Praise to God for a Living Hope

³ Praise be to the God and Father of our Lord Jesus Christ! In his great mercy he has given us new birth into a living hope through the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead, ⁴ and into an inheritance that can never perish, spoil or fade. This inheritance is kept in heaven for you, ⁵ who through faith are shielded by God's power until the coming of the salvation that is ready to be revealed in the last time. ⁶ In all this you greatly rejoice, though now for a little while you may have had to suffer grief in all kinds of trials. ⁷ These have come so that the proven genuineness of your faith—of greater worth than gold, which perishes even though refined by fire—may result in praise, glory and honor when Jesus Christ is revealed. ⁸ Though you have not seen him, you love him;

and even though you do not see him now, you believe in him and are filled with an inexpressible and glorious joy, ⁹ for you are receiving the end result of your faith, the salvation of your souls.

Jesus Appears to His Disciples

¹⁹ On the evening of that first day of the week, when the disciples were together, with the doors locked for fear of the Jewish leaders, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁰ After he said this, he showed them his hands and side. The disciples were overjoyed when they saw the Lord.

²¹ Again Jesus said, "Peace be with you! As the Father has sent me, I am sending you." ²² And with that he breathed on them and said, "Receive the Holy Spirit. ²³ If you forgive anyone's sins, their sins are forgiven; if you do not forgive them, they are not forgiven."

Jesus Appears to Thomas

²⁴ Now Thomas (also known as Didymus^[a]), one of the Twelve, was not with the disciples when Jesus came. ²⁵ So the other disciples told him, "We have seen the Lord!"

But he said to them, "Unless I see the nail marks in his hands and put my finger where the nails were, and put my hand into his side, I will not believe."

²⁶ A week later his disciples were in the house again, and Thomas was with them. Though the doors were locked, Jesus came and stood among them and said, "Peace be with you!" ²⁷ Then he said to Thomas, "Put your finger here; see my hands. Reach out your hand and put it into my side. Stop doubting and believe."

²⁸ Thomas said to him, "My Lord and my God!"

²⁹ Then Jesus told him, "Because you have seen me, you have believed; blessed are those who have not seen and yet have believed."

³⁰ Jesus performed many other signs in the presence of his disciples, which are not recorded in this book. ³¹ But these are written that you may believe^[b] that Jesus is the Messiah, the Son of God, and that by believing you may have life in his name.

MESSAGE - A LIVING HOPE

Do you have hope? What motivates you to continue? Or are you ready to give up and lose faith? Would you cease to believe in God? How do you cope in this time of uncertainty and social distancing? What keeps people going? What is the source of our hope?

When Peter wrote this letter, about AD 64, persecutions were still taking place among the young Christian churches. They had been alienated from society because of their faith. Peter was reminding them of the grace of God and that they must remain true to their calling. Life is a difficult pilgrimage, one that demands insight and endurance. There is a heavenly reward for remaining faithful to the end.

When we talk of a "Living Hope", we are not only in the future we are also talking about the present. "The Living Hope of Salvation" that has already begun.

Peter promised the early Christians a "living hope." Incidentally, the word "salvation" is rooted in the Latin word SALUS. It has nothing to do with life after death. It means health or wholeness. It is also very close to the Hebrew word SHALOM, which means peace.

The hope that Peter advocated has to do with a wholeness or peace that is possible today. For Peter, hope is an active and living reality. He goes on to say that this living hope is one that can never perish, spoil or fade. The living hope that Peter talked about is a hope that never wears out. It will be there longer than any antique. The hope of God is a hope that never dies or fades. It is infinite, permanent.

The early church was in danger of giving up their faith because of the persecutions they endured. No other hope could keep the faithful from giving up. Peter assures his followers that God is with them in the present moment. They were to live with a hope that never perishes, spoils or fades. With hope like that they could withstand any sufferings, hardships or crises that came their way.

In Life when all seems hopeless we have three choices.

The first is to abandon hope. Well that is easy... just have a negative attitude. Comments like these...."Well things are only going to get worse". "I will never see my grandkids again". "Life is not worth living anymore." Abandoning something is not facing the problem head on. The second choice we have is to pretend. We could pretend that this crisis doesn't really exist. We could stick our heads in the sand and continue to live as though there is no crisis in world. Pretending is

nothing more than a defense mechanism. It is a way to ignore what is taking place around us.

We can either abandon hope or pretend. But ... Both lead to hopelessness.

There is a third choice. We can BELIEVE, just as Peter did, that there is indeed a living hope.

Biblical hope means that we expect things like glory and grace with confidence because the Lord has promised them to us. In Psalm 42 when it says "hope in God," that means to have confidence in God. But, to simply "hope" is not enough. There must be some form of action.

As a supervising minister I was attending a Board meeting. The church treasurer said that offerings were a little low that winter and unless stewardship improved they would not be able to pay all the bills. One man said that all they needed to do was pray and God would deliver. There was a few moments of silence. Finally, one of the oldest men in the church spoke up. He said, "In all my years in the church I have never once seen God hand down a check from the clouds."

Hope is being made possible because we are all this together, we are praying, loving, supporting one another. Hope is possible for those who have it and have taken action.

None of us has to carry any burden alone. God is always intervening on our behalf to make our hope real. It is a lasting hope, one that will be there to the end of time. For the hope that God gives will never perish, spoil or fade. It there ... sometimes we just have to dig a little deeper to find it in times like this. Amen
