldridge, President} {Jno. B. Rector, Secretary}

> Austin, Texas September 23, 1881

At a meeting of the Board of Trustees, there were present: A.P. Wooldridge, Chairman, R.F. Campbell, General B.C. Ludlow, Dr. R.M. Swearingen, and Judge Z.T. Fulmore by proxy to Dr. Swearingen.

The subject in reference to the election of a teacher of German was taken up.

On motion of Dr. R.M. Swearingen, it was ordered that the Committee on Supplies be ordered to examine into the value of Mr. Brush stoves at the Graded School building.

The Board then fully discussed the testimony pro and con, and, the premise being carefully considered, it was ordered, on motion of J.W. Graham, that the action of the Chairman in suspending the said W.T. Phillips be sustained and that the suspension be made indefinite.

Sayers to procure by Congressional action a transfer to the School Board for educational [148] purposes of the old Arsenal Block in this city was made on his part solely upon the repeated official solicitations of the School Board of this city and the individual members thereof.

Resolved that the grateful acknowledgments of this Board are due, and they are hereby tendered, to the Honorable Joseph D. Sayers for his successful effort in behalf of the public schools of Austin.

Resolved that, in our judgment, the bill he has procured to pass the Lower House of Congress does meet the cordial approval of the vast majority of our people.

Resolved that a copy of the official acts of the Austin School Board in the matter of procuring federal legislation, looking to a transfer to this city for school purposes of the old Arsenal Block be furnished to the City Council for its information, and that a copy of the same be furnished to the city papers for publication.

Resolved also that a copy of the following telegram be signed by the individual members of the School Board and be sent to the Honorable Joseph D. Sayers.

On motion of Mr. Tips, the resolutions were adopted.

On motion, the applications were granted, and the Superintendent was authorized to deduct the state funds of these nine children from the amount due by the County to the City, on account of transfer of pupils,

The matter of allowing patrons to send their children to the school at the Temporary Capitol as a matter of convenience was left to the discretion of the Superintendent.

[*High School (Temporary Capitol)*] On motion, permission was granted to the Principal of the High School to dismiss the High School pupils at two o'clock p.m., to have no intermediate recess between the 9:00 a.m. and 2:00 p.m., if, in his judgment, it seemed best.

On motion, the sum of \$25 was appropriated for the purpose of repairing the gallery in the rear of the Temporary Capitol, and the Superintendent was instructed to request the State Superintendent of the building to refund the same.

[*Scholastic Age*] On motion, it was decided to allow no children under seven years of age to [169] enter the public schools, unless written application had been made to the Board of Trustees and granted, and all such pupils as may be allowed to enter are to be charged tuition at the rate of \$1.50 cents per month until they shall reach the age of seven years.

[*Scholastic Age*] After some discussion, the resolution passed at last meeting, allowing children under seven years of age to be enrolled, was called up for reconsideration. On motion, the resolution was repealed, and all permissions heretofore granted under its provisions were revoked.

On the recommendation of the President, it was moved that the President and Superintendent be authorized to make provisional [171] arrangements for furnishing a suitable instruction to such Colored pupils as were prepared to enter the junior year of the High School course.

The petition of Mr. Lutz to be excused from making good his county fund was discussed and passed over without any definite action.

[*Finance*] On motion, the Secretary was instructed to request the Mayor to call a special meeting of the City Council for the 15th inst. to take action on a requisition from the Board for funds sufficient to meet the payroll for month ending October 17, 1888. [173]

On motion, holiday was granted on Friday, October 12.

On motion, the President and Superintendent were authorized to secure an additional teacher for the junior class of the High School, provided it can be done without making any addition to the number of teachers now in the City Public Schools.

He affirmed the poor [177] grading to the fact that the regulations were not properly carried out by the teachers.

The President further suggested that the Board begin to consider the advisability of increasing the efficiency of the present system of school work by the employment of specialists in certain lines. He suggested the following as probably the most important:

- a teacher of penmanship and drawing,
- a teacher of reading and elocution,
- a teacher of music and calisthenics,
- a principal for the four primary grades, and
- another for the four grammar grades.

[*Reilly*] The application of Miss Reilly to be allowed the salary of a second-year teacher was brought up and, on motion, the Board declined to depart from the established rule governing such cases.

Board of Trustees for Public Schools of the City of Austin: Gentleman, on the 22nd January, 1888, Mr. John T. Allan of this city died, leaving a will, of which the following is a copy.

Know all men that I, John T. Allan, of Austin, in the County of Travis and State of Texas, being of sound mind, though in feeble health, considering the uncertainty of life, do hereby make and publish this as my last will and testament, and repealing all and any former will or testament by me made.

<u>First:</u> I give and bequeath to Geraldine C. Osborn, daughter of Daniel C. Osborne of New Orleans, Louisiana, \$5,000.

<u>Second</u>: I give all the rest of my property—real, personal and mixed—to the City of Austin in Travis County in the state of Texas, in trust for the following purposes, to wit, to establish in the City of Austin aforesaid an industrial school, in which shall be taught the practical use of tools, as well as scientific principles as applied to labor.

<u>Third</u>, I hereby appoint James P. [191] Richardson and Louis N. Goldbeck, both of Austin aforesaid, to be executors of this, my last will, and direct that they shall not be required to give bond of any kind.

In testimony whereof, I hereunto sign my name in the presence of the witnesses whose names are hereunto subscribed and who have signed in my presence and in the presence of each other this 18th day of January in the year 1888. {John T. Allan}

Witnesses: {J.M. Litten} {Frank Litten} {John Webourg}

The said will was admitted to probate in the County Court of said Travis County at the April term 1888 and, by order of said court, the real estate belonging to the estate was at once transferred to the City of Austin, there being sufficient personal property to pay all debts and claims against the estate.

The City Council of Austin accepted said real estate and appointed Misters Eggleston and Goldbeck to have the case and to dispose of the same for the City. Since that time, the Attorney General, the Legislature of the State, the District Court, and the City Council have decided that the properly bequeathed by the said will properly rests in your Board of Trustees for the use of the City Schools.

We understand that the City Council has referred our communication regarding the matter to your Board for action.

The administration of the estate is now closed, and we have in our hands \$7,087 which we are ready to pay over to the Treasurer of your Board, as soon as you will signify your acceptance of the [192] property and the trust as set forth in said will. Such acceptance should be by resolution, officially certified, so that it may be filed with the record in the County Court.

Dr. J.M. Litten, in behalf of the Finance Committee, reported that the vouchers of the City School Treasurer, Mr. Walter Tips, had been examined, and his books and accounts were found to be correct.

The President of the Board, Mr. A.P. Wooldridge, then delivered an annual message setting forth his plans and purposes for the future management of the City Schools and asked the patient attention of the Board while he presented the more prominent and important features thereof.

He recommended first that the teachers who have been in the employment of the Board five years or more shall receive an increase of 5% upon their monthly salaries, and, when they shall have been in its employment ten years or more, they shall receive an increase of 10% on their monthly salaries. [207] And secondly, that teachers be

paid by the scholastic [month] and not by the calendar month. On motion of Dr. Swearingen, it was ordered that the first proposition be adopted.

It is understood that the proposed increase in salaries shall apply only to teachers of the primary and grammar grades, and that the salaries of teachers already in the schools who have not been in the service five years shall not be affected by the proposed changes in the salaries and classification of teachers.

In the third place, he recommended that the principals of the East and West Austin Schools have assistants, that they may be relieved largely of their teaching work, so that they may supervise the grammar grades especially. He considered it impossible for the Superintendent, with his present multitudinous duties, to attend efficiently to laying out or carrying into results the work of the grade rooms and, under the present system, the principals neither can nor do attempt to do this most necessary work.

On motion of Mr. Graham, it was ordered that the Principals of the East and West Austin schools be allowed assistants at a monthly salary of \$40 each.

The next recommendation was that a supervisor of all the Colored schools be appointed, a part of whose duties shall be to give instruction in the Colored High School. The salary was placed at \$750 *per annum*. This recommendation was also favorably considered and passed to a vote.

On motion, it was ordered that the salaries of Miss Octavia Clifton, Miss H.A. McCrillis and the Colored Supervisor [208] be placed at \$750 *per annum*.

The following teachers were reengaged: Misses S.R. Cooke, Maggie Riley, Mary Horton, Minnie Dill, K.R. Carlisle and Mrs. Irma Taff.

The following Colored teachers were reemployed: Mrs. M.E. Neale, H.T. Kealing and P.H. Hubbard. There were other Colored teachers recommended for employment, but the matter was postponed to the next meeting.

On motion of Dr. Swearingen, it was ordered that the services of a clerk be engaged for the Superintendent's office.

[*Sixth Ward*] The Committee on Repair and Improvements reported favorably upon the work done at the Sixth Ward School building.

[*West Austin*] The same committee was instructed to order the necessary repairs upon the West Austin School building.

[*East Austin*] On motion, the Building Committee was authorized to have some improvements made at the East Austin School building.

It was ordered that the schools be opened on September 16, 1889.

On motion, the Board adjourned. {*A.P. Wooldridge, President*}

[John T. Allan] On motion of Mr. Walter Tips, it was ordered that, as a mark of respect to the late Judge John T. Allan, the Board appropriate such a sum of money as shall be found necessary to keep in order his grave in the City Cemetery. A committee consisting of Misters Graham, Tips and Litten was appointed to confer with the City Council in regard to placing a railing or stone at the grave of Judge Allen.

A paper from Miss Arta B. Numbers was then read, asking that the Board appropriate money sufficient to furnish supplies for the object work in the first and second years of the primary department. On motion of Mr. Walter Tips, the Superintendent was requested to confer with Miss Numbers in regard to the supplies asked for, and report at the next meeting of the [210] Board.

It was order that the Superintendent confer with the Trustees of the Colored Deaf and Dumb Institute and ascertain whether they desire the services of Professor Chatterton, while he is in the city.

On motion of Judge Fulmore, a committee of three, consisting of Misters Graham, Litten and Maxwell, were authorized to purchase such a quantity of new, self-adjusting school desks, as upon consultation with the Superintendent, should be found necessary.

On motion of Dr. Litten, the Board appropriated the sum of ______ for the purchase of supplies, of object forms, number work, etc., needed in the primary department.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the Board gave to Superintendent Winn the power to make such transfers and changes in the classification of pupils as he should deem necessary, he to make report of all such transfers and changes to the Board.

