Cindy Matus: A Legacy of Dedication to Patagonia Education

After decades of tireless advocacy for public education, Cindy Matus is retiring from the Patagonia School Board, leaving behind a legacy of commitment and progress. Her journey began as a parent volunteer, reading to students and participating in school activities. Matus's impact expanded when she joined the Santa Cruz County Young Audiences board, bringing arts programs to local schools. Her dedication caught the attention of then-Superintendent Lito Gallindo, leading to her appointment to the Patagonia Elementary School District (PESD) board in 1988. Matus's leadership led to numerous milestones, including serving on the Arizona School Boards Association (ASBA) board of directors for seven years and receiving the "All Arizona School Board Member Award" in 1995. She made history as ASBA's first Latina President in 2003.

Matus's influence extended nationally, serving as National School Boards Association (NSBA) Pacific Region President and chairing the NSBA National Hispanic Caucus of School Board Members. Locally, she played a pivotal role in unifying Patagonia Elementary and Union High School districts under one superintendent and securing funds for the new high school and elementary campus. The implementation of a four-day school week was another significant achievement.

"Communication and transparency were key," Matus emphasized. "We engaged the community through surveys and public meetings." She worked with ten superintendents, fostering professional relationships. Her advocacy focused on affordable housing for school staff, equitable funding for school districts, competitive salaries for teachers and fully funded Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA).

Challenges included addressing fund theft by former Santa Cruz County Treasurer Elizabeth Guthfur. Despite obstacles, Matus remained committed. Her advice to aspiring board members: establish strong relationships with fellow members and superintendents, attend educational training and prioritize student achievement and safety.

As Matus passes the torch, her legacy inspires future generations. "Cindy Matus has been an extraordinary advocate for Patagonia's students," said Superintendent. "Her dedication will be deeply missed."





















Maricruz Ruiz: Empowering Education in Santa Cruz County

Why is it important to fill out the FAFSA form?

According to the student aid website, you need to complete the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®) form to be eligible for federal student aid such as federal grants, work-study funds, and loans. In addition, many states and colleges use your FAFSA information to determine your eligibility for state and school aid. Some private aid providers may use your FAFSA information to determine whether you qualify for their aid as well.

The C-CREO HUB serves as a College Access Center that provides support to students and families from all over the county in filling out the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). The services are provided by the trained Santa Cruz County GEAR UP team. The HUB offers a range of services, including:

- · One-on-one assistance from creating an FSA ID to completing the FAFSA form and reviewing information with families after forms have been completed.
- · Workshops and presentations on financial aid and FAFSA completion
- · Special events, such as FAFSA completion days, incentives and FAFSA completion contests

The center also provides outreach services known as the "HUB Mobile" to high schools in the county that help support students and families to complete their FAFSA at the students' school.

The C-CREO HUB is funded through the office of Mr. Alfredo 1. Velásquez, the Santa Cruz County School Superintendent by a federal grant from the Department of Education. The HUB plays a vital role in helping students and families access financial aid for college. The center's services and incentives help students overcome the barriers to FAFSA completion and ensure that they have the resources they need to pay for college.

January: A Month for Raising Awareness

January shines a spotlight on two critical issues: Stalking Awareness Month and Human Trafficking Awareness Month. These issues are closely linked to dating and domestic violence, making this an important time to educate, empower, and prevent harm in our communities.

Stalking Awareness Month

Stalking is often a red flag for dating and domestic violence. It involves a pattern of unwanted behaviors, like following someone, sending repeated messages, monitoring social media, or showing up uninvited, that makes a person feel scared or unsafe. Many stalking victims know their stalker, who may be a current or former partner.

Preventing stalking starts with awareness. Talk about healthy boundaries, respect, and the warning signs of abusive behavior, such as excessive jealousy or constant monitoring. Encourage open conversations with teens and adults about what makes a relationship safe and supportive.

Human Trafficking Awareness Month

Human trafficking, especially sex trafficking, is often linked to unhealthy and abusive relationships. Traffickers frequently use manipulation, threats, or false promises of love and security to gain control over their victims. Young people are particularly vulnerable when traffickers pose as romantic partners or friends.

Prevention starts with understanding the connection between trafficking and dating violence. Teach teens and young adults about the warning signs of control, such as isolation from family and friends, sudden financial dependence, or a partner who monitors their every move. Empower them to recognize unhealthy behaviors and to seek help if they feel unsafe.


