Eating healthy while travelling

Summer is here and many of us plan road trips during the summer.

Here are some tips to consider when on the road:

- 1. Planning...Planning...Planning: Research the food options available along the way and at your destination and plan your meals accordingly. This can help you make healthier choices.
- 2. Hydrate: Travelling by car or plane you find yourself sitting most of the time and that makes it more challenging to steadily drink water. Pack several reusable water bottles to fill with water and regularly drink from during travels. Fruits are hydrating and give energy and provide antioxidants and nutrients. - 8. Watch portion sizes: Restaurants often serve large portions, so tru sharing a dish, ordering an appetizer, or taking half of your meal to go.
- 9. Practice moderation: You don't have to deprive yourself of treats or indulge excessively. Enjoy your favorite foods in moderation and balance them with healthier options.
- 10.Add Physical Movement to Travel Plans: Whether this means planned stops along a road trip or pacing up and down the airplane aisle or while waiting for your flight, try to move the legs and stretch at least a few times each trip.

The Sheriff's Office celebrated the addition of two new Certified Law Enforcement graduates after they successfully completed a demanding 20-week training program at the Southeastern Arizona Law Enforcement Training Academy (SEALETA). We congratulate Deputy Victoria Yubeta and Deputy Clint Castillo.

Sheriff Hathaway and his Command staff attended the eighth annual Santa Cruz County Public Safety Officers Awards. Deputy Sheriff Arlette Cabrera was awarded for her distinguished service and dedicated professional development since joining the Sheriff's Office. Deputy Cabrera is a qualified phlebotomist, certified Field Training Officer, Radar Instructor, Standardized Field training Instructor, Horizontal Gaze Nystagmus Instructor, High Risk Instructor, and one of two Drug Recognition Experts in Santa Cruz County. Deputy Cabrera's dedication, expertise, and leadership have made her an invaluable asset to the Sheriff's Office and our community.

The Sheriff's Office is updating its 9-1-1 center with the installation of new radio consoles and other upgrades. The State of Arizona (AZDEMA) has approved and awarded 3.9 million dollars to the Sheriff's Office for the improvements. This allows the Sheriff's Office to buy mobile and handheld radios and to upgrade our communications system to include new repeater equipment. AZDEMA has also approved and awarded 900,000 dollars to upgrade the electronic security systems at the Sheriff's Office which includes computers, central control equipment, and software that controls security doors.

Sheriff Hathaway also escorted U.S. Representative Ruben Gallego on a border tour this month. As the clouds arrive for rainy season, we wish you all a safe and enjoyable summer.