Mr. J.W. Graham was appointed a [212] committee of one to appear before the County Commissioners in the interest of the City Schools, in regard to the payment of the amount due the City as a *pro rata* of the income accruing from county school lands for the years 1888 and 1889.

[*Buildings Fund*] Mr. Wooldridge then read a paper setting forth a plan for raising a fund for the erection of High School and other Ward School buildings, which fund he suggested could be raised with an additional tax upon the people.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

On motion of Judge Fulmore, it was ordered that due notice be given those pupils belonging to the eighth grade of the West Austin School and living on the east side of Congress Avenue that, because of the overcrowding of said grade, they must, after January 1, 1890, attend the East Austin School and that, in future, the rule requiring pupils to attend the school to which they belong be strictly enforced.

The President then brought to the attention of the Board as a matter for their future consideration the propriety of introducing sewing into the Colored Schools of the city. He also expressed the hope that the Colored Schools might receive their share of attention from the Board and that the primary grades especially might receive the material which they needed in order to carry out the prescribed course of study.

The names of the candidates for graduation were then read and, on motion of Dr. J.M. Litten, were confirmed, conditioned on their passing the remaining examinations.

[*Temporary Capitol*] The lease of the third floor of the Temporary Capitol to L.R. Walden was referred to the Judiciary Committee for investigation or revision. On motion of Dr. J.M. Litten, the Building Committee was instructed to inform the agent of the Board that, after July 1, the Salvation Army and Union Sunday School could no longer occupy [236] their respective rooms in the Temporary Capitol.

[*East Austin*] The petition of the German Lutheran Church for the use of one of the rooms at the East Austin school for the purpose of holding a school therein during the summer months was, on motion of J.W. Graham, granted, conditioned on their using the Deffenbaugh Building and paying therefore to the Public School the same amount per month as is paid by the Schools for the rent of the building.

The Committee on Supplies submitted a report, approving the request of the Superintendent for certain supplies for the use of the High School and other schools, and, on motion of John McDonald, the Board appropriated funds necessary for the purchase of the same.

On motion of W.J. Mathews, the question of readmitting to the schools those children who had been excluded because of their refusal to be vaccinated or because of their having been exposed to the contagion of smallpox, was referred to the President of the Board.

On motion of John McDonald, the petition to readmit Joel Stamps, who had been indefinitely suspended by action of the Board during [264] the current session, was granted.

The Secretary then read a communication from Mrs. B.F. Hendricks, stating that her son, Franklin Hendricks, a pupil during the first term of the current session of the low eighth grade of the West Austin School, had been refused promotion to the High School, which promotion, she claimed, he was well-qualified for and entitled to, as some four other pupils of his grade who had received such promotion from the Superintendent. She asked that the Board investigate the matter and promote him to the High School.

After thoroughly investigating the matter, the Board, on motion of Walter Tips, instructed the Secretary to write Mrs. Hendricks, that her son, Franklin, had received the promotion due him on his class standing for the first term from the low to the high division of the eighth grade, and the Board could see no reason for giving him further promotion, for which he was not qualified, and to which he was not entitled.

The question then arose as to whether any action should, in justice, be taken in regard to the four pupils who had, through a misunderstanding of the Superintendent, been allowed to skip the high eighth grade and were by him promoted to the High School, and, on motion [265] of John McDonald, they were ordered to be demoted to the high eighth grade, to which they properly belonged.

On motion of John McDonald, the Board granted the petition of Miss Mary L. Boak, Clerk of the Superintendent, asking that the Board increase her salary from \$50 per month, the amount now paid her, to \$60 per month.

On motion of J.W Graham, the Board approved the action of the Superintendent in employing Miss Mary M. Leverett to fill the vacancy created in the High School by the semi-annual promotions.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

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At a regular meeting of the City Schools Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.W. Graham, John McDonald, J.W. Smith, William Von Rosenberg.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Superintendent was read, giving the general condition of the Schools and calling special attention to the increasing enrollment and attendance.

[*Old Court House*] He stated that the enrollment at the West Austin School already exceeded the maximum seating capacity. While the enrollment of the First Ward School would soon make it necessary to have better accommodating there, he suggested that the building known as the Old Courthouse in the First Ward might be procured and reconstructed to afford relief to the schools on the west side of town.

[*East Austin*] The East Austin School had also nearly reached its maximum seating capacity, and the Arsenal Block School already contained five grades under four teachers.

[*Arsenal Block*] He suggested that an additional building might be erected on the Arsenal Block property, to accommodate the excess of pupils on the east side of town.

[*Temporary Capitol*] He suggested that, as the State had taken charge of the Temporary Capitol, it might be well [267] to secure control of it for the future. It was understood that an endeavor was being made to obtain the use through legislative enactment of rooms in the Temporary Capitol for purposes which would be detrimental to the schools, and asked for instructions in regard to the matter. After hearing the report, the President referred that posting of it relating to buildings to the Building Committee. On motion of Judge Smith, the portion relating to the Temporary Capitol was also referred to the Building Committee.

The Superintendent asked what should be done with those pupils whose parents were in arrears for their tuition and, on motion of William von Rosenberg, it was ordered that the rule excluding from the schools those children whose parents refused to pay their tuition account should be strictly enforced. The Superintendent then asked if those non-resident pay pupils whose state transfer funds had not been paid should also be excluded, and, on motion of John McDonald, it

Austin, Texas March 6, 1891 was ordered that those non-residents pay pupils whose state funds had actually been transferred but had not been paid over through fault of the County Superintendent should be allowed to remain in the Schools.

A communication was then read from Colonel Joel H.B. Miller remonstrating against the [268] demotion of his daughter, Bessie Miller, from the junior grade of the High School, to which she had been promoted by error from the low eighth Grammar grade of the West Austin School, to the high eighth of said grade, to which she properly belonged. On motion of John McDonald, the communication was ordered placed on file

Professor I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, being present, stated to the Board, as a matter of interest, that a bill providing for state uniformity of textbooks had passed the Lower House of the 22nd Legislature now in session and had been submitted to the Senate. No action was taken.

[*Building Fund*] Judge J.W. Smith then notified the Board that, at the next regular meeting, he would submit a motion to have one-fourth of the fund annually received from the City for the support of the Schools set aside for building purposes.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held in the Superintendent's office this day, there were present the following members: J.M. Litten, Walter Tips, J.W. Smith, W.J. Mathews, J.W. Graham, John McDonald.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

[*First & Third Ward*] A report from Superintendent Winn was read, giving the general condition of the Schools and submitting the resignation of Miss Zelma J. Caswell, teacher of the first Primary grade of the East Austin School, and Miss Mary E. Griffin, teacher of the first and second Primary grades at the Third Ward Colored School. He stated that the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Caswell had been filled for the remainder of the session by the appointment of Miss Kate Eanes, who had one year's experience in the schools during the session of 1889-1890, while the vacancy caused by the resignation of Miss Griffin has been filled by consolidating the

First Ward School with the Third Ward School, P.H. Hubbard taking the place made vacant by the resignation of Miss Griffin.

Professor I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, being present, stated that he had suspended 12 pupils of the High School [270] for one day, for truancy on April 1. Some of said pupils had obtained the consent of their parents before playing truant, and some of them had not. Some of the parents of those children who had obtained consent before playing truant had objected to his disciplining their children for doing that which [the students] had received their parent's permission to do. He argued that, even if those who had received permission were guiltless of infringing the rules in playing truant, they were amenable to discipline on the charge of conspiracy, in having accompanied and induced others to accompany on the truant expedition those who had not received permission. He asked the opinion of the Board, as to whether he had authority to discipline them upon said charge, and, on motion of John McDonald, the Board sustained his action.

[*Rule: Building Fund*] Judge J.W. Smith, in pursuance of his notice given at the previous meeting, then submitted the following resolution: Resolved that one-fourth of the Public School Fund received by this Board from the City of Austin for the year 1891, and for each year thereafter be and is hereby set aside by this Board as a special fund which shall only be used by this Board in constructing public school buildings and in purchasing lot or lots upon which such buildings may be built, or [271] for paying off any indebtedness of this Board incurred heretofor in constructing Public School buildings. On motion of Walter Tips, the resolution was referred to the Committee on Rules, with instructions to report at the next meeting.

[*Allan Fund*] On motion of J.W. Smith, the Treasurer was instructed to pay, when it should fall due on May 1, the two years' interest on money borrowed by the General School Fund from the Allan Fund, net of any money which should be in the Treasury at that time, or from the first funds received thereafter.

The Treasurer then submitted a report of the estimated resources and liabilities for the balance of the current session, and, after considering the same, the Board, on motion of John McDonald, ordered that the schools be closed on May 15.

[*Schools Close*] On motion, the resolution ordering the schools to be closed on May 15 was reconsidered, and, on motion of J.W. Smith, it was ordered that the Public Schools be closed on May 15, with the

exception of the High School, which should be continued for two weeks longer.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a postponed meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.W. Smith, J.W. Graham, J.M. Litten, W.J. Mathews.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

The report of the Superintendent was read, giving the general conditions of the Schools and submitting several applications, petitions, etc. On motion, the report was considered *seriatim*.

The petition of E.L. Blackshear, Principal of the Robertson Hill Colored School, asking that his name be placed on the list of principals receiving annual salaries, and that his salary be increased to not less than \$750 *per annum*, was referred to the Committee on Salaries.

The application of Miss Bertha Johnson of Topeka, Kansas, for a position in the City Public Schools for the coming session, was referred to the Superintendent,

The application of the Ruttan Manufacturing Company, to place in the school buildings their system of heating and ventilating, was referred to the Building Committee.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the claim of Dr. B.F. Church, for vaccinating 140 Colored School children, was ordered paid. [273]

[*East Austin*] On motion of J.W. Smith, a petition of Miss F.R. Brooke, Principal of the Arsenal Building, for permission to occupy one of the East Austin School rooms in which to teach a school during the summer vacation, was referred to the Building Committee.

[*Temporary Capitol*] An application from Miss Lydia Littman, for the use of a school room in the Temporary Capitol in which to teach a school during the summer vacation, and, on application from Reverend H.C. Huffman, for the use of a school room in which to teach a German school during the vacation, were both referred to the Building Committee.

[*Temporary Capitol*] The application of Mr. Harry Hutchings, to rent the Old Comptroller's Department, to be used as a printing

establishment, with the privilege of using his furnace outside the building, was also referred to the Building Committee.

