History of International Men's Day

Calls for an International Men's Day have been noted since at least the 1960's when many men were reported to "have been agitating privately to make 23 February International Men's Day, the equivalent of 8 March, which is International Women's Day". In the Soviet Union this day was The Red Army and Navy Day since 1922, which in 2002 was renamed to Defender of the Fatherland Day. The date was informally viewed a male counterpart of Women's Day (8 March) in some territories of the Union, however due to the day's limited focus to historical events some countries of the former union have moved to adopt the more 'male specific' 19 November as International Men's Day, including Belarus, Ukraine, Moldova, Russia and Georgia.

In 1968 the American journalist John P. Harris wrote an editorial in the Salina Journal highlighting a lack of balance in the Soviet system, which promoted an International Women's Day for the female workers without promoting a corresponding day for male workers. Harris stated that although he did not begrudge Soviet women their March day of glory, its resulting gender inequality clearly exhibited a serious flaw in the Communist system, which, "makes much of the equal rights it has given the sexes, but as it turns out, the women are much more equal than the men." Harris stated that while the men toiled along in their grooves doing what their government and womenfolk tell them to do, there was no day when males are recognized for their service, leading Harris to conclude that

"This strikes me as unwarranted discrimination and rank injustice." Similar questions about the inequality of observing women's day without a corresponding men's day occurred in media publications from the 1960's through to the 1990's, at which time the first attempts at inaugurating international Men's Day are recorded.

In the early 1990's, organizations in the United States, Australia and Malta held small events in February at the invitation of Thomas Oaster who directed the Missouri Center for Men's Studies at the University of Missouri–Kansas City. Oaster successfully promoted the event in 1993 and 1994, but his following attempt in 1995 was poorly attended and he ceased plans to continue the event in subsequent years. Australians also ceased to observe the event (until they re-established it on 19 November 2003) whilst the Maltese Association for Men's Rights continued as the only country that continued to observe the event each year in February. Formerly being the only country still observing the original February date, the Maltese AMR Committee voted in 2009 to begin observing the day on 19 November in order to be synchronized with the rest of the world.

Although International Men's and Women's Day are considered to be 'gender focused' events, they are not ideological mirror images because they highlight issues that are considered unique to men or to women. The history of IMD primarily concerns celebrating issues that are considered unique to the experiences of men and boys, along with an emphasis on positive role models, which is especially "deemed necessary in a social context which is often fascinated with images of males behaving badly... In highlighting positive male role models IMD attempts to show that males of all ages respond much more energetically to positive role models than they do to negative stereotyping."



Master of Ceremony SHELTON J. PRESCOTT

As a dedicated educator and community leader, Bro. Shelton J Prescott's passion for both education and community service was nurtured and cultivated in the city of Paterson, New Jersey. Following his graduation from John F. Kennedy High School in 1992, where he excelled as a scholar-athlete, Bro. Prescott earned numerous academic

and athletic scholarships from division 1 programs, choosing Syracuse University in upstate New York. At Syracuse, he received a Bachelor of Science degree in Child and Family Studies and served as a 3-year starter for the Orange football team. Balancing academic achievement with athletic recognition, Bro. Prescott earned numerous awards, including the Inaugural Bill Maxwell Award for Most Improved Offensive Player, Athletic Director's Academic Award, Syracuse Keystone Offensive Player of the Year and First Team All-Big East honors. His athletic pursuits extended to competitions in the historic Big East Conference and championship games like the Fiesta, Gator, and Liberty Bowls, where he faced off against Hall of Famers like Brian Dawkins, Warren Sapp, and Ray Lewis, and played alongside Hall of Famer Marvin Harrison and Donovan McNabb.

Driven by a desire to give back to his community, Bro. Prescott returned to his alma mater, John F. Kennedy High School, as a Special Needs teacher. For 27 years, he dedicated himself to educating and empowering young minds, earning the prestigious Governor's Teacher of the Year award in 2014. He further deepened his expertise by attaining a master's degree in special education from New Jersey City University.

Beyond the classroom, Brother Prescott's influence extends deeply into community initiatives. He has led programs such as the Boys Leadership Conference and the Youth Empowerment Seminar, dedicated to nurturing leadership and empowerment among young people. His commitment to community and family values led him to become a Prince Hall Mason of Integrity Lodge No. 51 (Paterson, NJ) in 2002, eventually serving as Worshipful Master (2006-2007, 2018-2019) and the 88th Grand Master of the Most Worshipful Prince Hall Grand Lodge of New Jersey (2015-2017). Remarkably, he was one of the youngest Grand Masters nationwide at just 41 years old.

