Santa Cruz County Leaders in Training Summer Internship Program

This summer, 30 high school juniors, seniors, and first-year college students are stepping into public service through the county-wide SCC Leaders in Training Summer Internship Program. Hosted by Santa Cruz County and the Santa Cruz County School Superintendent's Office (C-CREO GEAR UP Program), the program offers a unique opportunity for students to gain hands-on experience in local government while building essential career skills.

"The goal is to give our students a real-world look at how local government functions, while helping them build the soft skills they'll need no matter where their future takes them," said Maya Donnelly, the School's Chief Deputy. "They're not just observing, they're contributing, problem-solving, and getting to know the professionals who serve our community."

Interns are placed in county departments where they learn about governmental duties, internal policies, and daily operations. The program also includes weekly career and workforce readiness workshops designed to equip students with essential professional skills. Topics include professional writing, communication strategies, networking, understanding team roles, and workplace professionalism.

This year's cohort is also collaborating with the County Communications Manager, Shannon Hall, to develop a county-wide anti-litter campaign. Students are creating messages and materials to raise awareness about the impact of littering and encourage cleaner public spaces, with plans to share the campaign with local businesses.

The Leaders in Training program reflects the county's commitment to youth development, civic engagement, and workforce preparation. "This program has been a passion of mine for many years and I thank the county manager, Jesus Valdez, and the Board of Supervisors for supporting this initiative through our office that will provide many students with a foundation in workforce development skills," said Alfredo I Velásquez, Santa Cruz County School Superintendent.

"I'm learning a lot here in the office (Health Services) and in the workshops as well. The workshops are fun and the skills we are learning are things I can use outside of work in my day-to-day life." -Aylen Lopez, intern. The belt system provides a structured framework for progression, from 10th gup (white belt) to 1st gup (brown belt), 1st dan to 3rd dan (black belt), and 4th dan and above. Through Taekwondo training, individuals can develop discipline, focus, and self-control, build confidence and self-esteem, enhance physical fitness and coordination, learn valuable life skills, and cultivate respect, self-awareness, and emotional regulation. As individuals progress, they experience significant improvements in their overall well-being, including increased confidence and self-assurance, improved mental health and emotional stability, enhanced physical fitness and coordination, and a greater sense of purpose and direction. According to Rodrigo, "By practicing Taekwondo, individuals can develop a strong foundation for personal growth, leading to improved self-esteem, increased

confidence, and a more positive outlook on life."

Rodrigo's family, including his wife Ana and their three sons, Rodrigo Jr. (20), Carlos (15), and Angel (13), is a testament to the positive impact of Taekwondo. Santa Cruz Valley Aquatic Center: A Summer Oasis of Safety, Learning, and Fun

As the summer sun beats down on Santa Cruz Valley, the Unified School District No. 35 Aquatic Center has become a bustling hub of activity, laughter, and life-saving skills. With a dedicated team of 28 lifeguards working tirelessly to ensure safety and cleanliness, the center offers a welcoming space for families to cool off, learn, and relax.

"Water safety is so important, especially here in Arizona," said Audra Billow, Communication and Outreach Specialist for Santa Cruz Valley Unified School District No. 35.

The center's summer schedule, running from June 2 to July 26, caters to all ages and skill levels. Children's swimming lessons are held weekday mornings from 9:00 AM to 12:00 PM, while public open swim and lap swimming hours provide ample opportunities for recreation in the afternoons and evenings. For early risers, adult-only lap swimming is available from 6:30 AM to 8:30 AM on select days.

Behind the scenes, a team of 28 lifeguards works diligently to maintain a safe environment. Their efforts include constant vigilance, routine safety checks, and ensuring the facility remains clean and welcoming.

"As a former lead lifeguard, I know how demanding this job can be," says Audra, overseeing the Aquatic Center's operations. "But seeing kids learn to swim and families enjoying their time here makes it all worthwhile. Our lifeguards are the backbone of this community resource."