The following memorial was read from the teachers of the West Austin School, expressing their satisfaction with and their appreciation of the manner in which J.B. Rogers, appointed Principal of that school for the session just closed, had discharged the duties pertaining to his office. On motion of J.W Graham, it was ordered that the memorial be spread upon the minutes.

> Austin, Texas May 7, 1891

We, the undersigned teachers of the West Austin School, desire respectfully to express to the honorable Board of Trustees our high appreciation [274] of our present Principal, Professor J.B. Rogers, who, during the year now drawing to a close, has, by his unvarying courtesy to the teachers under him; his faithful discharge of every duty; his cheerful, considerate and helpful bearing under all circumstances; his earnest appreciation of the duties of our common profession; his enthusiastic study of the best, the broadest and the most progressive principles of teaching; and, most important of all, his truly Christian sense of the high responsibility of his position; has enabled us to carry on our work most pleasantly, harmoniously and successfully. In consideration of these facts, we deem it but a just recognition of his high virtues and earnest fitness for the position he now occupies to thus express our perfect satisfaction with the appointment of Mr. Rogers to this position for the year now closing and, believing that the success of the schools under our charge will be greatly enhanced, thereby we venture to express the hope that our honorable Board of Trustees will see their way clear to permanently appoint him to his present position.

The recommendation in regard [275] to placing heavier gauze over the west windows of the Old Comptroller's Department, in order to protect them from breakage, was referred to the Building Committee. The question to the Superintendent in regard to the Board making an appropriation for the entertainment of the State Teachers Association was discussed, but no action taken.

[*Rule: Building Fund*] Judge J.W. Smith then called up the following resolution, offered by him at the previous meeting, and, on motion of J.M. Litten, it was passed. Resolved that one-fourth of the Public School Fund received by this Board from the City of Austin for the year 1891 and for each year thereafter be and is hereby set aside by this Board as a special fund to be known as a Building Fund, which shall only be used by this Board in constructing public school buildings and purchasing lot or lots upon which such buildings may be built, or for paying off any indebtedness of this Board incurred heretofor in constructing public school buildings.

[*Temporary Capitol*] Mr. John Southgate of the firm of Southgate & Son here asked for a hearing, which, being granted, he stated that he had suffered considerable loss by reason of damage done by water to goods belonging to him and stored in the Old Comptroller's Department and, by theft of a portion of said goods, he asked that the Board investigate the matter and allow him damages. His complaint was referred to the Building Committee. [276]

The report was read from Superintendent J.B. Winn and, on motion of J.M. Litten, was received and considered *seriatim*.

The recommendation in regard to issuing certificates to teachers now in the service of the Schools, not holding certificates, was first considered and, on motion of J.W Graham, it was ordered that all teachers considered competent by the Superintendent and who had stood the competitive examination required of all applicants for positions in the schools, be awarded certificates.

The report of I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, giving the list of the members of the senior class recommended for graduation

and certificates, was next considered and, on motion of John McDonald, the Board approved the graduation of the following students and ordered their names and class standing as given spread upon the minutes: Leffler Corbitt 84, Daisy Crawford 88.5, Jessie Holland 79, Helen Hornsby 93.5, Annie McKay 77, Mary Pillow 72.5, Nellie Prowse 76, Lizzie Rutherford 77, Elvie Smith 77, Mabel Teagarden 75, Maude Roosevelt 77.5. [278]

The three following students were awarded certificates: Julia Baker 68, Gertrude Dunn 78, Carrie Dunn 88.5.

[*Commencement*] On motion of J.W Graham, the sum of \$30, or as much thereof as should be found necessary, was appropriated to pay the expense of the commencement exercises at Millett Opera House on Friday evening, May 29, at 8:30 p.m.

The request of H.T. Kealing, Principal of the Colored High School, for permission to close said school on Wednesday, May 27, was, on motion of J.W Mathews, granted.

On motion of J.W Graham, Superintendent Winn's recommendation in regard to much-needed repairs on school buildings was referred to the Building Committee, with authority to act.

On motion of Walter Tips, the question of retaining the service of some of the janitors during the summer vacation was referred to the Building Committee, with authority to take such steps as they should deem best.

On motion of Mr. Litten, \$25, or as much thereof as should be found necessary, was appropriated to pay for music for the commencement exercises of the High School.

The Finance Committee then submitted a report on the petition of E.L. Blackshear for an increase in his salary, which had been referred to them at the previous meeting. They approved of the increase asked for, but were not prepared to recommend it and suggested that no action be taken till the time [279] for the annual revision of the salaries of all teachers for the coming session. Their report was received and adopted.

On motion of Walter Tips, the report to the Building Committee was received and taken up *seriatim*.

The action of the committee in refusing the application of the Ruttan Manufacturing Company to supply the schools with their system of heating and ventilation was sustained. [*East Austin: Deffenbaugh*] The committee recommended that Miss Brooke be refused the use of one of the East Austin School's rooms in which to teach a school during the summer vacation, but, after some discussion, the Board, on motion of J.M. Litten, granted her the use of the Deffenbaugh building at the East Austin School, on condition that she paid the Schools the same rent per month as is paid by them for the use of said building.

The action of the committee was sustained, in refusing to Miss Lydia Littman the use of a school room in the Temporary Capitol, in which to teach a school during the summer vacation.

[*Temporary Capitol*] The application for the use of the rooms of the High School Department in the Temporary Capitol in which to hold a summer normal, should the Department of Education see fit to establish one at Austin, was granted. The application of Mr. Harry Hutchings, to lease the Old Comptroller's Department in the Temporary Capitol for a printing establishment, was granted. The motion of John McDonald, that [280] his lease should be conditioned on his using no steam engine, and that the term of his lease should not extend beyond the time for which the School Board had leased the Temporary Capitol, was carried.

[*First Ward*] On motion of J.M. Litten, Mrs. E.M.E. Garland was granted the use of the First Ward School building in which to teach a school during the summer vacation, on condition that she paid to the Schools the same rent per month as is paid by them for the use of said building.

[*Temporary Capitol*] The request of I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, for the use of some of the school rooms of the Temporary Capitol for the purpose of teaching a school therein during the summer months, was referred to the Building Committee, with authority to act.

Mr. John Southgate of the firm of Southgate & Son here asked for a hearing, which, being granted, he stated that he estimated the damage done to goods belonging to him and stored in the Old Comptroller's Department, a claim for which he had presented at the previous meeting, at \$50. He further stated that he owed the Board \$150 for unpaid rent of said rooms and [was] prepared to pay \$100 of this amount, the balance \$50 to be allowed by the Board for damage done to his property. On motion, his proposition was accepted.

H.T. Kealing, Supervisor of the Colored Schools, being present, [281] read his annual report of the condition of the Colored Schools,

and, at its close, the Board, on motion of Walter Tips, tendered acknowledgments to Mr. Kealing for his able and carefully-prepared report and his earnest interest in the Schools.

The Board then adjourned.

Hufford for the position of Principal of the Eleventh Ward School, his name, with that of Miss Mollie Dawson, whose application was presented at the previous meeting, being the only ones submitted as applicants for the position. The Board proceeded to the election of a Principal for the Eleventh Ward School. The names of Charles H. Hufford and Miss Mollie Dawson being placed in nomination, a vote was taken, which resulted in a tie, three votes being cast for Mr. Hufford, and three for Miss Dawson. [*Temporary Capitol*] On motion of J.W. Smith, the question of how to abate the nuisance created in the High School Department, made by the movement of the machinery of Hutchings Printing House, was referred to the Building Committee.

On motion of J.W. Smith, the Building Committee was authorized to confer with Judge William von Rosenberg, Superintendent of County Schools in regard to transferring to the custody of the City all school furniture and other school property belonging to that portion of the County which had recently been annexed to the City.

The Secretary then read the resignation of Miss Arta B. Numbers, Supervisor of the Primary grades of the Austin Public Schools, and, on [291] motion of J.M. Litten, it was accepted by the Board.

J.W. Smith submitted the following report of the Committee on Teachers:

Your committee makes the following recommendations:

First, that Miss Carrington be not engaged as teacher in the High School.

Seventh, that Miss Anna P. Ellis be reelected teacher in East Austin Schools.

[*Miss Kate Eanes elected*] Eighth, that Miss Kate Eanes be elected as teacher in the East Austin Schools.

Nineth, that Miss Mary L. Sloss be transferred to some other school.

Tenth, that M.E. Neale and Anna E. Grinage be reelected as teachers in Robertson Hill School.

Eleventh, that R.E.L. Holland be reelected as teacher in the Third Ward Colored School.

[292] On motion of J.W. Graham, the report was received and considered *seriatim*.

On motion of John McDonald, Section 1 was approved.

On motion of J.W. Graham, Section 2 was approved.

On motion of John McDonald, Section 3 was approved, Sections 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 9, 10 and 11 were read, and, there being no objection, stood approved.

On motion of John McDonald, the report was then adopted as a whole.

John McDonald then rose and addressed the Board on the rule excluding from the schools all pupils under eight years of age. He said he had been opposed to the proposition before it became a rule and was still opposed to it and hoped to see it changed. He was followed by W.J. Mathews, who was also strongly opposed to the rule and spoke in favor of admitting pupils at the age of seven years. When he had closed, Mr. McDonald moved to postpone the time for enforcing the rule excluding children under eight years of age for 12 months. The motion was lost.

At a called meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.M. Litten, J.W. Graham, Walter Tips, John McDonald, J.W. Smith, W.J. Mathews.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A report from the Superintendent was read, and, on motion of J.W. Graham, that portion of it referring to a change in textbooks now in use in the High School was referred to the Committee on Textbooks.

On motion of John McDonald, the report was received and considered *seriatim*.

On motion of J.M. Litten, the following recommendations of the Superintendent, in regard to issuing certificates to those applicants for positions who did the competitive examination, was approved. It is recommended that first-grade certificates be issued to the nine teachers who passed the examination, and that second- and third-grade certificates be issued to those who did not pass, to be given according to merit of percent of scholarship, that the second- and third-grade be good for one year and given to those who elect to serve as substitute teachers.

On motion of J.M. Litten, \$650, or as much thereof as should be found [294] necessary, was appropriated to purchase furniture, blackboards and such supplies as are necessary for the organization of the schools.

