The Tate County MLK Scholarship Application must be submitted online at www.midsouthchurches.com/scholarships no later than 11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, April 15, 2026. Scholarship awards will range from \$500 to \$1,000 and based on the generosity of our supporting churches and the Tate County community, we anticipate awarding the maximum amount this year.

Awards will be issued by check to each recipient upon satisfactory receipt of first-semester grades from a regionally accredited post-secondary institution.



Applications submitted by mail or in person will not be accepted. For questions or concerns, please contact your church's scholarship committee representative or your pastor if no representative is designated. All decisions of the scholarship committee are final.



Scholarship Eligibility and Church Participation Policy

To maintain fairness and honor the shared commitment of our participating churches, the MLK Committee has established the following guidelines for scholarship eligibility. These expectations help ensure that the generosity of our community is matched by consistent engagement from all congregations.

1. Church Participation Requirement. Participating churches are asked to support the MLK Scholarship Fund through **consistent engagement** in committee activities, program promotion, and annual giving. This shared commitment strengthens our collective impact on Tate County youth.

2. Minimum Annual Church Contribution. To qualify for their members to receive a scholarship award, each participating church is expected to contribute **a minimum of \$200** to the MLK Scholarship Fund. Churches contributing **less than the minimum** may still participate in the program; however, **their members will not be eligible for scholarship awards** for that program year.

3. Consistency Matters. Churches are encouraged to:

- Attend scheduled meetings or send a representative
- Promote the scholarship application within their congregation
- Support the MLK Day program through participation and presence

Consistent engagement ensures that the scholarship remains a true community effort.

4. Scholarship Award Eligibility for Students. Students must meet all published application requirements. In addition, scholarship eligibility is tied to the participation of their home church as outlined above.

5. Annual Review. The MLK Committee will review participation and contribution levels each year to ensure the policy remains fair, equitable, and aligned with the needs of our students and community.

MLK Day History

Martin Luther King Jr. Day, observed each January, honors Dr. King's legacy and calls us to reflect and act on civil rights. The push for the holiday began with labor unions and lawmakers like Rep. John Conyers and Sen. Edward Brooke. Though their 1979 bill fell short, public support grew.

Opponents argued that the cost and tradition of honoring only public officials. At the time, only Washington and Columbus had national holidays. The King Center rallied support, and Stevie Wonder's 1980 song "Happy Birthday" helped energize the movement. A petition with six million signatures, the largest in U.S. history, urged Congress to act. President Reagan initially opposed the holiday but signed the bill in 1983. It passed the Senate 78–22 and the House 338–90. The first observance was in 1986. The date follows the Uniform Monday Holiday Act, placing it on the third Monday of January rather than King's actual birthday.

Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. Litany

Leader: May the work of Dr. King continue to eradicate racial justice and its ungodly consequences.

People: **Dr. King pursued his dream of racial equality by appealing to the conscience of his enemies.**

Leader: May we continue to cultivate the nonviolent discipline of Dr. King, abandoning unrestrained acts of force.

People: **He taught us that a heart full of grace and love is just as important as an education.**

People: **He believed in self-respect and dignity, even though he knew that there would be difficult days ahead.**

Leader: May we have the courage of Dr. King as we continue to stand up for justice, reconciliation and truth, despite challenge and controversy.

People: **Dr. King said that war is never a victory, regardless of the outcome.**

Leader: May the peace of the risen Christ cause the fury of war to vanish from the face of the earth.

All: **He reassured us that we will get there one day. God of Glory, be with us on the journey.**
