Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana

Program.

Scripture Reflection

"Repent, for the kingdom of heaven is at hand!" So proclaimed John the Baptist as he prepared the world for the coming of the Messiah. We may not be preparing for Jesus Christ's arrival in the flesh or plunging into the Jordan River, but John's words apply just as much today as they did then. We must recognize and repent of our sins in order to be prepared for the Lord's arrival in our lives in any way. And the kingdom of heaven is still at hand, glimpsed when we are reconciled with God and our neighbor. May we hear John's words as if they were directed to us here and now.

What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

This is why John the Baptist's words are so radical - justice involves looking beyond ourselves to better understand the realities of others. This task is not always easy or welcome. Fortunately for us, we are not the authors of justice. As Paul writes, "May the God of endurance and encouragement grant you to think in harmony with one another, in keeping with Christ Jesus." As we continue this season of Advent let us make this prayer our own. Like John, may we BE prophetic voices for justice in our world as we build up the Kingdom of Heaven.

"Hey, long time - no see." How many times have we thought or even said those words when we meet someone we haven't seen in a very long time. Typically, we are very happy to see a long lost friend or relative. Jean and I



recently visited a retired priest friend, and it was great to be together. We fell into a rapport that belied the fact that we hadn't been together in quite some time. While awaiting sleep last night I thought about how someone's relationship with God might fall into disrepair - but that disrepair might fall away if an effort was made to sit down and talk. I guarantee you a warm and hearty welcome if you make that effort, if you approach our God. He will not treat you as someone who abandoned him, but as a returning brother or sister he's been longing to spend some time with. Now, how would this rediscovery affect you? I can't say exactly, other than saying "better than you were before." You will have rediscovered your God, your Savior, and your friend. Step up and renew that friendship. He's waiting...patiently.

What is the Immaculate Conception?

The Immaculate Conception is probably our most misunderstood teaching. Some think it means Mary was conceived without her parents having sexual relations. Not true. Many think it means Mary conceived Jesus in her womb without having relations with a man. This misconception is not surprising since the Gospel presents the Annunciation, where Mary conceives Jesus in her womb by the power of the Holy Spirit, not by man. Not the Immaculate Conception.

At the instant a person is conceived in the womb, God places a soul there. God is all good, so the soul is without sin. Parents pass on Original Sin at the moment of conception. The Immaculate Conception means God prevented the passing of Original Sin to Mary by her parents. As a result, she did not have the inclination to sin as we all do because of Original Sin. Mary's preservation from sin was necessary because, as the Mother of God, she would give Jesus, the Son of God, a human nature identical to hers. Jesus could not have a fallen nature, so God preserved His mother from Original Sin. He gave her an Immaculate human nature, which she would give to the eternal Son who became man without sin. God is the Father of the created world and Mary is the mother of the recreated world. Without God's Son nothing could exist, without Mary's Son nothing could be redeemed. Tomorrow is this Holy Day of Obligation when we celebrate the preparation God made for our salvation. God allowed Mary to share beforehand in the merits Jesus won on the Cross so that He could be like us in all things but sin. Mary gave birth to the one who created her! Wow! Now you know!