[*Oak Hill*] J.M. Litten, Chairman of the Building Committee, then reported that the Committee had, by virtue of the authority given them at the previous meeting, rented the Oak Hill School house, for which they had agreed to pay the sum of \$7 per month during the school session.

The Secretary then read a communication from Miss Mignmette Carrington, during the session of 1890 to 1891 a teacher in the High School, defending herself against charges which are believed had been brought against her by I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School. In support of her statements, she filed testimonials from Mrs. Daisy Crawford and Carrie Dunn, members of the senior class in the High School during the past session.

Judge J.T. Fulmore, being present, asked permission to address the Board for a few minutes in behalf of Miss Carrington. He stated that he did not come before the Board to ask for her reinstatement, but, believing an injustice had been done her, he asked that the Board either make a thorough investigation of the case or that the statements in regard to Miss Carrington be expunged from the records.

After some discussion, Walter Tips offered the following resolution, which was approved: Resolved that, [295] in the action taken by this, the Board of Trustees of the Austin Public Schools, on the third day of July, 1891, the refusal to re-engage the services of Miss Mignmette Carrington, a teacher in the High School, was not based on the statement made in regard to her in the report of I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, and is in no way intended as a reflection upon her character as a lady or her ability as a teacher.

The election of teachers coming up, Dr. J.M. Litten placed the name of Miss Mary Lowry in nomination for the position of teacher at Oak Hill School house, but, after some further discussion, withdrew her name and, on motion of Walter Tips, the election of teachers was postponed until Thursday, July 30, at five o'clock, when the report of the Superintendent should be received.

A report was read from Superintendent J.B. Winn in regard to the number of teachers needed for the coming session. The report was received, and, on motion of J.M. Litten, the Board proceeded to the election of teachers.

A list of eligible applicants was read in the order of their scholarship and, on motion, Miss Mary Lowry was elected to a position as teacher.

On motion of J.W. Smith, Miss Anna Jary was elected a teacher.

On motion of J.W. Graham, Miss Mary E. Johnson was elected a teacher.

J.W. Graham then placed in nomination the name of Miss Octavia Clifton to fill the vacancy in the High School. John McDonald moved, as a substitute to Mr. Graham's motion, to postpone the election to fill the vacancy in the High School, which motion was lost, and the vote being taken on Mr. Graham's motion resulted in the election of Miss Clifton.

The Secretary then read a report of the Finance Committee fixing the salaries of teachers for the coming year, and, on motion, it [297] was received and adopted.

The following report of the Textbook Committee was read and, on motion of J.W. Smith, adopted:

- That Myer's *General History* and Montgomery's *History of England* be substituted for Anderson's *General History*.
- That Appleton's *School Physics* be substituted for Avery's *First Principles in Natural Philosophy*
- That Woods' *Lessons in Botany* be substituted for Gray's *Field & School Book*
- That LeCompt's *Compendium of Geology* and Holder's *Zoology* be adopted.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.M. Litten, John McDonald, J.W. Smith, W.J. Mathews, Walter Tips.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A report from Superintendent J.B. Winn was read, received and taken up *seriatim*.

On motion of J.M. Litten, Miss Lizzie Rumsey was elected to fill a vacancy in the West Austin School.

On motion of J.W. Smith, the resignation of Miss Nannie Kelley was accepted, and, at the suggestion of the President, the Superintendent was requested to express the regrets of the Board for the loss of so faithful a teacher. On motion of John McDonald, the following children were granted a transfer from the City to the County Schools: Ralph, Mabel, Janie, Myrtle, Lucy and Rebecca Cloud.

On motion of J.W. Smith, an application for the transfer of Alice and Minnie Moreland from Austin to Merrilltown District #9 was granted.

A petition from the parents of the following children living within the new City limits to have them transferred from the City to the Go Valle School was granted, on motion of John McDonald. [299]

On motion of Walter Tips, that portion of the Superintendent's report relating to an additional building at the Arsenal Block was referred to the Building Committee for investigation, with instructions to report the result of their investigation to the Board. Mr. Tips amended his motion to read, "referred to the Building Committee, with authority to act, providing the expense does not exceed \$50," which was passed.

[*Oak Hill: Scott's Store*] On motion of J.W. Smith, it was ordered that the use of the South Austin, Oak Hill and Scott's Store School houses be allowed for purposes of divine worship and Sunday school, provided that the persons so using them defray their *pro rata* of the expense in the consumption of fuel, lights and janitors' services.

Treasurer Tips submitted his financial report for the year beginning July 1, 1890 and closing August 31, 1891, and, on motion of J.M. Litten, his report was received, adopted, and the thanks of the Board tendered him for the same.

Mr. Tips then stated to the Board that the trustees of the Allan Fund held vendor's lien notes secured by real estate and other negotiable paper to the amount of about \$7,000, which he believed, if it could be realized on, could be profitably invested in a \$10,000 building at the Arsenal Block, provided the balance of the expense, about \$3,000, could be provided for by giving [300] mechanic's lien notes on the building or by similar means.

[*East Austin*] J.W. Smith then stated that, if such a plan proved available for the Arsenal Block, he could see no reason why an additional \$10,000 should not be borrowed for the purpose of erecting a building at East Austin, similarly secured and refunded from the current year's sinking fund for building purposes.

On motion of J.W. Smith, the question of the legality of the Board making notes for money borrowed for building purposes was referred to the Finance Committee, for investigation, with instructions to report the result to the Board.

[*West Austin, Sixth Ward & Oak Hill*] J.M. Litten, Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that his committee had rented for school purposes the school building at Oak Hill at \$7 per month, and what is known as Scott's Store at \$7 per month, and that repairs had been made at the West Austin and Sixth Ward Schools, bills for which had not yet been rendered.

[*Principals: Oak Hill, Scott's Store, South Austin*] Dr. Litten then presented the request of Miss Mary Lowry, Principal of the Oak Hill School, to have her salary fixed at \$60 per month, instead of \$50, as is usually paid for first year's service. He further stated that she had requested that the increase be made to apply to Miss Mary Johnson, Principal of the Scott's Store School [and] Miss Mollie Dawson, Principal of the South Austin School. [301]

The Board then adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there was present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.M. Litten, J.W. Graham, Walter Tips, John McDonald, J.W. Smith.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A report from Superintendent J.B. Winn was read and received and, on motion of J.M. Litten, considered *seriatim*.

On motion of J.W. Smith, the resignation of Miss Annie Shapard was received, with expressions of regret by the Board.

[*Temporary Capitol*] On motion of Walter Tips, the application of Miss Addie McCrillis, for the use of a room in the Temporary Capitol, for the purpose of teaching a school therein for pupils under eight years of age, was rejected.

[*Robertson Hill*] On motion of Walter Tips, the application of H.T. Kealing and others, for the use of a school room at the Robertson Hill School for the purposes of teaching a night school therein, was rejected.

A copy of the minutes of the Principals meeting held on October 1 was submitted and, endorsing a revision of paragraphs six and eight,

pages 30 and 31 of the Rules and Regulations, the matter was, on motion, referred to the Committee on Rules.

On motion of Walter Tips, the Secretary was instructed to inform Professor L.R. Walden of the Texas Business College that complaint, serious and repeated, [303] had been lodged against him because of water flowing through the floor of his apartments into the rooms of the Public Schools on the second floor of the Temporary Capitol, damaging the furniture and plaster, so that the latter falls, endangering the lives of the children attending the Public Schools, and that, if the nuisance is not stopped, the Board will take steps to cancel his contract.

[*Clarksville*] J.M. Litten, Chairman of the Building Committee reported that the Building Committee had rented the building known as the Sweet Home Church at Clarksville for school purposes, for the sum of \$5 per month for the scholastic session.

Walter Tips, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Finance Committee had investigated the question referred to them at the previous meeting, as to the legality of the Board making notes for money borrowed for building purposes, that the City Attorney, George F. Pendexter had stated that, while he had not investigated the question thoroughly, he was of the opinion that the Board had the legal right to do so. Mr. Tips stated that he had talked to several parties with a view to realizing on the vendor's lien notes and other negotiable paper held by the trustees of the Allan Fund, but had not yet found a purchaser.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the committee were granted further time in which to pursue their investigations, and, on motion of John McDonald, the committee were instructed to obtain the opinion of the City Attorney in writing. [304]

A communication was read from the teachers of the High School, asking permission to dismiss at an hour earlier than 3:00 p.m., but not before 2:00 p.m. and, giving their reasons therefore. On motion of John McDonald, the communication was referred to the Committee on Rules.

J.W. Graham moved that those pupils who would be eight years of age within five months from the beginning of the current session be allowed to enter at once. John McDonald then moved to refer Mr. Graham's proposition to the Committee on Rules. His motion was lost. J.W. Smith reported that Mr. P.C. Seiders, resident near the Oak Hill School, had a child under eight years of age whom he desired to enroll in the schools and, for whose tuition he would gladly pay. Mr. McDonald then moved to admit all children under eight years of age whose parents desired to pay their tuition. His motion found no second.

William von Rosenberg stated that complaint had been made to him that children were being excluded from the schools for the current session because of unpaid tuition accounts for the session of 1890-1891. He asked that the matter be investigated.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Austin, Texas November 6, 1891

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.M. Litten, J.W. Graham, Walter Tips, John McDonald.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

A report was read from Superintendent J.B. Winn and, no objection being offered, was considered *seriatim*.

The Superintendent reported that he had been requested to make arrangements to establish a school at the Dam for the accommodation of about 14 children living in that neighborhood. He was assured that Mr. William Walsh would furnish a school house free of rent. No formal petition having been filed for the establishment of such a school, no action was taken by the Board.

The Superintendent also reported that, at the earnest request of several of the Colored citizens living in the neighborhood of the Barton Creek School, arrangements had been made to open a school there, but, upon applying to Judge von Rosenberg for the use of the building, it was discovered that it had already been rented to the County. The number of children who would have attended the school being small, it was decided not to open the school there. On the motion of J.W. Graham, the action of the Superintendent was approved. [306]

The question of the propriety of taking up a collection in the schools for the benefit of the World's Fair Fund was passed without action, the rules of the Board prohibiting such collections.

The case of Willie Newburg, a pupil of the East Austin School, was next considered, the charge of impertinence and disorderly conduct being sustained. His suspension of two weeks, already assessed by the Principal, was sustained, and the suspension extended to four weeks.

[*Arsenal Block*] Treasure Tips, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the committee had made some progress in the investigation in regard to building at the Arsenal Block and East Austin, and asked for further time in which to pursue their investigation, which was granted them.

