Our museum was not only ready for the holidays, but also for the public. Volunteers and staff decorated the museum for the holidays. In conjunction with the Christmas Light Parade on Saturday, December 4, 2021, we opened our doors to the public and had volunteers distribute hot cocoa and cookies to our guests. Beautifully decorated for the parade, the Nogales Fire Department's truck went through the museum, which was originally the City of Nogales building. Nogales Fire Department started 100 years ago. 

He holds a Bachelor's degree in Journalism and Communications from the University of Florida and a Masters of Education in Counseling and Guidance from the University of Arizona. In his new academic position, he will help lead and coordinate school-based activities to increase the college and career readiness of Rio Rico High School students.

Scurran has an extensive background motivating and coaching students. He is a nationally recognized motivational speaker, athletic consultant, and football clinician. He has been a speaker for the Nike clinic of Champions and for more than 50 major college and state football clinics.

Coach Scurran also has an impressive track record on the football field. The Pima County Sports Hall of Famer has a reputation for taking zero-win football programs and turning them into title game players in the first year. In his most recent high school coaching position,he took Catalina Foothills to the playoffs in the first season and the title game his fourth season.

His teaching and coaching experience extends beyond Arizona boundaries. He served as the head coach for the "Stars and Stripes" USA Global Challenge Bowl in Germany, Japan, Italy and France. He was named Coach of the Year eleven times in four states and has a current head coaching record of 306-98-2.

Scurran will work closely with Athletic Director Chris Laughland who is also new to SCV35 this year. "We are ecstatic to welcome the next head football coach at Rio Rico High School - Coach Jeff Scurran. Throughout his career, Coach Scurran has proven time after time what it takes to build a winning culture and compete at a high level. ## s Talk Heal

January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month. Cervical cancer is a preventable disease. The key to preventing it is to get regular and appropriate screenings, beginning at age 21. If a woman has a family history of cancer or other risk factors, she should speak with her doctor about how frequently she should get screened.

Screening consists of a Pap test and is part of a well women health check exam. A Pap test is a cervical cancer screening test that looks for cell changes to the cervix that might become cervical cancer if they are not treated appropriately. However, receiving an abnormal Pap test result does not necessarily mean a woman has cancer. A Pap test can find cell changes to the cervix caused by the Human Papilloma Virus (HPV). HPV tests find the virus and help healthcare providers know who is at higher risk for cervical cancer. Pap and HPV tests (either alone or in combination) are recommended for women, and they should ask their healthcare provider how often she should be screened, which tests are right or her, and what age to begin.

Additionally, men and women can get HPV-related cancers that are preventable by getting a vaccine. Getting a child vaccinated can protect them from common HPV related cancers and should be discussed at your child's annual wellness exam with your healthcare provider. The CDC recommends all boys and girls get the HPV vaccine at ages 11-12 as the vaccine produces a stronger immune response when taken during preteen years. For this reason, up until the age of 14, only two doses of the vaccine are required. For those 15 years of age and older, a full three-dose series is needed. Talking to a doctor about the HPV vaccine is the best course recommended.

Need to schedule your well woman health check exam and cervical cancer screening with your primary care provider or OBGYN provider? Need to schedule your child's annual wellness exam and to learn more about the HPV vaccine with your child's pediatrician?

Don't hesitate to call Mariposa Community Health Center at (520) 281-1550 to schedule an appointment. No insurance? No problem! Contact our Well Woman Health Check Program at Community Health Services at (520) 375-6050 to help with the costs of cervical cancer screening if you are uninsured or underinsured, a woman over the age of 21, and live in Santa Cruz County.

So, remember to get screened for cervical cancer. Early detection is associated with survival and quality of life!





It was difficult to select a candidate for this particular category. Everyone we featured for people who "echo" in Santa Cruz County is unique in their field and own way! We felt as a team people who work in the healthcare industry have gone above and beyond to keep us healthy these past couple of years. As a team we felt, Senior Director of Community Health Services at Mariposa Community Health Center in Nogales, Arizona known to the community as Platicamos Salud (We Talk Health).

Platicamos Salud is an important extension of Mariposa's clinical services, connecting referred patients to additional education, support and follow-up that is culturally competent and language appropriate. Offering a variety of ongoing health education classes for all community members in locations easily accessible. Platicamos Salud also provides a critical link to the community via its community-based services that partner with other health and social services to serve families and create systems change.

Molina began her employment at Mariposa in 2004 assisting the Director of Platicamos Salud at that time, Jo Jean Elenes. Within 8 months of her employment, she was promoted to Prevention Manager. During her employment with Mariposa, and prior public health experience working with the Border Health Foundation, she developed and managed federal, state and foundation funded community-based programs at the US-Mexico border.

Patty manages 34 staff members at the Mariposa Community Health Services. At the two story Sierra building, they have the Health & Social Services staff under the management leadership of Yara Castro. Castro primarily manages the women's programs such as the Well Woman Health Check, Maternal & Child Health and Patient Advocacy. She has implemented numerous health education programs on breast cancer, diabetes, physical activity and nutrition, HIV/AIDS, tobacco use prevention, asthma, environmental health and maternal child health. Molina designed education and training materials on public and preventative health issues, while establishing numerous community-based projects.

Mrs. Molina facilitated the development of project organizational structure and leadership. She facilitated group processes among community members to help identify needs, gaps in service, existing resources and response strategies. She also serves as the lead in various research projects at Mariposa Community Health Center.

An initiative she is currently working is helping to manage the pandemic, while continuing to provide the best care. "Our goal is to keep our patients safe, this continues to be our main priority. We are working closely with our local health department to ensure vaccination to all who wish to receive it while continuing to educate on the importance of keeping themselves safe regardless of having received the vaccine. We continue to encourage people to get vaccinated, wear a mask, wash their hands and practice social distance," said Molina.
