Benefits of Clean Language

- Clean Language helps build rapport with others. When you use other peoples words, they feel supported, respected, listened to, and motivated to improve their situation.
- Improves your own self-awareness. By directly focusing on how you ask questions you become more self-aware.
- Clean Language can be used to explore a person's metaphors. This creates a bridge between the conscious and unconscious mind, enhancing self-awareness and self-understanding.

Clean Language Questions by David Grove

Developing Questions

- \circ (and) what kind of X (is that X)?
- o (and) is there anything else about X?
- \circ (and) where is X? or (and) whereabouts is X?

Identify Questions

- o (and) what would X like to have happen?
- $\circ~$ (and) how do you know X?
- o (and) that's X like what?

Sequence and Source Questions

- o (and) then what happens? or (and) what happens next?
- o (and) what happens just before X?
- o (and) when X, what happens to Y?
- $\circ~$ (and) where could X come from?

Necessary Conditions

- \circ (and) when X, what would you like to have happen now?
- o (and) what needs to happen for X?





Principles of Clean Language

- ✓ Listen attentively
- ✓ Keep your opinions and advice to yourself as far as possible
- ✓ Ask Clean Language questions to explore a person's metaphors (or everyday statements)
- ✓ Listen to the answers and then ask more Clean Language questions about what the person has just said

Cleanness Rating Scale

- Strongly Leading Introduces words, frames, or opinions (especially via metaphors and presuppositions) that cast doubt upon the authenticity or authorship of interviewees answers
- Mildly Leading Introduces new words to the conversation, however, these words aren't strongly metaphorical or presuppositional
- Contextually Clean A close alternative to Classically Clean that only introduces 'neutral' words based upon the context of the conversation
- Classically Clean A question from the Clean Language set that only uses the interviewees words