The following report of the Committee on Rules was read and, on motion of Walter Tips, approved.

The Committee on Rules, to whom was referred the propriety of changing the school hours for the High School, respectfully report adversely to a change.

The recommendation of the Principals in regard to changing section 6, page 30, and section 8, page 31 were also disapproved

A communication was read from L.R. Walden of the Texas Business College, claiming that the damage done to the furniture of the Austin Public Schools by leakage of water through the floor of his apartments was not chargeable to him, by reason of the fact that the leakage was caused [307] by defective plumbing connected with the building and by one of much-needed repair to the building. On motion of Walter Tips, his report was ordered filed.

A communication was read from George A. Prouse, asking that he be allowed to attend the High School, although over 20 years of age, on condition that he pay his tuition. No action was taken, there being already a rule on this point.

A communication was read from H.T. Kealing, asking permission to expend one-half of the \$50 appropriated for the benefit of the libraries of the Colored Schools in the purchase of apparatus for the use of the Colored High School. His request was granted.

E.L. Blackshear, being present, asked permission to address the Board in behalf of an increase in his salary. His request was granted, and, after some discussion, the matter was, on motion of J.W. Graham, referred to the Finance Committee.

The President then stated that Mrs. Ella Brown had appealed from the decision of the Superintendent in regard to her sister, who had been dropped from the rolls of the school because of disrespect to her teacher and violation of the rules. He held that an apology was necessary before she could re-enter the schools and stated that her communication in regard to the matter was on file. After some discussion, the Board, on motion of Walter Tips, sustained the action of the President and Superintendent.

The Board then adjourned.

The Secretary stated that the purpose of the meeting was to bring before the Board the petition of about 100 citizens that R.M. Swearingen, J.M. Litten and Walter Tips, whose terms as members of the Board of Trustees expired on December 5, would allow their names to be submitted to the people again. All having refused to do so, the meeting had been called for the purpose of discussing the best means of choosing their successors. After some discussion, on motion of Walter Tips, Mayor John McDonald was requested to call a public meeting for the purpose of nominating the successors to the three retiring trustees.

The Board then adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the City School Board, held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.M. Litten, J.W. Graham, Walter Tips, J.W. Smith, John McDonald.

The minutes of the meetings held on November 6 and 17 were read and approved.

A report was read from Superintendent J.B. Winn and, on motion of John McDonald, it was received and considered *seriatim*.

On motion of J.W. Graham, \$300, or as much thereof as should be found necessary, was appropriated for the purpose of purchasing furniture, which the Superintendent, in conjunction with the Committee on Supplies, were authorized to purchase.

The recommendation of the Superintendent, in regard to transferring the state funds of those Colored children living in the neighborhood of the Barton Creek School, from the City to the County and allowing them to attend the nearest County School, was approved, on motion of James W. Smith, and the funds ordered transferred.

On motion of John McDonald, the Christmas holidays were ordered to extend from 12:00 p.m., December 24, 1891, to Monday, January 4, 1892.

A communication was read from the *American School Board Journal* of Milwaukee, offering to furnish their journal, the regular subscription price of which was \$2 *per annum*, to the members of the Austin City School Board [310] at \$1 *per annum*, on condition that several copies were taken. On motion of John McDonald, the communication was laid on the table.

Walter Tips, Chairman of the Finance Committee, reported that the Committee did not wish to recommend an increase in the salary of E.L. Blackshear, Principal of the Robertson Hill School. On motion of J.W. Graham, the report was received and adopted.

The Board then adjourned.

At a called meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: R.M. Swearingen, J.W. Graham, Walter Tips, John McDonald, J.W. Smith.

There were also present Misters S.K. Morley, Lewis Hancock and George P. Garrison, members elected on December 5 to fill the vacancies made by the expiration of the terms of office of R.M. Swearingen. J.M. Litten and Walter Tips.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

J.W. Smith read a report of the Finance Committee, stating that they had examined the books and accounts of Walter Tips, Treasurer, and found the same to be correct. On motion of J.W. Graham, the report was received and approved.

Treasurer Tips then stated that he had no funds on hand to transfer to his successor, that the Schools owed no money, except \$10,000, reported on August 31, and \$1,900 recently borrowed.

President R.M. Swearingen then rose and, in a few words, expressed his regret at severing his connection with the Board of Trustees, of which he had been a member for years and in whose work he took such interest. He had, however, such confidence in the men who would succeed him that he felt the interests of the Schools would be well cared for. [312]

He was followed by James W. Smith, who expressed for himself and, in behalf of the Board, their appreciation of his uniform courtesy and forbearance, and his faithful service in behalf of the public schools.

Mr. Tips also expressed the regrets of himself and Dr. J.M. Litten, the retiring Vice President, who was too ill to be present.

He was followed by J.W. Graham as the only member of the Board remaining who had served more than one term, and, by Mr. Hancock, in behalf of the new members, Mr. McDonald and Mr. Garrison also spoke regretfully of losing the services of such old and faithful members.

Dr. Swearingen then withdrew, and the Board proceeded to the election of Officers.

On motion of John McDonald, George P. Garrison was made President *Pro Tem*.

Nominations being in order, J.W. Graham nominated James W. Smith for President. Elected.

On motion of S.K. Morley, G.P. Garrison was elected Vice President.

On motion of J.W. Graham, Lewis Hancock was elected Treasurer. On motion of S.K. Morley, J.W. Graham was elected Secretary.

President J.W. Smith then appointed Lewis Hancock, S.K. Morley and J.W. Graham as members of the Finance Committee.

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, George P. Garrison, Lewis Hancock, John McDonald, S.K. Morley, W.J. Mathews.

President Smith stated that Mr. Charles S. Morse was present and desired to address the Board. If no objection was offered, he would do so. No objection being offered, Mr. Morse rose and stated that he wished to address the Board in behalf of the World's Fair. He desired permission to place in the rooms of the Schools cards which the pupils might take, if they wished, and collect thereon on a subscription of \$1, which, when returned to him, would entitle the child to one share in

the World's Fair Building. After some discussion, on motion of John McDonald, the following resolution offered by Mr. Morse was laid over till the next regular meeting, to be made the special order of business: Resolved that Charles S. Morse, representing the World's Fair Committee be permitted to distribute to the teachers and children of the various schools propositions to make collections for stock to said World's Fair, said propositions to consist of a card similar to those used in other schools in various cities in this state.

John McDonald, chairman of the Building Committee, then read the following report,

Austin, Texas January 23, 1892 [314]

To the Board of School Trustees, City of Austin:

Gentlemen, your Committee on School Buildings would most respectfully recommend the following improvements for the South Austin School:

First, the building of a five-board fence entirely around the lot as per plan and specifications.

Second, the building of four outbuildings with close-board fence around the same, the same as we now have at the Sixth Ward School.

We herewith submit 15 bids received for said work and would recommend the acceptance of the bid of W.J. Malone, who proposes to do the work for the sum of \$149.70.

Very respectfully, {John McDonald} {W.J. Mathews} Committee on School Buildings

Superintendent Winn then submitted a communication from W.J. Malone, stating that he had discovered an error in his bid. Having based his calculations on only one-half the closets required, he would build the full number required for \$55, in addition to his bid already on file. His bid was rejected.

After some discussion as to what action should be taken, the Board, having rejected the bid recommended by the Committee, Mr. McDonald, with the permission of the Board, withdrew the report and, as Chairman of the Building Committee, reported that the work was necessary and advised that the bid of J.W. Patton, proposing to do the work at [315] \$157.71 be accepted, provided that, upon

investigation, he be found to be a competent workman. Mr. McDonald also stated that a closet was needed at the Scott's Store School, which the Superintendent thought could be furnished at a cost of about \$12. On motion of John McDonald, the Superintendent was authorized to contract for a closet at said school and, on motion of Lewis Hancock, the Building Committee were authorized to enter into a contract for the work at the South Austin School, provided that they could find a satisfactory bidder.

John McDonald then gave notice that, at the next meeting, he would call up for reconsideration the rule excluding children under eight years of age and would offer a resolution to admit them for the balance of this session at seven years of age.

On motion of Lewis Hancock, it was ordered that the Board meet at 9:30 o'clock on Friday, the 29th day of January, for the purpose of visiting such of the public schools as it should then be determined upon.

The Board then adjourned.

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, Lewis Hancock, J.W. Graham, George P. Garrison, John McDonald, W.J. Mathews, S.K. Morley.

There were also present Mrs. J.J. Tobin, President of the Texas Board of Lady Managers for the World's Fair, and Mr. Charles S. Morse, her representative at the previous meeting of the School Board. Mr. L.N. Goldbeck was also present.

The minutes of the previous meeting were read and approved.

On motion of Lewis Hancock, the regular order of business was suspended to allow Mr. Charles S. Morse, on behalf of Mrs. Tobin, to address the Board in regard to the resolution which he had submitted and requested the Board to pass at the last meeting. John McDonald moved to pass the resolution. Lewis Hancock then moved to lay it on the table, which motion was lost. Some discussion followed, and George P. Garrison moved to postpone action and further discussion of the subject until it should come up in the regular order of business. His motion was lost. After some further discussion, the question was on motion of John McDonald referred to the Committee on Rules. The Secretary then read a report of Superintendent J.B. Winn, which, on motion of [317] Lewis Hancock, was received.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the action of the Superintendent in regard to the employment of Miss Addie McCrillis, as an assistant teacher of English in the High School, on one-half time at a salary of \$20 per month, was approved.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the action of the Superintendent, in employing Mrs. R. Blackshear and Mrs. L.B. McCree to take charge of the first grade at Gregorytown and the third grade at Robertson Hill, respectively, was approved.

J.W. Graham, on behalf of the Building Committee, reported that the Superintendent had awarded the contract for the improvements to be made at the South Austin School to H.H. Whitten & Company for \$211.

J.W. Graham, as Chairman of the Finance Committee, then submitted a communication from E.L. Blackshear, asking for an additional allowance per month in remuneration for his services in teaching three High School classes. His communication was ordered filed.

John McDonald then moved that the rule excluding children under eight years of age be amended so as to admit them for the balance of the current session at the age of seven years, and that his motion be referred to the Committee on Rules with instructions to report at the next meeting. His motion was passed.

