Lent - Holy Week - Easter - April, 2020

Trinity suspended corporate worship after the second Sunday in March; we have not met together since March 8. Our bishop, Kevin, and our Presiding Bishop, Michael, have called on us to stay at home and to not gather together, to protect others and to protect ourselves from the Novella Covid-19 virus.

A Message from Bishop Kevin: Suspension of Gatherings Until May 3

April 2, 2020

Assist us mercifully with your help, O Lord God of our salvation, that we may enter with joy upon the contemplation of those mighty acts, whereby you have given us life and immortality; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

As we continue to learn more about the current pandemic, we are discovering that more drastic measures must be taken in order to protect, not just the vulnerable, but all people in our communities. In light of recommendations from medical experts, our Governor, and our President, I once again call upon all congregations of the Diocese of Bethlehem to suspend in-person gatherings, including worship, until May 3, 2020.

Last Sunday, I joined you in worship around the diocese. I watched pre-recorded services and attended as many livestream worship gatherings as I was able. Through these virtual gatherings, I heard a resounding reminder that the Church must not be entombed! I heard strong voices demanding that we shout down fear and death once and for all. I heard a clarion call to remember who we are as followers of Jesus. As Christians, we must recover our sense of purpose. We must reach out and remind the communities we are called to serve why we are here-to proclaim a risen Christ to a broken and frightened world. This crisis, this pandemic, this moment is like no other. And it calls us to stay strong together.

As we prepare for the holiest of seasons, I implore you to take heart. Though our buildings will be empty, we will continue to be the Church in the world. We will worship together, even while physically distant, on Palm Sunday, Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, at the Easter Vigil, and especially on Easter Sunday-when we will celebrate and remember that Christ has conquered death and will raise us up to new life! Though this pandemic may keep us from gathering in person, we remain the Church, we continue to be the people of God, and we are the body of Christ!



From Fr. Ben: Ruminations While In Isolation

While sitting in isolation and under house arrest in Rome, Paul writes the letters to the Colossians, Ephesians, Philemon, and possibly Philippians. This occurred during 61-63 AD. I suppose that Paul found it difficult to not be able to get out and about and to preach. The missives must have been to placate his yearnings during confinement.

With my daily visits to Walmart, clinic appointments, and need to write sermons temporarily suspended, I find myself spending more time in email correspondence. I'm sure this would have been Paul's past-time had it been available to him.

Wait a minute, that's an interesting thought!

I wonder what Christianity would have looked like in the first century had there been social media available to Paul and the Apostles? The spread of the gospel would have been phenomenal. Then again, so would have been the heresies. The reality of and the drawback to social media is the rapid dispersal of misinformation, half-truths, and outright lies. But I digress. Please allow me to ruminate with you on prayer for a moment.


Prayer during these troubling times is terribly important. It's not so much that we should be praying for or expecting a miracle from God to sweep down and wipe out the virus by Holy Week or Easter. If Covid19 is still around at Easter, so be it. Stay in; stay safe. God doesn't require of us to form mass gatherings to demonstrate our collective faith, while jeopardizing others with our bravado.

Prayer has many forms, although intercession and petition are the forms most frequently associated with prayer. Praying for others and for our self is important, but I must admit that it too easily can put us into a mind-set of expected results.

During these difficult and different times, I might suggest two other forms of prayer which are frequently forgotten: adoration and thanksgiving. "Adoration is the lifting up of the heart and mind to God, asking nothing but to enjoy God's presence ... Thanksgiving is offered to God for all the blessings of this life, for our redemption, and for whatever draws us closer to God." [Book of Common Prayer, "An Outline of the Faith", p. 857]

The short and simple of these forms of prayer is to let God know that you know he's still around. In doing so, adoration and thanksgiving can quiet our soul knowing that we are keeping in touch with God. So remember that it is perfectly okay to pray to be able to find toilet paper on the store shelf, but when there isn't any remember to give thanksgiving for the dairy products you did find.
