

Supporting the Amado Food Bank: A Lifeline for Rural Communities





In the heart of Santa Cruz County, Arizona, lies a network of small towns and communities that are often overlooked but not forgotten. The Amado Food Bank has been a steadfast presence in these areas, serving as a vital lifeline for those in need. For over 28 years, this community-driven organization has provided essential support to residents of Amado, Lakewood, Elephant Head, Arivaca, Tubac, Tumacacori, Halfway Station, and Carmen.

These rural communities face unique challenges, with limited access to resources and a higher reliance on local support systems. The Amado Food Bank steps in to fill this gap, providing groceries, fresh produce, and other essentials to families, seniors, and individuals struggling to make ends meet. The food bank serves around 155-180 households in Amado, Carmen, and Arivaca.

According to Monica Gonzalez, Associate Director of the Amado Food Bank, one of their biggest challenges has been making sure that those individuals who are limited by means of transportation are able to have access to food assistance. She mentioned that the people in the area most vulnerable are our seniors and individuals with disabilities who have challenges with transportation. Gonzalez also runs the Green Valley site, where they approximately serve around 820 households monthly, and the Nogales site, which serves around 2,900-3,000 households per month.

The food bank's impact is made possible by the dedication of its volunteers. These selfless individuals give their time and energy to help sort donations, pack groceries, and distribute food to those in need. Their commitment is a testament to the community's spirit and willingness to support one another. The Amado Food Bank is fortunate to have a great crew, including Arturo, who has been working with the food bank for 9 years. Since 1988, when the food bank was still a part of the Tucson site before moving to the current location in 1994, when it became an affiliate, they have served not only Santa Cruz but also Pima County.

The Amado Food Bank is concerned about the upcoming cuts to SNAP and food assistance from the Big Beautiful Bill and how it will impact the community. These cuts could exacerbate food insecurity and affect low-income families.

By supporting the Amado Food Bank, donors and community partners can make a tangible difference in the lives of their neighbors. Every contribution, whether time or resources, helps to ensure that this vital service remains available to those who need it most.

Domestic violence affects families across Santa Cruz County. Too often, survivors carry guilt or shame, feeling responsible for the abuse or for staying in the relationship. Victims should never be blamed for loving someone who hurts them. Abuse is always the choice of the abuser.

Abuse is not about love. It is about power and control. Many abusers use apologies, promises, or brief kindness to keep their partner from leaving. Survivors may hold on to the hope that things will change, but this does not excuse violence. Choosing to abuse is the sole responsibility of the person causing harm.

As a community, we must stop blaming survivors and start holding abusers accountable, even when the abuser is a friend, family member, or someone we respect. Accountability means refusing to ignore, deny, or excuse abusive behavior. Real change only happens when we support survivors with compassion and require responsibility from those causing harm.

At Mariposa Community Health Center, our Domestic Violence Program is here to provide safety, support, and resources for victims and survivors of domestic/dating violence, sexual violence, and stalking.
