What to Expect in This Guide

If you're helping a parent, spouse, or loved one get documents notarized, you may already be juggling a lot.

This guide is here to walk you through what to expect, what to prepare, and how to avoid common issues so the appointment can go as smoothly as possible.

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WHEN YOU MIGHT NEED A NOTARY

Notarization often comes up during important legal, medical, financial, and family situations. Here are some common examples of documents and moments where a notary may be needed.



ESTATE AND TRUST DOCUMENTS

- Power of Attorney
- Advance Health Care Directive
- Trust documents
- Affidavits
- Supporting estate planning forms



MEDICAL OR CARE-RELATED SITUATIONS

- Documents needed during hospitalization or rehab stays
- Medical authorization forms
- Healthcare-related affidavits or declarations



FAMILY, PERSONAL & PROPERTY MATTERS

- Travel consent forms for minors
- School or caregiver forms
- Identity-related affidavits or sworn statements
- Vehicle title transfer documents

IMPORTANT!

Not every document needs notarization. Requirements can vary depending on the document and the agency requesting it. If you're unsure, check with the attorney, DMV, healthcare provider, or organization involved before booking your appointment.

WORKING WITH A NOTARY: STEP BY STEP

Here is a simple step-by-step overview of what the notary process typically looks like, from finding the right notary to completing the appointment.

Step 1: Find the right notary

Look for a notary who serves your area, explains the process clearly, and is familiar with the type of appointment you need.

Step 2: Schedule appointment

Choose a time and location that works for all signers, especially if mobility, care needs, or facility access are involved.

Step 3: Gather valid ID

Make sure each signer has acceptable ID ready before appointment. If you're unsure, ask your notary ahead of time.

Step 4: Review the documents

Fill out the documents ahead of time, but do not sign them until the notary is present.

Step 5: Confirm whether witnesses are needed

Some documents require witnesses. Verify this in advance with the document provider.

Step 6: Meet with the notary in person

All signers whose signatures are being notarized must appear before the notary.

Step 7: Complete the signing

The notary checks ID, confirms willingness and awareness, watches the signatures, collects thumbprint & completes notarial certificate.

Step 8: Keep copies and follow next steps

After notarization, keep copies for your records if needed and return or submit the documents wherever they need to go.

HOW TO FIND THE RIGHT NOTARY FOR YOUR SITUATION

If you're helping someone through a stressful or time-sensitive situation, working with a patient, mobile notary can make the process much easier.

LOOK FOR SOMEONE WHO:

- Clearly explains their process
- Is familiar with family, medical, or estate planning appointments
- Travels to your city
- Has flexible scheduling if timing is sensitive
- Communicates calmly and professionally

QUESTIONS TO ASK BEFORE BOOKING:

- Do you travel to homes, hospitals, or care facilities?
- This is the type of ID my family member has, will that work?
- What should we have ready before the appointment?
- How are your fees structured?
- What forms of payment do you accept?

A good notary should make the process feel clear, calm, and manageable, especially when you're helping someone through a stressful situation.

THE 5 THINGS TO PREPARE BEFORE THE APPOINTMENT

The best way to have a smooth notary appointment is to be fully prepared before the notary arrives. Here's how you do that!

1 Valid ID

The signer(s) will need valid photo ID. In CA, that's typically a government issued ID. If you're unsure whether your ID will work, be sure to ask your notary ahead of time!

(Tip: there may be alternative options if the ID is expired!)

2 The document should be complete, but not signed

Your documents should be filled out and complete before the appointment, but please wait to sign your document(s) until you are in front of the notary.

CA notaries are not legally allowed to notarize incomplete documents.

3 All signers must be present

Anyone whose signature is being notarized must appear in person before the notary at the time of the appointment.

4 The signer must be aware and willing

The signer needs to understand what they are signing and do so willingly, without pressure. If your loved one is not in a place to sign at the time of the appointment, let your notary know ahead of time so you can reschedule if needed. I promise we understand, it happens!

