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Echoes From the Hilltop

Echoes from the Hilltop Gallery presents Nogales native Alejandro Jiménez Valdez, a singer and musician. With roots deeply embedded in the rich musical traditions of Mexico, Valdez brings a unique blend of traditional melodies and contemporary influences to his music. He is a solo artist. His brother and sister occasionally accompany him. Alejandro has been playing guitar for 14 years, and he has been singing in public since he was 12 years old.

His first experience singing was at 15 when he sang in a local church for about eight years. He later joined a local band for two years. He played with Grupo Ilusión y Formales del Norte. After graduating from Nogales High School in 2015, he was offered a position as an air freight agent at DHL Global.

At the age of four, his earliest musical memory dates to when he was a child. It was his father who brought home a cassette tape made by his uncle's band at that time. Since he couldn't reach the big cassette player/stereo, he would ask his mother to rewind the cassette repeatedly. His memory is clearly flooded by the great singing and particularly the reverby snare drum found on many 90s and early 2000s recordings.

Growing up, he was inspired by the ability and talent of these musicians. As a result, he believes it has affected the way he approaches his current work by setting a standard for the quality and level of performance he wishes to maintain, as well as a bit of their style and method of resolving musical conflicts.

Alejandro's exposure to his uncle's band playing seventies music had a profound impact on his musical taste and style. Spanish ballad singers from that era left a lasting impression on him, influencing his songwriting and performance.

However, as he continued to explore different genres and styles of music, Alejandro's sound evolved and expanded to incorporate a wide range of influences. From rock to pop to folk, he has drawn inspiration from various sources to create a distinct and eclectic sound that is all his own. Despite his roots in past music, Alejandro continues to push boundaries and experiment with various sounds. This ensures that his music remains fresh and exciting for listeners today.

Among my songs or music, Alejandro Jiménez Valdez said, "I would pick a song called "Preso". The song is my most recent recording, and it is inspiring to sing. It is well suited to my voice. The song has all the elements I am drawn to musically. I like strings because they convey emotion and beauty to me."

"I find performing the most challenging aspect of my musical journey. Sometimes it can be overwhelming to stand in front of strangers and sing. The strange thing about it is that you can overcome it by performing it repeatedly," he said.

Over the years, my singing has evolved into a more dynamic style. With age, I've realized that singing at different intensities can convey more emotion than singing at the top of my ability. Hopefully, my music and singing will leave my audience feeling nostalgic, surrendered, and with a sense of deeper purpose and meaning.

His powerful vocals and emotive storytelling captivate audiences, transporting them to another world with each song. Valdez's passion for his craft shines through in every performance, as he artfully weaves together elements of love, longing, and cultural identity through his music. With an impressive repertoire that spans genres, Valdez is a true artist whose talent deserves recognition on the local stage.

About a year ago, he started recording at home and singing solo. "I am excited about improving my musical skills and making better music. I am currently composing an original song and it is being recorded. I am excited by the level of musicality and production we are investing in it. Alejandro said, it will be completed soon."



How Stress sabotages healthy eating and healthy lifestyle?

Stress is part of life. We all experience stress to some degree daily. The way we deal with the stress makes a big difference to our overall well-being. MedlinePlus.gov defines stress as a feeling of emotional or physical tension. It can come from any thought that makes you feel frustrated, angry or nervous.

What are the types of stress?

- Acute stress: Is a brief event such as a heated argument or getting stuck in a traffic jam etc.
- Episodic acute stress: Is a frequent acute event such as work deadlines etc.
- Chronic stress: Is a persistent events like unemployment due to a job loss, physical or mental abuse, substance abuse, or family conflict etc.

Here we will focus on Chronic stress because it can:



1. Affect the body's use of calories and nutrients in various ways.
2. Raise the body's metabolic needs and increase the use and excretion of many nutrients. If one does not eat a nutritious diet, a deficiency may occur.
3. Create a chain reaction of behaviors that can negatively affect eating habits, leading to other health problems down the road.
4. Cause people to crave comforting foods such as highly processed snacks or sweets, which are high in fat and calories but low in nutrients.
5. Contribute to the lack of motivation to prepare nutritious, balanced meals, or skipping or forgetting to eat meals.
6. Disrupt sleep by causing lighter sleep or more frequent awakenings, which leads to fatigue during the day. In order to cope with daytime fatigue, people may use stimulants to increase energy such as with caffeine or high-calorie snack foods.
7. Elevate the levels of cortisol that may cause cravings, particularly for foods high in sugar, fat, and calories, which may then lead to weight gain. Cortisol favors the accumulation of fat in the belly area.


