The Commissioning of the Disciples

Adaptation of Genesis 1:1-2:4a

Everything was dark when God began creation. God's spirit swept over the waters of this yet to be shaped planet.

Let there be light, God commanded. And there was light, beautiful light, flooding over part of the planet as it began to spin on its axis.

That was the first day – the light that illumines all.

God called the light Day and the darkness Night.

God looked at the waters and separated them.

The waters above were called Sky; the waters beneath were called oceans, seas, rivers, lakes, ponds, streams

So the second day was accomplished and God was pleased.

God was please, but God wasn't done yet. Pushing up from the waters came the dry land.

Springing forth from this land were fruit trees, vegetation.

Each fruit and plant yielded seed, each according to its kind so that it would reproduce and continue.

Delighted with God's own work, God declared it very good.

And so the third day occurred. Lush and green, beautiful with golden grain the earth was giving birth to those things which would sustain life. God scattered lights in the sky and called them stars to illuminate the Night. A greater light was placed in the sky in the Day and it was called the Sun. A lesser light was given in the Night sky and God called it Moon.

God was very pleased and saw that it was very good. This was the fourth day.

The beautiful waters of the seas and oceans were vacant and so God created the wondrous sea creatures, fish, and all manner of sea and ocean creatures.

The lakes and rivers teamed with fish and aquatic life.

God saw that it was good and so the fifth day was accomplished.

We need some creatures to roam the earth. God created all the creatures upon the earth, endless was the variety of wildlife God created.

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We need someone to take care of these creatures

So God created humanity; and the writers of Genesis wanted us to remember that we are created in God's image, not to be God, but to be God's good stewards; the people who would treat the earth carefully and lovingly.

So, that's how they saw it – the beginnings of our ministries of peace with justice – beginning as stewards of God's creation, not abusers, not destroyers.

We haven't done a very good job. We've abused the land and its people. We have enslaved people and we have allowed young ones to starve, old ones to give up hope. That's not how God wanted it.

We've got another chance to do this right, right now, this very minute. It's up to us. We who call ourselves by Christ's Name must now bear some responsibility for this earth and its people.

Then God will see creation, its creatures, its humans, and call it very good.

MESSAGE

Our Mysterious God

The definition of Mystery is something that is difficult or impossible to understand or explain.

But there are some mysteries that will always be a mystery. Today, Trinity Sunday, we come against one of those mysteries - God. I dare say that it's not very often that we think of God as a mystery.

Who is God? Where is God? What is God? I can't touch him. I can't say how big he is because I don't know what to measure. I can't see him. If I wanted to take a photo of God I don't know where to point the camera. I can't knock on his door and have morning tea with God at his home. I can't feel the presence of God because I'm never too sure if I am only feeling my own emotions. I can't imagine what God is like because I always end up using human pictures, giving him human qualities so that he makes sense to my small human mind. I can't think like God because if I could I would be able to understand why a young mother had to die, why thousands of people die in earthquakes, or why a child gets cancer.

We don't often talk about the mystery and awesomeness of God these days. We have tried to be a bit more logical and talk more about Jesus and refer to him as a companion, a friend, a miracle worker. Others view God as a nameless being playing with us in the same way as a cat plays with a mouse. What has happened is that people have fashioned God after their own likeness.

As humans, creatures of God, we can't even begin to imagine what God is like. We are restricted to describing God with earthly language and so can only express what God is like in the vaguest of terms and left guessing what we have missed. This is the mystery of God, the great God, the only God who is three persons in one God, who refuses to be categorised, who is far bigger and greater than we could ever imagine, who existed before this world was made, the God who created this world, put he sun and moon and stars in place, the one who created us and said "it was good".

The early Christians started talking about a Triune God. This wasn't to make God more logical and understandable and acceptable to human ways of thinking. In fact, the idea of the Trinity intensified the mystery and awesomeness of God. They were taught of strong powerful God unseen to them, they witnessed Jesus as the teacher, the one sent to save them, that Jesus had a unique relationship with the Father and that the Holy Spirit was given to them to work with them in the absence of Jesus and had a unique relationship with the Father and the Son.

Against all sorts of odds, against all human logic, and in the face of mounting opposition, the Church maintained that Jesus Christ is true God, equal with the Father, and that the Holy Spirit is God, equal with the Father and the Son.

So there we have the Trinity

The psalmist can see that God is truly majestic when he says, "O Lord, our Lord, how majestic is your name in all the earth! You have set your glory above the heavens" (Ps 8:1). He looks at the stars and the moon, and these days we could go further and add the galaxies and planets of the universe, and he can only conclude that these must be the work of a great God.

Maybe you have done the same. You looked at the magnificent colours of a sunset, the intricate structure of a beautiful flower, the mountains, the green fields, a star filled sky and you have said, "There, that's proof

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that there is a God. Anyone who wants to see evidence of God's existence doesn't need to look any further.

As for how Jesus fits into all of this ... we prepare for his coming as an infant, we follow his life and when God calls him into ministry we listen to his teachings and learn of his miracles and healings and we walk the road of the cross with him, celebrate his resurrection and wait for his return.

And then last week we celebrated Pentecost – the pouring of the Holy Spirit on his disciples and the church. Jesus said that he and the Father would send the Spirit to remind us of the truth of God's promises, to guide us, to encourage us and sustain us when the going gets tough. There is nothing more personal than the Spirit of God. He knows us better than we know ourselves. He knows when we need reassuring. He knows when we are afraid and timid and need the encouragement that comes from God's Word. He knows when we are guilty and depressed and need comforting. He becomes a part of our existence in this world. He lives in us even though we allow our sinful nature to take control of our lives so often. Theoretically speaking some people might say this is impossible this is impossible for God... but God does it anyways. The doctrine of the Trinity is not an attempt by the church to unravel the mystery around God. In fact, it deepens the mystery. It doesn't tell us everything about what God is and who he is. It raises more questions rather than give answers. But it does tell us about some important things about God – things that are life changing.

Who is God? He is our heavenly Father who made us, takes cares of us and calls us his dear children. Who is God? He is Jesus Christ who gave his life on the cross to re-establish our relationship with God. He reveals the way to God and to eternal life. Who is God? God is the Spirit in you giving you faith in God and guiding you in your daily walk as a Christian.

Faith in the Triune God acknowledges the might and majesty of God but at the same trusts in a God who cares.

I have met many Christians over the years who have been puzzled by the idea of the Trinity...God 3 in 1, some even to the point of saying that they find it impossible to believe. But I don't think we will be questioned about our understanding of the Trinity when we get to the Heaven. After all in human terms this is an impossible concept ... let's leave it as a part of the mystery of God.

But what is important is that in the up and down struggles of daily life we have a God who saves, a God who loves, a God who has gone to extreme lengths to ensure that you have a living relationship with him. Our God might be majestic and mighty but he is here now and wants you to be with him in all eternity.

Let us make it our prayer, Lord God in spite of our unbelief and lack of understanding of who you are, we know you are with us in all times and places, you are that quiet voice in times of turmoil, you are the message in songs and hope for the future. God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy spirit, show us your new way of living. Amen.
