A Community's Promise Fulfilled: Santa Cruz Hosts Historic "People's Swearing-In" for Congresswoman Adelita S. Grijalva

The event of the year in Santa Cruz County was not a festival or a fair, but a profound civic ceremony that rewrote the political landscape. 


Rising Star of the Year

It's January 2026 — What Are Your New Year's Resolutions?

Many of us start the new year with a long list of things we hope to change. But New Year's resolutions can often feel overrated and overwhelming. In fact, they can carry risks: a high failure rate that leads to stress, anxiety, guilt, and even a damaged self-image.

Many resolutions are driven by external pressures rather than personal values, and they often set unrealistic expectations or promote an all-or-nothing mindset that discourages meaningful, lasting change.

A frequently cited 1988 study of 200 people found that while 77% stuck with their resolutions after one week, only 43% were still on track at three months — and just 19% maintained them after two years.

Another study showed that only 46% of people felt successful with their resolutions six months in. So why is that?

One major reason is that many resolutions are simply unrealistic. Take eating habits, for example. Making big, sweeping changes all at once is difficult. But shifting toward healthier behaviors is possible — especially when we simplify our goals.

A helpful approach is the SMART framework, which stands for:

Specific, Measurable, Achievable, Realistic, and Time-based.

Instead of broad goals like "eat healthier," try making one small, specific change such as:

- Adding vegetables to fill half your plate at meals each day, or
- Eating one piece of fruit daily.

Once that habit feels comfortable, you can build on it. And remember — surrounding yourself with supportive people can make all the difference.

Behavior change is challenging, but don't be discouraged if you don't meet your goals perfectly at first. Progress isn't linear. Keep going, keep adjusting, and keep giving yourself grace.
