Abortion & the Bible

There's the story of two theologians arguing a verse of scripture, as is their nature. At that moment, a third theologian is wandering by and they call him over and ask her opinion, "Which one of us is right?" The third theologian proffers, "Well, actually, neither of you are understanding the verse." While the three of them expand the heated debate, God happens to stroll past. They call over God, "Which of us is right?" God shakes the divine head, "None of you," and explains the intention of the Biblical passage. The theologians shrug their collective shoulders and exclaim together, "Oh great! Now we have four opinions."

With the uptick in a possible over-turning of *Roe v*. *Wade*, there is much biblical misunderstanding, misinterpretation, and misapplication of the scriptures, both Hebrew and Christian, upon which people attempt to fortify their position. Allow me to make a few observations.

Although I believe that the scriptures are a part of a divine attempt to interact with God's frail creation of humanity (us), I fear that we are verging upon the sin of idolatry when we elevate a single book — in reality an anthology — such as the Bible, to a definitive divine statement about all things human and natural. "God said it; I believe it; that's that," as an oft seen bumper sticker proclaims, is a fallacy. It becomes worse when we declare that one particular English translation of the Bible is the ultimate 'authoritative' edition of the divine intention — that's human hubris at its pinnacle and pure idolatry.

To the best of my knowledge – I admit I'm not a Hebrew scholar – there is no word for abortion in the scriptures. There are words for miscarriage and premature birth, but the context is a legal direction for accidental situations – recompense or retribution being the options: *"When men strive together, and hurt* a woman with child, so that there is a miscarriage, and yet no harm follows, the one who hurt her shall be fined, according as the woman's husband shall lay upon him; and he shall pay as the judges determine." (Exodus 21:22).

What we can infer from this passage is that the fetus is seen as the property of the husband and he can demand that an appropriate fine be paid. If the woman is further harmed (injured or killed), the *lex talionis* is invoked. Clearly, she is seen as a person; the fetus is not.

There is only one passage that may or may not be speaking of an abortion as a curse brought upon a wife for infidelity (Numbers 5:21-22). However, pregnancy is never specifically mentioned in the passage, only the jealousy of the husband and a test of the wife's fidelity.

Abortion aside, the Bible, however, is more specific concerning when life begins: it is with the first breath. <u>Genesis 2:7</u> "*Then the Lord formed man of dust from the ground, and breathed into his nostrils the breath of life; and man became a living being.*"

<u>Job 33:4</u> "The spirit of God has made me, and the **breath** of the Almighty gives me life."

Ezekiel 37:5-6 "Thus says the Lord GOD to these bones: Behold, I will cause breath to enter you, and you shall live. And I will lay sinews upon you, and will cause flesh to come upon you, and cover you with skin, and put breath in you, and you shall live; and you shall know that I am the LORD."

Those of course are passages from the Hebrew scriptures. But what does Jesus say about abortion? Jesus is silent on it.

There are passages against murder in the Christians scriptures, as in the Hebrew scriptures, but again, it all depends upon when life begins according to the scriptures.

I am not trivializing unborn children. There are most (Continued on page 2)

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certainly moral and ethical decisions to be made by people who have the breath of life concerning an unborn child. The scriptures, however, do not specifically contribute any definitive or easy answers to those moral decisions. Most certainly, any decision should be made in consultation with doctors and spiritual advisors, but not made preemptively by politicians.