During his tenure as Grand Master, Brother Prescott and a team of dedicated members established impactful programs that continue to thrive today. These include the Prince Hall Community Day Festival, Prince Hall HBCU tour, Scholarship and Education Committee partnerships with the Credit Union, and the enhancement of community engagement. His leadership was further blessed by hosting the Conference of Grand Masters during his inaugural year. Currently, he is the Grand Historian, member of the Custodian of the Works Committee and advisor to the Scholarship and Education Committee. He has and continues to serve as a mentor for numerous members of the Order at the subordinate, district and state levels in New Jersey and abroad.

Outside of Masonry, Bro. Prescott continues to serve in diverse capacities. He holds the Vice President and Historian position for Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., Delta Mu Lambda Chapter, Chairman of the "Alpha Footprints in Paterson" partnership with the Paterson Museum, Co-Chairman of the "Every Month is Black History Month" initiative with the Masonic Order, Divine 9 and civic and grassroots organizations, and contributes his knowledge to the Paterson Juneteenth Committee's educational and historical endeavors. He also shares his experience and insights at community forums and speaking engagements on black history, urban education, empowerment seminars, and workshops.

Faith plays a significant role in Bro. Prescott's life. He is a dedicated member of Messiah Baptist Church in East Orange, NJ with his wife of over 20 years, Mrs. LaVosha Payne-Prescott.

He is guided by the wisdom of Prince Hall Mason and Alpha, Bro. Dr. W.E.B. DuBois: "Children Learn More From What You Are Than What You Teach."

Recently, his work with the Nursing HSSI program earned him a DAISY Team Award for Advancing Health Equity. Fernand or Nurse Dean to his patients, is a board certified psychiatric and mental health nurse who Is licensed to practice in the States of New Jersey and New York. He completed his PhD in Nursing Science from the Graduate Center, City University of New York and his Master of Science in Nursing from the Hunter-Bellevue School of Nursing. His Bachelor of Science in Nursing was earned from Dominican University New York. At the American Psychiatric Nurses Association (APNA), he serves on the Addictions and Recovery Panel and is a board exam item writer at the American Nurses Credentialing Center (ANCC). He is also an active member of the Philippine Nurses Association of America (PNAA), where he serves as Auditor of the New Jersey Chapter and Education Committee Chair of the PNANJ Bergen Passaic County subchapter. At the PNANJ, he is an active supporter community service programs such as feeding the homeless and community health screenings.

HONORABLE JUDGE PHILIP FENSTER

Legacy of Integrity of Justice Award

Philip Fenster was born in Paterson, New Jersey, on November 13, 1949. He graduated from University of Rochester, Driven by a passion for justice, he pursued law at Rutgers Law School, obtaining his Juris Doctor Degree.

In 1977, Philip partnered with Mark Weber to establish a law practice. In 1994 he was appointed as a Judge in the Passaic Municipal Court, marking the beginning of an influential judicial career. Seven years later, former Mayor William Pascrell, Jr. appointed Philip as a Judge in the Paterson Municipal Court. His fair judgments and commitment to upholding the law earned him reappointments under successive administrations, including those of Mayor Martin Barnes and Mayor Jose Torres. He served on the bench with distinction until his retirement in 2013. Retirement did not mean the end, later that same year, his expertise was once again called upon by Paterson Mayor Jeffrey Jones, who appointed him as a hearing officer for employee disciplinary hearings for the City of Paterson.

In 1991, he married Laurie Cohen Fenster, with whom he shared a rich life of love and mutual support. He has been a mentor, a community advocate, and a dedicated public servant. His legacy of integrity, fairness, and compassion continues to inspire those who knew him and those who benefited from his judgments.



COREY M. FLEMING

Innovation Library Director Award

Corey M. Fleming is the Director of the Paterson Free Public Library, where he brings over 20 years of diverse experience in the library field. Union County Commissioner Portuguese Heritage Pride Award

Commissioner Sergio Granados, a native of Elizabeth, made history as the youngest

Commissioner elected to the Board in 2013 and the youngest Democratic board member in New Jersey. Re-elected to his fourth term in 2022, he served his second term as Chairman in 2023.

Granados 2023 initiatives, "Building a Stronger Union County," brought county-wide improvements, including park upgrades, an expanded regional dispatch center, and the groundbreaking adoption of the ARRIVE Together program, the first in the state to incorporate ALL 21 municipalizes. Additionally in 2023, he distributed \$500 tax rebate checks to qualified seniors and veterans, launched free swimming lessons for children, organized job fairs, expungement clinics, and the inaugural Union County WORKS Summit. Granados also introduced innovative programs like the Blue Envelope initiative for traffic stop communication with autistic drivers.

As Chairman of various committees, Granados oversaw COVID-19 relief fund disbursement in 2020, resulting in zero-percent tax increases, and coordinated pandemic responses in 2021. He attended Union County College and earned a Bachelor of Business Management and a Master of Public Administration from Kean University. Granados resides in Elizabeth with his wife, Kellianne.

Community Health Champion Award


Dr. Silva was born and raised in Spanish Harlem, New York City, where he attended public school