Mr. L.N. Goldbeck, agent for the Allan Estate, being present, requested permission to address the Board, which, being granted, he stated that during the [318] lifetime of Judge John T. Allan, he had sold to one L.L. Boyd 120 acres out of the A. de los Reyes survey situated in Kauffman County, Texas, taking payment therefore, part in cash and the balance in vendor's lien notes due at various times. The land was sold at the price of \$4 per acre. He made an agreement with L.L. Boyd by letter that, should the adjoining three blocks of land be sold within a year at \$4 per acre, and should he, L.L. Boyd, be instrumental in finding a purchase for the same, the first-named party, Judge J.T. Allan, would then credit Mr. Boyd with 50 cents per acre to be deducted from the last payment on his notes. L.L. Boyd had found a purchaser for said property in Misters Godart and Rushing within the year and, in accordance with the terms, he now claimed the deduction of 50 cents per acre from the amount of the last note,

which fell due on December 1, 1892, and was held jointly by Miss Geraldine C. Osborn of New Orleans and the City

of Houston, each holding one-half interest. Miss Osborn had authorized the agents, Misters Eggleston and Goldbeck, to allow her one-half share of the \$60 claimed, and he now asked that the Board authorized him to allow their share, amounting to \$30. On motion of John McDonald, he was authorized to do so.

I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, then stated that Mrs. Weller, teacher of elocution, had made arrangements to give a concert, two-thirds of the proceeds of which were to be given for the [319] benefit of the World's Fair, the other third to belong to Mrs. Weller. The concert was to be given in the High School assembly hall and be participated in by the High School pupils. Tickets had been printed, and he had about 400 on hand at 25 cents each, which he desired permission to distribute among the pupils. On motion, it was referred to the Committee on Rules.

He then stated that, as he did not desire to have the Board change the rules for such a case, he asked whether they would allow her to hold the concert in the assembly hall, sell no tickets, collect the price of admission at the door, [and] the proceeds to go to the benefit of the school library. J.W. Graham moved to grant his request. Mr. McDonald amended the motion of Mr. Graham, to read "provided that the teachers and scholars be prohibited from selling or distributing tickets to said entertainment." The motion, as amended, was passed.

On motion of John McDonald, the President was authorized to appoint a committee of three to act as trustees of the John T. Allan Fund, and that the President be requested to act as one of said committee. His motion was passed. The President then appointed Treasurer Hancock and Secretary Graham as the other two members.

The Board then adjourned.

At a postponed meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, Lewis Hancock, J.W. Graham, John McDonald, George P. Garrison, S.K. Morley.

The minutes of the meetings held on December 17, 1891 and February 5, 1892 were read and approved.

A report from Superintendent J.B. Winn was read and, on motion of J.W. Graham, received, and the recommendations and actions of the Superintendent in regard to the Sixth Ward School approved.

On motion of John McDonald, the resignations of Miss Lillian Rimassa, teacher of the sixth grade at the West Austin School, and Mrs. M.E. Neale, teacher of the third grade at the Robertson Hill School, were accepted, and the leave of absence granted Mrs. J.E. Lampkins, teacher of the first grade at the West Austin Colored School, by the Superintendent, on account of her health, was approved.

The Secretary then read the following majority report of the Committee on Rules:

To the School Board of Austin City, Texas:

Your Committee on Rules respectfully recommend that rule number four be changed to read, "Resident pupils shall be admitted free of tuition between the ages <u>seven</u> and nineteen years of age."

John McDonald moved its adoption. A long discussion followed and, upon the vote being taken, his motion was lost.

Treasurer Hancock then presented his estimate of the expenses and revenue of the schools for the balance of the current session. He also made a statement of the cash resources of the Allan Fund and, on motion of J.W. Graham, it was ordered that the Board meet at four o'clock on Friday, the 11th day of March, for the purpose of deciding what disposition should be made of the same.

George P. Garrison then presented a request to have the Committees on Textbooks and Examinations consolidated for the more expeditious and satisfactory transaction of business coming before them.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Austin, Texas March 11, 1892

At an adjourned meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, George P. Garrison, J.W. Graham, Lewis Hancock, S.K. Morley.

Treasurer Hancock submitted a statement of the condition of the John T. Allan Fund and, after some discussion on his motion, the trustees of said fund were authorized to invest the cash resources of the same securing to the investments by real estate.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the Building Committee were authorized to solicit plans and specifications for a building to be erected on the Arsenal Block, to cost not more than \$10,000.

George P. Garrison then asked that the Rules and Regulations be so changed as to assign to one committee the duties now devolving upon the two committees known as the Committee on Examinations and the Committee on Textbooks. On motion of J.W. Graham, the question was referred to the Committee on Rules.

On motion, the Board then adjourned, to meet at four o'clock on Tuesday, the 15th day of March, for the purpose of receiving the Treasurer's recommendations in regard to the closing of the schools and setting a date for the same.

At an adjourned meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, George P. Garrison, J.W. Graham, Lewis Hancock, John McDonald, S.K. Morley.

The Treasurer has submitted his estimate of what it would cost to run these Schools to April 30 and what the resources were for the current fiscal year. With the estimated expenses for the balance of the current fiscal year, he stated that, if the schools were closed on April 30, they would have a cash balance of about \$557.61. John McDonald moved that enough money be borrowed to run all the schools till May 15, and that the High School be continued till June 1, and that the Schools be closed on these dates. As stated, his motion was lost.

S.K. Morley moved that the Schools be closed on the 30th day of April, with the exceptions of such grades as are taught by Principals

on annual salaries, which grades shall be continued till the 30th day of May. His motion was passed.

The Secretary then read the following report of the Committee on Rules and Regulations, which, on motion of John McDonald, was received and adopted.

The following changes in the bylaws of the Board are recommended: [324]

- That the paragraph enumerating committees be amended, so as to strike out the words "and Examinations" at the end of the paragraph, and the word "Textbooks," and insert, in lieu of the latter, the words "Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations."
- Number two, that the paragraph relating to Duties of Committees be amended by striking out rule number four, and the words "once a year," and rule number seven, and inserting in the first line of rule number seven, the words, "Teachers, Textbooks, and" so as to read, "the Committee on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations," etc.
- Number three, that rule number four under Duties of Superintendent be amended by inserting at the beginning of the clause the words with the concurrence of the Chairman of the Committee on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations, so as to read as follows: "with the concurrence of the Chairman of the Committee on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations."

At a regular meeting of the City School Board held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, George P. Garrison, J.W. Graham, John McDonald, S.K. Morley.

The minutes of the meetings held on March 8 and 16 were read and approved.

A report was read from Superintendent J.B. Winn and, on motion of John McDonald, it was received and considered *seriatim*.

The recommendation that all grades in the schools be closed at the same time, April 30, with the exceptions of the senior classes in the Colored and White High Schools was, on motion of J.W. Graham, approved.

On motion of J.W. Graham, the use of school rooms was granted to those teachers desiring to teach private schools therein after the close of the public schools, on condition that they be properly cared for by them and subject to supervision by the Superintendent.

On motion of John McDonald, the state school funds of the children of Solomon Bryant and Eda Davis were transferred from the City to School #2, District #3, Barton Spring.

On motion of John McDonald, H.T. Kealing, Supervisor of the Colored Schools, was excused from attendance on his grade from April 27, for two weeks, in order that he might attend a Colored convention. [326]

On motion of S.K. Morley, the application of Rev. Del Valle for the use of the First Ward School room on Sunday, April 3, for the purposes of organizing a mission in that part of the city, was granted.

A report was read from the Building Committee and, on motion of George P. Garrison, the Committee was authorized to advertise for plans and specifications to be furnished for a two-story brick school building to be erected for the Arsenal Block, to cost not more than \$10,000.

A motion to adjourn was about to be presented when the Secretary asked a stay of proceedings for the purpose of reading a note which had just been handed him and read as follows:

Honorable Board of Trustees of the Austin Public Schools:

Gentlemen, I hereby tender my resignation as Clerk in the Office of the Superintendent of City Schools, to take effect not later than April 30.

In severing my connection with the Schools, I desire to express to the Board of Trustees, as a body, my appreciation of their unvarying courtesy, and to the individual members and the Superintendent my sincere thanks for the kindness shown me during the years I have been in their service.

Very respectfully, {Mary L. Boak} The proposition came with much surprise to the gentleman of [327] the Board, who individually expressed complimentary regrets for the necessity which impels the young lady to sever her connection with the office and, on motion of Mr. Graham, it was resolved that the resignation be accepted and the thanks of the Board be tendered her for her long, faithful and efficient services.

The Board then adjourned.

[328] Austin, Texas, April 12, 1892 At a special meeting of the City School Board, held this day in the Superintendent's office, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, J.W. Graham, John McDonald, S.K. Morley, W.J. Mathews, Lewis Hancock.

A communication was read from I.H. Bryant, Principal of the High School, asking that the number of pupils allowed by the rules to take part in the closing exercises of the High School be increased, from four to eight. On motion of John McDonald, the request was granted.

President J.W. Smith then announced that the assignment of the duties of the two committees known as the Committee on Examinations and the Committee on Textbooks, to a new committee to be known as the Committee on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations had necessitated the appointment of new members. He then appointed Mr. George P. Garrison, J.W. Graham, and W.J. Mathews as members of the Committee.

A request was then submitted from Superintendent Winn that the Board order that all pupils in attendance in the Schools be examined at the close of the current session, and that no honorary promotions be allowed this term. On motion, his request was granted.

A communication was read from Rev. R. Bruck, asking that he be allowed the use of a school [329] room in the various buildings in the different wards of the city for the purpose of giving lectures therein with magic lantern views of biblical scenes. On motion of John McDonald, his request was refused.

Plans and specifications which had been submitted for a school building to be erected on the Arsenal Block were then examined, and, on motion of J.W. Graham, it was ordered that the Board meet at 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, April 13, to consider the plans and specifications of Lamour & Watson and Burt McDonald. An amendment offered by S.K. Morley to meet at 4:00, instead of 4:30, was carried.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

At a called meeting of the City School Board held this day, the 13th of April, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, J.W. Graham, S.K. Morley, G.P. Garrison, Lewis Hancock, W.J. Mathews, Mayor McDonald.

President Smith having called the meeting to decide upon the adoption of plans for the Tenth Ward School building, Mr. Burt McDonald, Mr. Andranatha, Misters Lamour and Watson, and Mr. M_ of Taylor submitted plans.

The four plans were carefully examined.

