Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana

Program.

1st Sunday of Advent

Scripture Reflection

During this season of anticipation, we are reminded that Jesus didn't come into the world only once, as a newborn baby over two thousand years ago, but also comes into the world - and our hearts - throughout our lives. Furthermore, as we hear in today's Gospel, he will return to the world without warning on the day of judgment. Therefore, over the Advent season we have a great incentive to prepare our hearts for his coming. May Jesus' words to his disciples resonate with us today: "You also must be prepared, for at an hour you do not expect, the Son of Man will come."

What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

As we enter into Advent once again, we are NOT preparing for the coming of the Christ Child; that already happened more than two thousand years ago. Rather, in Advent, we break our normal routine and move into heightened alert to perceive more intensely the ways in which Emmanual, God-with-us, is moving us toward that vision of peace and unity that Isaiah so eloquently describes in the first reading. The prophet dreams of how people stream toward the city of peace, all dwell in unity, swords are beaten into plow-shares, spears into pruning hooks, and there is no more training for war again.

Thoughts from Deacon Bill:

How many of us diligently prepare for a trip - you know, when we are getting away for a few days of rest and relaxation. Now personally, I love BEING



away; I strongly dislike PREPARING for the trip. What are you wearing in the car? Long pants or shorts? What about if we go out for dinner? Invariably I tell my wife, "Just pack what you think I will need." She does - and also invariably at least once during the trip I'll ask, "Where is ?" And guess what - it wasn't packed, and I am the first to admit, it's MY fault. All too often we rely on others to anticipate our needs. Even though it is OUR OWN welfare we're talking about, we rarely take responsibility. I can't help but wonder if this same attitude drives our daily lives, too. Even when we are not planning a trip we should all be anticipating that final journey, you know - the one that leads to a personal encounter with God. It's easy to pawn off responsibility to others. Hey, that's Father's or Deacon's responsibility. Sure, we go to mass every weekend, but preparing ourselves to meet our Creator should mean more than that. We should be developing a RELATIONSHIP with God, especially by searching for him in the face of others, and by saying, "I'm sorry" when we've offended him or them. Remember this is an excellent "spiritual GPS." But like the one in our cars, it only works if we turn it on.





Now You Know.... From the PLC

Do priests remember the sins we confess in the Sacrament of Penance?

It helps to know that priests hear many confessions. And the details of who said what blur pretty quickly in their memory. While some voices are more recognizable than others, in most confessions, the priests are not aware of who is speaking, unless of course, the screen is not in use. It is also true that priests hear just about everything in confession, and very little shocks them or stands out. This is sad and actually a danger since even serious sins can become normal conversation. Priests can, at times, seem to minimize the serious nature of many sins given the frequency with which they hear things. This is surely helpful in not remembering what the penitent says, but can hinder deep and more serious advice. Remember, too, that priests go to confession. This helps them remain humble when hearing confessions. Every priest takes the complete secrecy of the confessional very seriously. God provides His priests with grace to keep the Sacramental Seal of Confession. The proof of this is that the violation is unheard of. We can conclude that our priests, even if they recognize our voice, or if we are seated openly, during our confession, are probably not going to remember the specifics of our confessions. It's a combination of poor memory, volume, routine, and grace. Our Lord and the Church strongly encourage us to confess our sins. God wants us to repent so He can forgive us. He does this exceptionally well through His priests. Go now as we begin Advent and this new liturgical year! Now you know!
