SUNDAY REFLECTION

Atop Mount Tabor, the pure light of Christ was revealed, as seen in this Gospel reading. The Father said, "This is my beloved Son, listen to Him." The transfiguration is repeated every time we listen to Him and allow our faith to be enlightened more today than it was yesterday. Now it is we who are transfigured! We are transfigured! We are transformed into our true identity. What is our true identity? It's our innermost being, which was created in the image of God and baptized into the likeness of God. We enjoy life much more when we live according to our true identity. For example, how do you feel when you're impatient Not so good, right? That's because God is patient (see 1 Corinthians 13:4-7 for a description of His true identity and yours), and when we are patient, we are much happier. During Lent, humbly examining how Christ-like we are and repenting from our sins, we let His light consume the darkness within us. Jesus left His mountaintop experience to fulfill His calling. Following Christ, we too leave our mountaintops to do what God Has gifted us to do. Although there is, as the reading from Timothy points out, hardship in living a holy life, we can be comforted by the fact the after every Calvary there is always an Easter. We can rely on "the strength that comes from God." Listen. Can you hear what God is saying about you? It's the same words He spoke about Jesus on Mount Tabor: This is my beloved child: listen to him/her." What are you saying as Christ's partner in ministry?

ST. ANTHONY OF PADUA NOVENA - In two weeks we will conduct this special devotion. We invite and encourage our parishioners and others to join us. This year's theme featuring the life of the Venerable Matt Talbot. He lived in Ireland in the late 1800's and early 1900's. Poor in abject poverty he become an alcoholic as a child. In your imagination, retrace the steps of your day, what you did, whom you encountered, thoughts and feelings you experienced. 3) Give thanks, name one moment from your day for which you are grateful. 4) Talk with God, tell God the things you feel good about and those you regret. 5) Look toward the day to come. Ask God to help you be your best self as you look forward to tomorrow. 6) Finish your prayer. End your prayer with An Our Father or a similar prayer that speaks your heart. Exterior Spiritual practices: Cultivating a Renewed Heart. "Put on, then, as God's Chosen ones, holy and beloved, heartfelt compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience, bearing with one another and forgiving one another, if one has a grievance against another; as the Lord has forgiven you, so must you also do, and above all these, put on love, the Band of perfection. And let the peace of Christ control your hearts, the peace into which you were also called in one body, and be thankful. (Col.3-12:17).
