#### **SACRAMENT OF BAPTISM**

You must be registered in the Parish for six months. Arrangements for the Baptism must be arranged by the parents. All sponsors should be carefully selected and must be at least 16 years of age. Non-practicing, fallen away Catholics are not eligible for sponsorship, even if they are close relatives or friends. The Sponsors are required to bring a letter of eligibility from their Church.



#### SACRAMENT OF MATRIMONY

Couples planning a wedding must contact the rectory six to nine months before the date.

Couples are obligated to follow Parish Policy and are required to attend the Diocese Pre-Cana Program.

#### What I would like you to PRAY ABOUT:

Today's Gospel is always hard to hear. Jesus' call to hate our own family goes against our natural instincts to love, protect, and honor them. These instincts are GOOD, and put in place by God. They are a part of how God loves us in this life by enabling us to share love with each other. But being a follower of Christ means going beyond the natural affection that families share. It means participating in God's love in such a way that there are no favored ones among us. It means loving all as God does - equally and fully. Our human loves find their completion in the love of God, which does not divide or have preferences even as it loves each of us individually. This love does not erase our human loves. It perfects them.

<u>Deacon's Corner:</u> How many of us have told our young children, "There's nothing to fear about darkness - there's nothing in the dark that's not there in the light." I guess that's good advice for children who



fear what might be lurking in the dark, but we adults can be fear-filled too. Our darkness can be a bit different than a child's, but darkness IS darkness. So what should we adults do when we face our own personal darkness? We can repeat what we tell our children - there is nothing in the dark that's not there in the light. Even in our darkness, the Light of Christ shines brightly. We need to trust; we need to believe; and we need to embrace God's light and presence. Remember, God never leads us to the dark - He leads us through it. If you find yourself in a spiritual darkness, talk to God. He is there...and He listens. It's never too dark to experience our Creator's love.

We old timers could remember it sung by Willie Nelson, Frank Sinatra, and even Jimmy Durante, to name a few.