It was moved and carried that the plans of Mr. Andranatha and Mr. _____ be not further considered, as not applicable to the purpose of the Board. The plans of the other gentlemen were then elaborately explained. As there were some features in the plans under consideration which did not just suit the ideas of the undivided members as to their wants and purposes, it was further agreed that the plans be modified according to their suggestions, and the details be elaborated, so as to be more intelligent to them, and that the meeting do adjourn, subject to the call of the President.

Superintendent's Office

April 15, 1892

On the second call of the Board, there were present: J.W. Smith, G.P. Garrison, S.K. Morley, J.W. Graham, Lewis Hancock.

The President announced the subject of the meeting was to resume the consideration of the plan submitted for the Arsenal Block School house.

Mr. Bert McDonald sent in his plans, and more elaborate specifications of the two gentlemen [viz., of Lamour & Watson, were submitted]. The Board, on motion of Mr. Graham, adopted the plans of Misters Lamour and Watson, and adjourned to meet on the following day in the office of the architects, to examine more particularly the modifications of the two plans.

The committee were instructed to advertise for bids to the separate plans, limiting the opening of the bids to May 11.

The meeting then adjourned.

Austin, Texas April 13, 1892 At a regular meeting of the City School Board held May 6, there were present the following members: Lewis Hancock, J.W. Graham, S.K. Morley, J.W. Smith, George P. Garrison.

The minutes of the meetings held on April 1 and 12 were read and approved.

Mr. Shipe was then introduced and stated that he was instructed to offer a piece of ground in Hyde Park to the School Board as a site for a school building, similar to the one to be built in the Tenth Ward. His proposition was that his side would give the ground and furnish the money to put up the building if the Board would pay 8% interest on the money and pay the principal within a stated time, say, three years hence.

Mr. Shipe then introduced Judge Fulmore, who spoke in favor of the scheme and showed he still had the interest of the little fellows at heart.

Mr. Hancock then discussed the matter. proposing the building should be erected by Mr. Shipe, with the privilege of its being bought by the Board later, if they saw fit - no building, however, to be built by them in that vicinity for school purposes, but to buy the one in Hyde Park, when one should be required for that purpose. Mr. Graham thought it would be needed within a year. On motion of Mr. Graham, the matter was referred to a special committee, with Dr. Hancock for President. Motion carried, and Misters Hancock, Graham and Garrison chosen for that purpose. These gentlemen were immediately impressed with the idea that Mr. Shipe made a very good friend to any project he supported, for, after the committee had been convinced a little against their will, that they were not so busy as they thought they consented to be piloted by Mr. Shipe on the Tuesday following to be shown the plot selected and discuss the proposition of building upon it. Mr. Shipp then left, and the meeting took up regular business. [333]

The Superintendent handed in his report, which was read and then taken up in detail. The matter about renewing the lease on the Temporary Capitol building was referred to the Building Committee.

Miss Boak's resignation was read, and Miss Connie North elected as her successor. Miss North's official duties as Superintendent's Office Clerk to begin June 1.

On motion of Mr. Graham, Mr. Morley was elected as President of the Building Committee, in place of Mayor McDonald, resigned, with Judge Smith as *ex officio* member.

Mrs. Taff's resignation was read and accepted. This closed the Superintendent's report.

In the report on of Standing Committee, it was moved that the Building Committee meet May 11 to open bids for Arsenal Block building and that there be a called meeting of the Board the following day at 4:00 p.m. to act upon the bids, the Committee to have no power to reject or accept any bid without the concurrence of the Board. Carried.

A motion was made by Professor Garrison that, at the next regular meeting of the Board, they proceed to the election of a Principal for Sixth Ward School, in place of Mr. Gillespie, deceased. Carried.

There being no further business, the meeting then adjourned.

May 12, 1892 Omitted by error

At a called meeting for the purpose of considering the bids for erecting the Sixth Ward building, it was decided, after much discussion, to reject all bids and call for new ones. The Committee agreed that it would be better to gain classrooms by doing away with superfluities on the shape of ornamentation, the rooms to be 24 by 36, instead of smaller ones. As per present plan, it was moved and carried unanimously that the above-stated plan be accepted.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Austin, Texas May 20, 1892

At a meeting of the City School Board, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, S.K. Morley, J.W. Graham, G.P. Garrison, W.J. Mathews.

The object of the called meeting was mainly to consider the report of the Principal of the High School in regard to the close of this same. The report was read by the Secretary, which was explained at length by Professor Bryant, Principal.

There were 29 students recommended for honors: 19 young ladies and 10 young men.

The following were recommended for diplomas: Grace Johnson, Kittie Carroll, Ellen Maddox, Wally Besserer, Carrie Dunn, Nellie Mishan, Molly Jumlow, Maud Stowe, M. Estelle, Sadie Moore, Corelia Whitten, Effie Graves, Louise Crow, Lanie Harris, Lucy Compton, George Shelley, W. Hart, E. Carrington, R. Shapard, J. Spence, F. Richmon, H. Deckerd, and L. Brueggerhoff. For certificates: Clio Ainsworth, Louise McHenry, Maud Smith, Stephen Radkey and Walter Lindine.

On motion of Mr. Graham, it was ordered that Millett Opera House be rented for the closing exercises of the High School, and that the rental expenses incidents to the closing exercises be allowed. Adopted.

The report of the Finance Committee was entertained, asking that \$40 indebtedness of the Capital Calvary Company for rent of rooms at the Temporary Capitol to pass to loss and gain, as the account could not be collected. On motion Mr. C.H. Powell, agent, was instructed to drop the amount from the deficiency roll.

This subject of renting the Temporary Capitol came up and, after discussing the same, it was referred to the Building Committee, with instructions to act.

On motion, the Board then adjourned.

Superintendent's Office

May 26, 1892

At a special meeting of the City School Board held this day, the 26th of May, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, William von Rosenberg, J.W. Graham, John McDonald, S.K. Morley, Lewis Hancock, George P. Garrison.

The subject of the meeting was to hear the report of Mr. H.T. Kealing, Principal of the Colored High School. The report recommended the graduation of three of the students of the same: V.N. Hamilton, Florence Hamilton and William Ewing. After considering the report of the Principal, on motion of Mr. Graham, and seconded by Professor Garrison, it was ordered the above-named students do receive diplomas. On motion, it was ordered that the closing exercises of the Colored High School take place at the A.M.E. Church on Monday, the 30th of May, at 8:30 o'clock p.m.

The Committee on Buildings brought up the subject of accepting the proposition of the MK&T Company, to donate a block of ground at Hyde Park to the School Board and to erect a school building there on certain conditions. The subject was discussed at considerable

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length by nearly all the members present, and, pending discussion, the Board adjourned the regular meeting.

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Superintendent's Office June 3, 1892

At a regular meeting of the City School Board, held this third day of June, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, Judge von Rosenberg, J.W. Graham, Mayor McDonald, S.K. Morley, Lewis Hancock, G.P. Harrison, W.J. Mathews.

The minutes of the meetings of May 6 and 20 were read and, after corrections, approved.

Moved by Mr. Hancock, and seconded by Mayor McDonald, that the Board adopt the Minority Report of the special Building Committee, which was reported at a previous meeting. Carried.

The Committee on Teachers made their report upon a Principal for the Sixth Ward School and an assistant teacher for the High School.

The report on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations was then taken up, which is as follows:

The Committee on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations would recommend in case the Board decided to elect a female Principal of the Sixth Ward School, we recommend Miss Pearl Cashell be elected to fill that position. But, in the event a male Principal is decided upon, we recommend Professor L.L. Todd of Taylor as first choice, and Professor E.A. Brennan of Caldwell as a second choice.

For assistant teachers: Miss Ellis, first choice. Miss Outey, second.

Signed,

Moved and seconded that Miss Pearl Cashell be elected Principal of Sixth Ward School by acclamation. Carried.

The recommendations of the applicants for the High School were then read. Miss Ellis was put in nomination by Mayor McDonald, and Miss Outey by Mr. Hancock. They then proceeded to vote by ballot. Miss Outey, receiving the majority of votes, was elected assistant teacher in the High School. [337]

Mr. von Rosenberg begged to be excused.

It was then moved and seconded that the lease of the Temporary Capitol be taken up. On motion, it was agreed that the lease be accepted.

Moved and carried that Professor Lowry be allowed the use of the High School rooms for the month of July as a summer normal.

Moved and adopted that the deduction of \$6 from Mr. Odom's account be referred to Mr. C.H. Powell, agent, with power to act.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

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Superintendent's Office, Austin July 8, 1892

At a regular postponed meeting of the City School Board held this day, the 8th of July, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, W.J. Mathews, Lewis Hancock, J.W. Graham, S.K. Morley, George P. Garrison, Mayor McDonald.

The minutes of the meetings of May 28 and June 3 were read and approved.

The report of the Superintendent was read and taken up seriatim.

First, the first, second and third recommendations of the Superintendent were referred to the proper committees.

Second, the recommendation that the room now occupied by Hutchings Printing Office be not rented, but reserved for the use of the Central School, was discussed and, on motion, it was referred to the Committee on Building.

Third, the recommendation in regard to changing the location of the Oak Hill School was also referred to the same Committee.

Fourth, the recommendation in regard to the propriety of establishing a school at the Dyson School House or Walsh's Store was, on motion, referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Fifth, the recommendation asking that \$600, or so much as there may be needed, for the purchase of furniture and supplies was disposed of by referring it to the Committee on Finance.

Sixth, the report of the Superintendent to the Committee on Teachers in regard to the recent results of the annual competitive examination of applicants for positions in the schools, and the recommendations therein, was submitted by Professor Garrison, Chairman of the Committee, and, on motion, it was read.

Professor Garrison, on behalf of the Committee, submitted the names of the following first-year teachers for reelection: Miss Annie Jary, Mary Lowry and Lizzie Rumsey. Miss Elfreida Jesson was recommended for another year's trial, and Miss Lucy Read was recommended for [339] employment on the same conditions and terms as existed last year.

Professor Garrison also submitted the schedules of the results of the examinations of the White and Colored teachers and brought in a majority report recommending the election of the following teachers to positions in the schools: Miss Gertrude Whitis, Miss Lizzie Waggener, Miss Hattie O. Posey, Mrs. Z.L. Hunt, Mrs. G.E. Pyle, Miss Laura Allison.

