Proclamation

hereas, Accompong Town, in Cockpit Country, is home to the Trelawny Town Indigenous Maroons. The Maroons are descendants of the enslaved Africans, Moors, and Taino Indians. The Maroons ran away from the Spanish plantation owners when the British took the island of Jamaica from Spain in 1655. They fled to the mountainous areas of Jamaica, where it was difficult for their slave owners to follow and catch them, and formed independent communities as free men and women; and

hereas, for the past 285 years the Maroons have protected the Cockpit Country which is recognized as one of Jamaica's last remaining areas of undisturbed forest, containing critical watersheds and many species of plants, insects, and animals. Researchers from around the world continue to find new species of medicinal plants, highlighting the importance of protecting this region of biodiversity; and

hereas, the Cockpit Country is guided by Article 32 of the United Nations Declaration Charter on the Rights of Indigenous Peoples. The Indigenous Maroon people of Jamaica are unyielding in their commitment to protecting and preserving the Cockpit Country in its natural habitat; and

hereas, every year the victory of the Trelawny Town Maroons is celebrated on January 6, in commemoration of Cudjoe's birthday. The Cockpit Country is central to Jamaica's cultural heritage, as it is here where the Maroons were able to force the British into signing a Peace Treaty at Peace Cave, in 1738; and

hereas, the Indigenous Maroons are descendants of Africans from Ghana, Benin, Nigeria, and Central Africa including the Akan, Ashanti, Yoruba, Ibo, and Ibibio people who freed themselves from slavery in the Colony of Jamaica and established communities of free African people in the mountainous interior, in the parishes of St James, Trelawny, St Ann, St Elizabeth, Manchester, and the northern tip of Clarendon; and

hereas, on behalf of the United States House of Representatives, I salute the Maroon people of the Sovereign State of Accompong Cockpit Country, for their distinguished and positive contributions, which make our nation great, and I bestow upon on them the highest honor as a member of the 118th session of Congress; and