5 Witnesses, if required

Some documents require witnesses. Notaries are not legally allowed to decide whether witnesses are needed, so if you aren't sure, confirm this in advance with the attorney or document provider.

WHAT IF THE SIGNER'S ID IS EXPIRED OR MISSING?

If the signer's ID is expired, lost, or unavailable, there may still be options. The best next step is to check the ID issue date and contact the notary before the appointment.

First, check the issue date

In CA, even if the ID is expired, it may still work depending on:

- the type of ID
- the issue date
- whether it meets CA identification requirements

If the ID has been issued within the last 5 years, we can still use it!

If there is no acceptable ID, credible witnesses may be an option

A credible witness is someone who can help verify the signer's identity. In CA, this usually means using two credible witnesses unless the notary personally knows the signer, then only one credible witness is needed.

(more on credible witnesses below!)

Tell the notary ahead of time

If the signer's ID is expired, missing, or questionable, let the notary know before the appointment.

That gives the notary time to:

- review the situation
- explain what may be needed
- confirm whether credible witnesses may be an option

Credible Witnesses MUST:

- personally know the signer
- have acceptable ID themselves
- be present at the appointment
- swear or affirm that the signer is who they say they are
- not be named in or financially interested in the document

WHAT A NOTARY CAN AND CANNOT DO

Knowing a notary's role, and what we can and cannot do, helps make for a smooth appointment and avoids frustration.

A notary can:	A notary cannot:
 Verify identity using acceptable identification methods	 Explain the contents of the document
 Witness signatures	 Give legal advice or tell you how to complete your document
 Complete the notarial certificate	 Tell you which notarial act you need
 Keep a required record of the notarization in their journal when applicable	 Notarize incomplete documents
	 Proceed if the signer does not appear aware or willing

A notary's role is to verify identity and witness the signing, not to advise on the document itself.

COMMON MISTAKES & SPECIAL SITUATIONS TO WATCH FOR

These situations can often still be handled smoothly with the right preparation, but it helps to communicate details ahead of time.

Common Mistakes I See:

Signing the document too early

Bringing expired or unacceptable ID

Forgetting required witnesses

Leaving blanks in the document

Waiting until the last minute to book

Special Situations to Flag for Your Notary:

Hospital or rehab appointments (these may require more coordination)

Signers who do not have valid ID

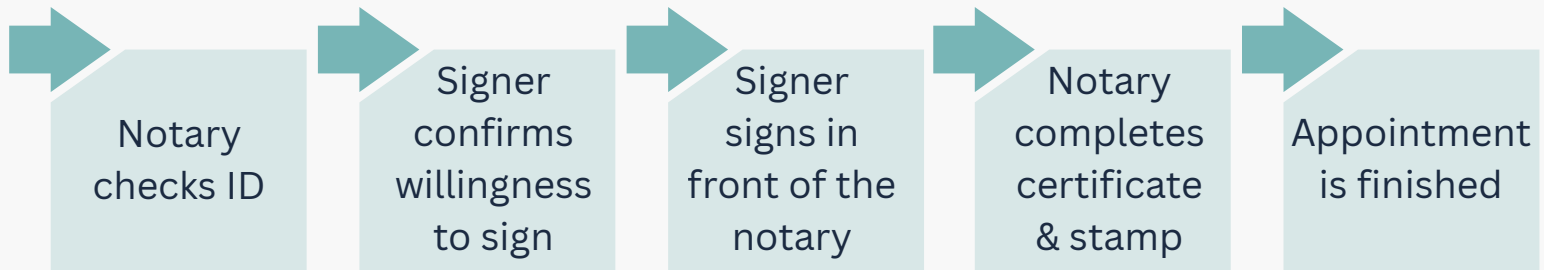
Family members trying to help but unsure what is needed

Documents prepared by an attorney vs. downloaded online

Signers with limited mobility (if your family member can't physically sign their name, there are still ways to get their document notarized. Just let your notary know so they can prepare).

WHAT TO EXPECT DURING THE APPOINTMENT

Many appointments are pretty quick, though timing can vary depending on the number of documents and signers.
