



**Here's a general vaccination schedule for puppies and adult dogs. Always consult your vet to customize this based on your dog's specific needs and local regulations.**

#### Puppy Vaccination Schedule

Age	Vaccine	Notes
6 - 8 weeks	- DHPP (Distemper, Hepatitis, Parvovirus, Parainfluenza)	<b>First core vaccination.</b>
	- Bordetella (Optional)	For kennel cough, if your puppy will be around other dogs.
10 - 12 weeks	- DHPP Booster	Second dose of core vaccine.
	- Leptospirosis (Optional)	If recommended in your area for exposure to wildlife or standing water.
	- Lyme disease (Optional)	If your dog is at risk for ticks.
14 - 16 weeks	- DHPP Booster	<b>Final core vaccine.</b>
	- Rabies	<b>Legally required; consult your local regulations.</b>
	- Leptospirosis (Booster, if given earlier)	Booster if your puppy received the initial vaccine.
	- Lyme disease (Booster, if given earlier)	Booster if your puppy received the initial vaccine.
12 - 16 months	- DHPP Booster	Final core booster as your puppy transitions to adulthood.
	- Rabies Booster	Usually given every 1 or 3 years depending on local laws.

#### Adult Dog Vaccination Schedule (After 16 months)

Frequency	Vaccine	Notes
Every 1-3 years	- DHPP Booster	Based on vet recommendation (some areas may do yearly or every 3 years).
	- Rabies	<b>Booster Required by law; typically, every 1 or 3 years depending on the vaccine used.</b>
Annual	- Leptospirosis (Optional)	Yearly booster recommended for at-risk dogs.
	- Bordetella (Optional)	For dogs frequently in kennels, dog parks, or grooming.
	- Canine Influenza (Optional)	For dogs at risk of respiratory infections in high-dog-density areas.
	- Lyme Disease (Optional)	Annual booster recommended for dogs in tick-prone areas.

#### Additional Considerations

- Parasite Prevention: Ask your vet about flea, tick, and heartworm prevention.
- Titer Testing: Some adult dogs may benefit from titer testing to assess immunity levels instead of automatic re-vaccination.
