You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

Scripture Reflection

Jesus told his disciples, "Blessed are they who mourn, for they will be comforted." Today we mourn all those who have died, especially those we love, those who are close to us. But we indeed are comforted: by our memories of them, by sharing our grief with our loved ones, and by our faith, which tells us that death is not the end. Their souls are in the arms of God, forever comforted from the suffering and hardships they faced in life. Our faith in the Resurrection allows us to be pilgrims of hope in this life, placing our trust in God's love and mercy.

What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

In Scripture, even in the face of rejection, blasphemy, and idolatry, God is nothing other than faithful to his chosen people. If God can be steadfast in these moments, then he will also be faithful to us when we seek him in our own time. Jesus promises that all who come to him will be raised on the last day. On All Souls' Day, we remember this promise with our own loved ones in mind, asking that God shows them mercy - as we know he desires to. In praying for the dead, we trust that out of love and in response to our faith, God will raise us all from death into eternal life.

Thoughts from Deacon Bill:

I wear a deacon's ring almost every

day. It's funny, the first time I saw a deacon's ring was at a Christmas party for our deacons. At that party, my wife and I sat at a table with our own Deacon Steve and his wife - and the ring was on Deacon Steve's finger. I talked about this ring all the way home - and my wife surprised me by gifting me with one to wear. I wear it because, as a deacon, living my ordination should not be a "weekend thing." As was explained to me repeatedly during my five-year formation, the Sacrament of Holy Orders makes an indelible mark on the soul of every priest and deacon. That indelible mark, however, is INVISIBLE. Being human, I feel I need gentle reminders of my role as servant. My ring reminds me whenever I reach out to anyone, with hand and heart, I should always be cognizant that I have asked that my hands become Christ's hands in this world. They are meant to do GOOD THINGS. But ordination does not mean only priests and deacons should let love be at the core of who we are. We are all called to be Christ's love and Christ's hands in this world. And that will never be made stronger - or more important - just by wearing a deacon's ring. It's a call we all receive.



Now You Know.... From the PLC

Why do we celebrate All Saints Day and All Souls' Day (officially, The Commemoration of All the Faithful Departed)?

We begin November with these two special days to remember those who have gone to eternal life: the Saints in Heaven (Church Triumphant) and the Holy Souls in Purgatory (Church Suffering). During our earthly life we are the Church Militant because we fight the spiritual battle against evil. We are members of the Communion of Saints. The Old Testament speaks of the Saints. For example, "The Saints of the Most High shall receive the kingdom and possess the kingdom forever and ever." (Daniel 7:18). "The souls of the righteous are in the hand of God, and no torment will ever touch them." (Wisdom 3:1). The Saints pray for us and we pray for the Holy Souls in Purgatory. We work with God in His work of redemption. How do we do that? We pray for others and for the world as Jesus does for us. We learn how we are co-workers with God whenever we hear a homily at Mass or when we read the works of the Church Fathers and scholars, explaining the Scriptures and their meaning in our daily lives. While the Scriptures speak often of those in heaven being "asleep," this "sleep" refers to the physical body, not to the soul. If souls were "asleep" in death, unable to praise God or to experience His Love, how unjust would that be? To show the importance of these days, the Church made All Saints Day a Holy Day of Obligation, and in 1915, the Pope gave priests the privilege of celebrating three Masses on All Souls' Day. These Mass intentions are for: a particular intention; all the faithful departed; and the Pope. Now you know!
