



1. Did you expect to be the candidate with the most votes in this primary election?

I wish to thank the Democrats and independent voters who requested and cast Democratic Primary ballots and voted for me. The final tally was 12,116 votes for me. 5. What would you want to change or improve in the community that will have an impact in people's lives?

First and foremost, there must be better resources available for all residents to stem the spread and eventually eradicate COVID-19. The federal government and the State of Arizona were late to the table to support increased testing and contact tracing for Santa Cruz County and other border regions. I applaud both Mariposa Community Health Center and the Santa Cruz County Health Department for being flexible and proactive in caring for and protecting the residents. Some of the deaths and infections were avoidable, if only the same amount of money that was spent on the sending the National Guard to the border a few years ago was spent on blitz testing and contact tracing early on. It is only after we contain the health crisis that we can concentrate om rebuilding the economy. The main economic drivers in Santa County are the produce industry, education, and health care. In June, the unemployment rate in Santa Cruz County rose to 14.3%. It might be higher now. We must supply resources to small businesses which took the brunt of the Covid-19 pandemic.

The Legislative District 2 team is encouraging voters in Santa Cruz Valley School District to support the Budget Override there. All three of us have been named Education Champions and we will continue to fight for additional funding for public education. We are also asking voters to vote Yes on the Invest in ED citizen's initiative. It will raise income tax for individuals making over \$250,000 and couples making over \$500,000. The money will be spent on an excellent plan to support classroom educators, support staff, and support the Teachers' Academy to train future educators. Keeping your heart healthy during COVID-19

2. Don't Stress Out Your Heart

Many of us are experiencing stress these days and that can have a negative effect on your heart and play a role in heart disease.

"Having a good support system of family and friends around you, managing your stress, and seeking treatment for depression and anxiety is incredible important not just for your mental health but for your overall health as well."

3. Create Healthy Habits

Dr. Jahan says don't forget the basics. Remember the importance of maintaining your own good health. Many of us have become more sedentary or reluctant to prioritize our fitness and preventive care. Maintaining a healthy diet, regular exercise, and implementing stress reduction techniques all help your overall health. Stay healthy by:

- Communicating with your doctor
- Eating healthy
- Exercising regularly
- Getting enough rest
- Monitoring blood pressure if you have hypertension or heart failure

4. Know When to Seek Emergency Care

It is so important to know the warning signs of heart and stroke symptoms. Watch for:

- Chest pain or pressure, especially during physical activity
- Facial drooping on one side of the face
- Arm weakness or numbness on one side of the body
- Speech changes, including slurred or garbled speech
- Loss of vision
- Severe headache
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing at night associated with:
- Leg swelling
- Dizziness
- Fainting
- Passing out

If you think you're having a heart attack or some other heart issue, don't ride it out at home because you're worried about COVID," says Dr. Jahan. "It's really important to come in come in, or call 911 in an emergency, and get evaluated so you can get the problem taken care of early. At Carondelet, we have taken the proper steps to ensure patients who visit our hospitals or diagnostic centers for any screenings or procedures will be taken care of in a safe and secure environment."

SCC Supervisor Molera NACo Presidential Appointment

Supervisor Rudy Molera, District 2, has been appointed by the National Association of Counties (NACo) President Gary Moore, to two NACo committees. Molera was appointed to the International Economic Development Task Force as well as the Membership Standing Committee.

The International Economic Development Task Force provides information, guidance and support for international economic development activities. (Appoints the chair, vice chair and members.)

The Membership Standing Committee takes direction from and reports directly to the NACo Officers. This committee will be responsible for actively recruiting and retaining member counties, parishes and boroughs in order to increase NACo's total membership. (Appoints the chair, vicechairs, and members for a one-year term.)

Moore expressed that the reason he appointed Molera to the committee is because "my goal is to build a talented and committed leadership team for NACo." One of the duties of the task force is to participate in the NACo Legislative Conference, February 20 - 24, 2021 in Washington, D.C. Molera said, "It's an honor to represent Santa Cruz County and Arizona at the national level in order to bring resources and innovations.





Local organizations along with NUSD have been hosting the Jump Back 2 School event for several years now.
