Be Not Afraid

What God wants most for each of us is to be happy with Him in Heaven. He uses the world to shape us and give us qualities that will help us get there untainted by sin. "Indeed, like clay in the hand of the potter, so are you in my hand..." (Jeremiah 18:6). Sometimes that means allowing us to undergo trials that cleanse and strengthen us.

Don't judge a gift by its ugly wrapping paper. Some virtues can only be acquired through hardship. Avoiding discomfort will cause you to miss out on experiences God wants you to have. While they may be uncomfortable, God would remove them at once if they weren't good for your soul.

"Pray, hope and don't worry." This famous advice from St. Pio of Pietrelcina (Padre Pio) is both comforting and practical. Many of tomorrow's troubles exist only in our minds. Live your trust in God by refusing to think about what might happen and instead deal with what is happening right now. Refuse to worry. "Can any of you by worrying add a single moment to your life-span?"

Accept aid. When overwhelmed, we may overlook the help God is already providing, mistakenly believing we must face challenges alone. This mindset can lead to pride—the temptation to act without God.

Instead, stay open to help from others, seek guidance in Scripture and Church teachings, and remain rooted in prayer and the Sacraments, especially the Eucharist. Once your storm passes, you'll be prepared to support others through theirs.

Family Love: Vocation to Path and Holiness

Heavenly Father, we come before You to praise You and to thank You for the great gift of the family. We pray to You for all families consecrated by the Sacrament of Matrimony. May they rediscover each day the grace they have received, and as small domestic Churches, may they know how to witness to Your presence and to the love with which Christ loves the Church. We pray to You for all families faced with difficulty and suffering caused by illness or circumstances of which only You know. Sustain them and make them aware of the path to holiness upon which You call them, so that they might experience Your infinite mercy.



It surprises me that many <u>Catholics think that Easter ends on Easter Sunday</u>. Heavily influenced by secular society and the madness of advertisement of the next sale, to many it's all over at the end of the day. Easter, like Christmas, isn't a one day celebration. They both have a season. Ancient records show that besides celebrating Easter Sunday, an <u>Easter Season of 50 days</u> was celebrated as far back as the beginning of the third century. There was no fasting or kneeling. It was not a time for penitential practices. It was a time to exult in God's goodness. Why is <u>Easter so long</u>? <u>Because the Resurrection is just too big and too important to celebrate in only one day, or even one week!</u>

Why 50 days, not 10, 20 or 40? Because the Jewish Feast of Pentecost occurred 50 days after Passover and this 50 day stretch between Passover and Pentecost was already in place. For Christians it became one great feast, the longest feast ever. They called it a "Week of weeks" because it lasted seven weeks. Truly, the Easter Season is the Church's most ancient and beautiful Season. For the 50 days until Pentecost, in the Sunday Gospels, we'll find the Risen Christ by a lakeshore, on a mountain top, and coming through closed doors. The Paschal Candle will burn brightly in our Church as we, like the two disciples on the road to Emmaus, feel our hearts burning within us and experience the fire of His love. Now a new "resolution" may be in order, not a Lenten resolution, but one for the rest of the year. Every morning when you arise like the sun on the gift of a new day of life, take a minute or two and pray or reflect in silence. It is in us to pray. We were made for it, and we're physically healthier and happier when we pray. And when you begin praying regularly, surprises will happen.