Dr. J. Mathews, in behalf of the minority, moved that the name of Miss Laura Glasscock be substituted for that of Miss Hattie O. Posey. The question of motion of Mr. Hancock was submitted to a ballot, which resulted in a tie vote. It was decided by the Chairman, Judge J.W. Smith, by casting his vote with the majority Committee.

Professor Garrison then read the schedule report of the results of the examination of the Colored teachers, and, there appearing but two of the applicants who made the required percent of scholarship, Mrs. Susie Weeks and Mr. Julius Dodson, recommended that they be employed by the Board, which, on motion, was adopted. The Committee recommended that the Colored teachers who did not pass be put on the substitute role and be employed when their services are required.

It was also recommended and adopted by the Board that teachers who made an average of 80% of scholarship receive a teacher's certificate of the first grade, good for three years. Those who attained a percent of scholarship of 75 to 80% received certificates of the first grade good for two years.

Professor Garrison, Chairman of the Committee reported favorably on the adoption of the following textbooks:

- 1. Tarbell's Lessons in English Grammar
- 2. Whitney and Lockwood's English Grammar
- 3. Pennybacker's History of Texas
- 4. Chambers' History of the United States [340]

On motion of Mayor McDonald, the recommendations of the Committee were adopted on condition of satisfactory rates of introduction and exchange.

The resignation of H.T. Kealing, Supervisor of the Colored Schools, was submitted and, on motion, it was accepted and ordered that suitable testimonials be given him.

In vein of the lack of a vacancy in the position of Supervisor of the Colored Schools, that part of the Superintendent's report recommending Mr. E.L. Blackshear for the vacancy with Mrs. Phillipe as assistant in charge of the Primary work, was referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Mr. Graham, Chairman of the Committee on Finance, reported that the insurance policy on the Temporary Capitol had expired. On motion, the matter was referred to the Committee, with power to act.

Mr. McDonald moved that the halls of the Temporary Capitol be partitioned off and the lower rooms be leased to the City Council for offices, which, on motion, was referred to the Committee on Buildings.

Some discussion arose in reference to making alterations in the plans of the Arsenal School building, in regard to substituting of slate roof for tin, and putting paper under the floors. It was moved and seconded that the building be completed in accordance with the specifications, no changes to be made, unless authorized by the Board.

There being no more business to transact, the Board, on motion, adjourned.

July 29, 1892

At a meeting of the City School Board, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, J.W. Graham, S.K. Morley, Lewis Hancock, George P. Garrison, Mayor McDonald.

The minutes of the last meeting were read and approved.

The President, J.W. Smith, proceeded with the regular business by calling for the report of the Superintendent, which was read by the Secretary.

On motion of Mr. Hancock, the recommendations were taken up *seriatim*.

First, the resignation of Professor J.B. Rogers, Principal of the West Austin School, and Mr. H.B. Fry, Principal of the Colored Grammar Schools, were reported on file and, after being read, were, on motion of Mr. Morley, accepted.

Second, the recommendation that the services of Mr. H.B. Hubbard be no longer retained by the Board, was, on motion of Professor Garrison, referred to the Committee on Teachers.

Third, the recommendation in regard to the outline of the course of studies for the High School and some special rules and regulations

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reported by the Principal, and the printing of copies of the same, was, on motion of Mr. Graham, adopted.

The report of the Committee on Finance being called for, it was submitted by Mr. Graham, Chairman of the Committee. On motion of Mayor McDonald, the report was adopted as a whole. That part of the report which had reference to the salary of Miss Cashell, Principal of the Sixth Ward School being settled, Professor Garrison asked the privilege of having his views spread upon the minutes, which was granted. They are as follows:

"My vote for the adoption of the report of the Finance Committee as a whole is not to be taken as implying concurrence in that part which fixes the salary of Miss Pearl Cashell at \$750. I know that giving her more might involve serious [342] injustice to other female teachers, whose services the Board values at no less than hers, but I believe the alternative adopted involves more serious injustice still. It is my conviction that wise choice will select men as a rule for Principals. But I can see no justice in allowing the salary attached to a particular position to vary with the sex of those who may be able to secure election to it."

Signed, {George P. Garrison}

The next order of business was the report of the Building Committee. On motion of Mayor McDonald, the recommendations of the Committee were taken up *seriatim*.

First, the Committee recommended that the room now occupied by Hutchings Printing Office be rented at \$40 per month. On motion of Mr. Hancock, the recommendation was adopted, Mayor McDonald voting no.

Second, the recommendation in regard to running a dividing fence through the lot west of the Temporary Capitol for the use of the boys and girls of the Central Grammar School was, on motion of Professor Garrison, adopted.

Third, the recommendation that \$250, or so much as may be needed, for special repairs and improvements, as are advised by the Superintendent, was, on motion, adopted

Fourth, the Committee, after carefully investigating a proper location for the Oak Hill School, recommend that the proposition of the MK&T Land Company to lease to the Board a certain specified location and building for school purposes for two years at an annual rent of \$250, payable quarterly, which, on motion of Mr. Graham, was accepted with the proviso that the interior of rooms be sealed with tongue and groove ceiling and painted, or hard oil finish instead of being papered, as proposed by the company.

The Committee on Teachers asked to be allowed to report on the matter which had just been referred to them, viz., the resignation of Professor J.B. Rogers On motion of Mr. Hancock, the request was granted.

The committee then submitted their report recommending Mr. T.A. Brown as Principal of the West Austin School. On motion of Mr. Morley, the recommendation of the Committee was adopted. [343]

The Chairman, Judge Smith, submitted a question of inquiry in regard to the grading of the schools: If it were possible to have a less number of teachers and more pupils assigned to the teachers than that that existed in some grades last year. After an interesting discussion of the complex question, the matter of inquiry was referred to the Committee on Teachers, to investigate and report at a convenient time.

On motion, the Board adjourned.

Superintendent's Office, Austin

September 2, 1892

At a meeting of the City School Board, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, J.W. Graham, George P. Garrison, S.G. Sneed, S.K. Morley.

After the President had called the meeting to order, the Secretary read the minutes of the meeting of July 29.

On motion of Mr. Graham, which was seconded by Mr. Morley, it was adopted that action on the minutes be postponed until the next regular meeting.

The report of the Superintendent was then read, but, before the Board had acted upon it, Mr. Graham arose and, in a few appropriate remarks, welcomed Mr. Sneed into the Board as an *ex officio* member.

Mr. Eggleston of the firm of Goldbeck and Eggleston then addressed the Board in regard to the right-of-way of the land lying between Victoria and Jackson counties, the said lands belonging to the City and one-half to the John T. Allan Fund. Mr. Eggleston wanted the concurrence of the Board, so the land could be sold. It was moved by Mr. Graham and seconded by Mr. Morley that the matter be referred to agents, to take the land in hand and sell it. Carried. On

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motion, it was adopted that the agents be instructed to dispose of the land at \$2.50 per acre.

The regular business was then referred to, and the report of the Superintendent taken up *seriatim*.

First, it was decided that the City Schools should open on the 19th of September.

Second, moved and seconded that the applications for the transfer of 25 children from the City of Austin to the Go Valle District and to the St. Elmo District be granted: 25 to the first-named district and one to the St. Elmo District.

Third, the release of the Women's Hall was referred to the Building Committee, authorizing them to make suitable terms with the parties.

Fourth, the matter of the Dison School property came up and, on motion of Mr. Graham, the [345] Building Committee was granted more time to investigate said school, claims, etc., etc.

Fifth, on motion, it was adopted that the mode of heating the Arsenal Block School house be referred to Building Committee.

Sixth, the recommendations that the water closets of the schools be made to connect with the city sewerage was referred to the Building Committee.

It was moved by Mr. Garrison and seconded by Mr. Sneed that Miss Caswell, a former teacher of the public schools should be restored to the list of teachers carried.

Mr. Watson, architect of the Arsenal School, made some remarks to the Board in regard to the completion of said building. He stated the building would be completed within the time stated in the contract,

The subject came up [of] whether children under eight years of age should be allowed to attend the schools. Dr. Sneed moved that the matter be referred to a special meeting, which should be held next Friday at four o'clock in the Superintendent's office.

There being no further business. the Board adjourned.

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Superintendent's Office, Austin September 9, 1892

At a special meeting of the City School Board, held this, the 9th of September, there were present the following members: J.W. Smith, S.K. Morley, J.W. Graham, G.P. Harrison, W.J. Mathews, S.G. Sneed.

The object of the meeting was to decide whether or not children under the age of eight should be allowed to enter the schools by paying tuition. A motion was made to the above effect, but was lost. A proposition was then offered by one of the Board, that all children who would be eight years of age on January 1, 1893, should be allowed to enter the schools at the opening of the session. This motion was ruled out of order by the President, as it was in violation of the rules of the Board.

Mr. Graham move that all children over the scholastic age should be allowed to attend the Public Schools by paying tuition. Carried.

It was moved and seconded that the resignation of Miss Jessie A. Sayers be accepted.

The report of the Committee on Teachers was read and adopted.

Mr. Graham then read a communication from Mr. Pendexter in regard to the Deisen property. The proposition of Mr. John Dowell, attorney, was taken up. Mr. Sneed moved that the Secretary of the Board is hereby instructed to communicate to John Dowell, Esquire, as attorney for Deisen and wife, as follows: The Board of Trustees for the Austin Public Schools, having considered the application of John Dowell, Esquire, as Attorney for Deisen and wife, asking that City Board of Trustees convey to said Deisen and wife one acre of land which was conveyed by said Deisin and wife to S.G. Sneed as County Superintendent of Public Schools in the year 1875 for the use of the neighborhood for public school purposes and on which a public school house [347] was built in said year 1870, said property now being in the incorporated limits of the City of Austin, declines to make the conveyance, as requested, on the grounds that they have no legal authority to make said conveyance. And further that said Board of Trustees of the Austin City Schools claim said property referred to as Public School property, to be used for school purposes. Adopted.

The case of Miss Susie Weeks was disposed of by referring it to the Committee on Teachers.

A great deal of discussion arose in regard to the change in Rule 4. It was referred to the Committee on Rules and Regulations, to report at the next regular meeting.

Judge Smith substituted the name of Mr. S.G. Sneed for that of Mr. G.P. Garrison, at the latter's request, on the Judiciary Committee. Also, the name of Mr. S.G. Sneed for Mr. J.W. Graham on the Committee on Teachers, Textbooks and Examinations

On motion, the Board adjourned.
