### SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.

#### SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must con-tact the rectory six to nine months before the date Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

# REFLECTION

This Sunday's readings all speak of the need to stand up for what is holy and right and true in a way that invites others to turn away from sin. If we don't, we will we indirectly play a part in the sins he or she commits, and we will be held accountable (see the first reading). If we take a stand against sin but without compassion and mercy and unconditional love, that too is a sin (the second reading). Jesus shows us in the Gospel reading that in our efforts to stop a fellow Christian from sinning, it's important to rely on our Christian community for advocacy and prayer support. How? First, we speak to the sinner. When we know that someone is harming himself and others (all sins are harmful even when we can't see the harm), if we don't try to impart this knowledge to him or her at least once, our silence is unloving and uncaring. Once we've shared the truth, even if the sinner does not change, we're free of any guilt. But we must not stop trying, and so we take one or two others with us in a stronger effort to help the sinner understand and repent. And if that fails, we try again with still more backing. When every attempt to help someone has failed, only then do we quit. In reality it's not us who's walking away. The sinner is the one who has chosen the path of separation. However, remember how Jesus treated the Gentiles and tax collectors (i.e., the outsiders, the separated ones):. He still chose to die for them.

REMEMBRANCE OF ABORTED CHILDREN

The Diocese of Scranton will participate in the eighth annual National Day of Remembrance for Aborted Children on Saturday, September 12 when Pro-life Americans will honor the memory of the nearly 60 million unborn victims of abortion since its legalization 1973. Diocesan observances on September 12 will include a Memorial Service for victims of Abortion to be held at 11:00 am. At Mount Olivet Remembrance Day for Abortion Victims Cemetery, 612 Mount Olivet Road, Carverton. The Pro-life gathering will take place at Mount Olivet's Wyoming valley Knights of Columbus "Tomb of the Unborn," located on the top of the hill on the cemetery grounds. During the memorial observance, the Rosary will be recited in remembrance of all aborted babies.

# FROM THE PASTOR

Let us begin with this passage from St. Paul's letter to the Colossians. But now it has been manifested to his holy ones to whom God chose to make known the riches of the glory of this mystery among the Gentiles; it is Christ in you, the hope for glory. It is he whom we proclaim, admonishing everyone and teaching everyone with all wisdom, that we may present everyone perfect in Christ. For this I labor and struggle, in accord with the exercise of his power working within me. (Col.1:26-29) Happy Labor Day to each of you! I pray that you are able to relax and take it easy from your daily jobs and earthly duties that God calls each of us to. Labor day is about more than backyard cookouts, days off of work and school, and the last day for the outdoor pools to be open. Labor Day originated in the US as a day to honor and celebrate the spirit of the Labor and trade organizations as well as the workers and their families. This day is a good day for all of us to be thankful for our jobs and the work that God calls each of us to. While this is certainly a day of rest from our physical earthly jobs, we should never take a break from our spiritual duties. Saint Paul writes about the reasons for which he labors and struggles, it is not for himself, but rather for others. Saint Paul says the reason for which he labors is to proclaim Christ to all, to teach them His ways and His word, so that one day with God's grace everyone may be presented perfect in Christ. Saint Paul labored and struggled in order to build up the people of God, to grow, nurture and help those who were in need of God's love. Saint Paul labored to bring Christ to everyone he could. We too would do well to follow His example. While we may rest today, let us never rest from spreading the good news and from bringing Christ to all those that we are called to. Father above, we thank you and praise you for the gift of this day, Lord, thank you for our jobs and for the work that you are calling us to now. Lord help guide us and strengthen us in this world, so that we may be your perfect servants at all times. Lord, all good things from you, and we pray that You will help make us good lights in this world and that we may help share your good news with all those we can. We pray for all those who are unemployed and for all those searching for jobs. We ask this all through Christ our Lord. Amen.
