

Border Eco Magazine recently had the privilege of sitting down with the Hogales Police Department to discuss their vital community partnership. As we explored the department's relationship with the community, it became clear that their commitment to building trust and fostering cooperation is the backbone of their efforts.

With a rich history dating back to the city's incorporation in 1893, the Hogales Police Department has undergone significant transformations over the years. From its humble beginnings with a Town Marshal overseeing a small police force in the original City Hall, built in 1914, to its current operations in a facility built in 1979, the department has grown and evolved to meet the needs of its community. "Today, the Hogales Police Department remains dedicated to serving and protecting our residents, working tirelessly to create a safer and more connected community," said Chief of Police Carlos Jimenez.

The Hogales Police Department strives to enhance the quality of life for its citizens. They achieve this by enforcing federal, state, and local laws while maintaining public order and peace. They prioritize public safety, community engagement, and upholding constitutional rights. By prioritizing community needs, the department addresses immediate threats and emergencies. It investigates crimes, maintains police visibility, and fosters community outreach.

At the heart of the department's mission is community policing, which promotes partnerships and problem-solving to address community concerns. Some notable initiatives include:

- School Resource Officers
- DARE Program
- Community outreach programs like Coffee with a Cop, Hogales National Hight Out, Operation Trunk-n-Treat, and the Citizens Academy
- Opt-in applications and social media platforms such as Facebook, Instagram, X (Twitter), Rave Alerts, and the City Website Contact us Form (nogalespolice911@nogalesaz.gov) The
 department takes pride in its transparent and thorough filing and complaint process. Residents can submit reports in person, by phone, or online, and every complaint against police
 officers is fully investigated.

The Hogales Police Department is dedicated to crime prevention and building strong relationships with residents, business owners, and community stakeholders. By obtaining funding through federal and state grants, the department implements improved traffic safety measures and uses technology to identify problem areas, allowing for more effective resource deployment.

"We recognize the challenges we face," says Chief of Police Carlos Jimenez. "One of our biggest challenges has been keeping officers. Not everyone is cut out for this job. We have officers that sometimes will change careers as our salaries aren't as competitive but some do recognize that here we are a family where we know each other well and we help each other grow professionally."

When recruiting new officers, the department seeks individuals with strong moral character, effective communication skills, sound judgment, emotional intelligence, problem-solving abilities, and a commitment to community service. The hiring process is rigorous, involving a written exam, a physical fitness assessment, a structured interview process, and a thorough background check. Once selected, recruits attend a 24-week police academy, followed by a four- to six-month field training program.

The department's commitment to public safety and education is evident in its various initiatives. These initiatives include School Resource Officers, DARE Officers, Coffee with a Cop, Citizen Academy, and other special events that engage the community.

For those interested in staying informed about department activities and public safety information, the Nogales Police Department provides updates through traditional local and social media outlets. In addition, it provides updates through social media platforms and the RAVE Alerts system.

Through its community outreach programs and initiatives, the Hogales Police Department demonstrates its dedication to building trust and fostering a safer, more connected community. By working together, the department and the community can create a brighter future for Hogales.

November is Diabetes Awareness Month – a time to shine a light on a condition that affects millions of people across the country, including many in the Hispanic community. Diabetes is more than just a medical diagnosis; it's a lifelong journey that touches families, traditions, and the way we live day to day.

As per the American Diabetic association 11% of the Hispanic adults are with Type 2 diabetes. Many factors play a role from genetics and diet to limited access to healthcare and preventive screenings. But beyond the statistics are real people: mothers, fathers, grandparents, and children who are living with or are at risk of diabetes.

Mexican food—especially here in our area—includes many healthy staples such as corn, beans, peppers, tomatoes, chilies, avocado, and squash. These traditional foods are nutritious and healthy. It is also important to be mindful of portion sizes, especially during family gatherings and cultural celebrations where our cherished meals are often enjoyed in abundance.

Prevention and Early Detection Matter:

The good news is that diabetes can often be prevented or managed through small, consistent lifestyle changes. Simple steps can make a big difference:

- Walk for 30 minutes a day
- Choose water instead of soda
- Add more fruits, vegetables, and whole grains to your meals
- Check with your primary health care doctor and get regular blood sugar screenings. Early detection is key. Many people have prediabetes and don't even know it. Without changes, prediabetes can turn into type 2 diabetes – but with awareness, support, and healthier choices, it can be reversed.

Community programs and promotoras (community health workers) at Mariposa Community Health Center play an important role in connecting families to screenings, education, and support. Together, we can reduce the burden of diabetes in our community and make health a shared priority – for ourselves, our families, and future generations.




