You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana

Program.

Scripture Reflection

We are a needy people. We each stand before God as someone in need. No matter how well off we are, how healthy we are, or how satisfied we are with our lives, we are all in need of God's saving mercy. If we look at ourselves honestly, we see that we are far from perfect, that we in fact are sinful and always in need of forgiveness. May we, like the tax collector in today's Gospel, be aware of our neediness so that no matter our situation in life we too may humbly pray, "O God, be merciful to me a sinner."

What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

It's hard work to maintain HUMILITY. Our human natures are all too ready to take credit for the good we do. We want to believe that we have EARNED God's favor and all the good things God gives us. It is through disciplines - regular, repeated acts of prayer, fasting, and generosity, even when we don't feel like doing them - that we can grow and maintain a rightly-ordered relationship with God.

Thoughts from Deacon Bill:

At a previous assignment, I was waiting for the entrance procession when I overheard a conversation underway in the vestibule. The discussion centered around a trail-



er abandoned along a road in Texas during the heat of summer. When police arrived to investigate, they found it was full of undocumented immigrants - all dead from heat and dehydration. The comment that really got me was, "What's the big deal? They're only illegals." I thought about going over to "join in" but the music started and the procession began. All these years later, I still cannot understand how Catholic-Christians can be so cold. "Whatever you do, even to the least, you do to ME." How can we not care when those created in God's image are allowed to die of thirst in sweltering heat? You know what bothers me the most? I didn't confront those people. As we go through life, may we take to heart the gospel message of Christ. It's certainly our nation's right to secure our borders but not in a way that deliberately dehumanizes our brothers and sisters. God made "majorities" and "minorities". The lesson should be that God made us all. May we try our best to welcome all - not with fists or "welcome to America" signs, but with a recognition that we are all part of one human family.

What is the Sign of the Cross?

We have made the Sign of the Cross thousands of times, but have we thought about its meaning? The Sign of the Cross is a simple motion, but it is much more than a routine gesture. It is a prayer and a declaration of Faith. It is one of the most powerful things we can do as Catholics. From the earliest centuries of Christianity, the Sign of the Cross was used constantly. A second century Church Father, Tertullian, said, "In all our travels and movements, in all coming in and going out, we mark our foreheads with the Sign of the Cross. Why? Because it's not just symbolic." When we trace the Sign of the Cross on our body we are invoking the power of the Trinity, the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. We're remembering the Cross of Christ where Satan was defeated. The Sign of the Cross is a prayer in itself. It says I belong to Christ, I reject the enemy, and I live in the Name of God. We make the Sign of the Cross to begin and end our prayers, before meals, when passing Catholic Churches, when blessing ourselves with holy water entering the Church, and at the beginning and end of Mass. Every time we make the Sign of the Cross hell trembles. That sounds dramatic, but it's true. We must not let it become a thoughtless, robotic gesture. We need to make every Sign of the Cross slowly, reverently, always remembering it is a prayer, the Gospel in a moment. The vertical points to our Faith and love of God. The horizontal rests on our shoulders and points to our works and love of neighbor. Each one passes through our heart. Now you know!
