

Meet the Santa Cruz County Manager, a true Arizona native, born in Bisbee and raised in Tucson. With a strong educational foundation from the University of Arizona, where he earned a bachelor's degree in civil engineering, he was destined for success.

"My support system has been instrumental in my academic and professional journey," said Jesus Valdez, Santa Cruz County Manager. "My family's guidance and encouragement motivated me to earn a degree in civil engineering and become the person I am today."

Jesus Valdez, Santa Cruz County Manager, celebrates 23 years of happy marriage to his wife, Sandra. Together, they proudly support their two adult children, Areli and Issac, both attending the University of Arizona in Tucson. Areli, 22, is pursuing a degree in biochemistry, while Issac, 21, is working towards a law degree.

His journey into public service began in the City of Tucson's Environmental Service Department, followed by a stint in the Town of Sahuarita. Valdez began his tenure at Santa Cruz County in July 2008. For 15 years, he worked tirelessly in the county's Public Works Department, ultimately taking the reins as County Manager in July 2023.
















"The Santa Cruz County Fair 2024: A Celebration of Artwork & Agriculture"

Referrals to community resources, medical care, and behavioral health support are also available, ensuring that survivors have access to all the tools they need to thrive. Specialized services like sexual assault nursing exams are also offered to address immediate medical needs in a compassionate and supportive environment.


