### **SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM**

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



#### SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

# **Scripture Reflection**

As we approach the festive day on which we may receive gifts and guests into our homes, we take a moment to recall that during this season of Advent we are called to prepare to receive Jesus into our hearts. Yes, we receive him in a most special way at Christmas, the day we celebrate the world receiving him in the flesh, but we also have the opportunity to receive him each and every day. Let us humbly ask God to prepare our hearts to receive him in the Eucharist here today.

# What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

The importance of mystery extends beyond Joseph into our own lives. Joseph models for us the importance of listening to stories and experiences that are not necessarily our own. He probably struggled to understand Mary's experience and was filled with questions about the seemingly strange circumstances surrounding her pregnancy. But Joseph reserved judgment and listened with an open heart to the workings of God in his midst. As we come to an end of this Advent season and prepare to welcome Emmanual - God with us - we pray that we, like Joseph, will remain open to God in our midst.

# **Thoughts from Deacon Bill:**

One of the most difficult things I've had to accept as I age is my inability to shovel snow. I just can't do it anymore. If Jean goes out to shovel, it breaks my heart. I feel less than a loving husband. I've come to accept it when someone we hire comes to plow our driveway. The job gets done and I don't have to feel the indignity of aging. But listen, I still feel a bit lost as I realize I'm just not young anymore. As we go through life, particularly our spiritual life, we can sometimes feel we're less than God's favorite. The good thing here is, our God understands. Although he didn't have a long life as a human, he understands us. We can go to him and explain how we are feeling - and he will love us through it. It doesn't matter if we can't genuflect anymore when we come into church. It doesn't matter if we move slowly up the aisle at Communion. What matters is not the shape of our bodies, but the content of our hearts. No matter what shape we are in, our God is right there by our side. We still might not be able to shovel snow or genuflect, but being love -filled makes up for everything else. Honest!



# Now You Know.... From the PLC

We are four days away from Christmas, the Celebration of God Becoming Man! On this Fourth Sunday of Advent, our Hope will soon be realized! For weeks we expressed Hope in the coming of Jesus into our lives. Mary said "Yes" to bringing the Son of God, the Son of David, and the Light into the world. The Trinity and the Incarnation are the two greatest mysteries of our Faith. The second Person of the Trinity, Jesus Christ, became fully human while remaining fully Divine. How can this be? Jesus was born of a human mother, Mary of Nazareth, through the power of the Holy Spirit descending upon her from God, who is His Father. Jesus is only one Person, but with two natures. He is fully God and fully human. As God, He is all-knowing, changeless, and eternal. As human, He has a body, mind, will, and feelings. His Divinity does not interfere with His humanity.
